Evra to appeal French ban French skipper Patrice Evra is to appeal the five-match ban he was handed by a disciplinary commission for co-leading a training strike during an abortive World Cup, his lawyer said Monday. "To this day, Mr Patrice Evra has not received notification of the decision by the Federal Disciplinary Commission (of the French Football Federation) on August 17 banning him from the French team for five matches," Jean-Yves Foucard said. He added that the reasoning behind the ban had not been explained to the Manchester United player and decried varying individual punishment for a collective misdeed.



Aminul worth risking a spot

Five months on and with the Asian Games knocking on the door, Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) is still unaware of the penalty of national goalkeeper Aminul Haque for receiving a red card during the AFC Challenge Cup finals in Sri Lanka held in February.

In that do-or-die match in order to ensure a berth in the last four, Bangladesh captain Aminul pulled down a Sri Lankan forward inside the box and was sent off for the challenge. Having lost the match 3-0, Bangladesh have not participated in any international match since and Aminul is expected to be penalised for one match at least for his offence, but the extent of the penalty is still not known by the BFF.

When attention was drawn on this issue, BFF general secretary Al Musabbir Sadi could not provide any good reply. Instead he said that the matter was being handled by competition manager Abu Nayeem Shohag, who is now in Sri Lanka to attend a beach football seminar.

Meanwhile, Aminul has been included in the preliminary squad for the Asian Games as one of three senior players and circumstances suggest that he may stand under the bar in China this November.

The BFF officials also do not know whether Aminul's punishment would be effective in the Asian Games.

Coach Saiful Bari Titu, who was the head coach during Bangladesh's AFC Challenge Cup campaign, is also not aware of the punishment and is a bit anxious on whether it would be wise to keep Aminul in the final squad given that Bangladesh may have to play one of their matches without the veteran custodian.

However, the grouping of football event is yet to be finalised by the organising committee of Asian Games.

reporters after a long discussion with his uncle and selector Akram Khan, acting CEO Nizamuddin Chowdhury and BCB's media committee chairman Jalal Yunus yesterday.

"No comments" was the answer when he was asked about his resentment over the BCB's arrangement. It was learnt that the young batsman vehemently reacted when he learnt that he has to enjoy the economy class for the trip. Tamim has been demanding for business class.

The opener was also not ready to confirm whether he is going to Australia under the board's arrangement or he is going at his own cost.

"There was nothing wrong with the board. I leave it to the board. Let's see what happens," said Tamim.

But it seemed that BCB found itself in a spot of bother with the issue. The officials apparently tried to convince Tamim during yesterday's long meeting and finally he agreed to go in the economy class.

Apparently, it all cleared up for Tamim when he had a chat with skipper Mashrafe Bin Mortaza regarding the travel arrangements.

Bowden and Hill will be in charge of the fourth and final Test between England and Pakistan at the Lord's Cricket Ground here.

"To umpire with my fellow New Zealander Tony Hill for the first-time ever in a Test match will be special," Bowden, who will be standing in his 62nd Test, said in an ICC statement.

"To be at Lord's and to create a little piece of history by being the first two neutral umpires from the same country to umpire there makes it superspecial."

Nat'l pool announced

Twenty-two national cricketers have been bracketed in the national pool for this season's Dhaka Premier Division Cricket League.

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) yesterday made the announcement, stating that the group comprises of players who have played for the Tigers between January 1 and July 31 this year.

Each Premier League club would be eligible to pick a maximum of three players from the pool, a move that has often been quietly criticised by fast bowlers who are included in it.

Robiul Islam, who played just one Test match at Lord's in May, is among seven fast bowlers including Bangladesh captain Mashrafe Bin Mortaza, Rubel Hossain, Nazmul Hossain, Syed Rasel, Shahadat Hossain and Shafiul Islam.

It was observed in the last few seasons that most of the pace bowlers, barring someone like Mashrafe, had a hard time finding a club since some of them filled up the three slots with toporder batsmen, all-rounders or left-arm spinners.

But the big dilemma for these pace bowlers is the price tag that they come with. Most of the clubs are mediocre and work with a limited budget, hence are unable to acquire these fast bowlers. One fast bowler last year had to play for Tk 2 lakh when his Tigers teammates were paid much more by the clubs, even though they were in the pool.

Another factor that goes against these pacers is the pitches that Premier League matches are played on. Most clubs build their gameplan around spinners and batsmen winning games for them so the need for a really expensive fast bowler goes out of the window.

As if these factors were not bad enough, the decision to allow two foreign players in a Premier League match could spell more doom for Shahadat and co.

Shafiul Islam, as an exception, was wonderful for Bangladesh Biman last season, culminating in his rise to the national side. He will probably stay with the national flag carrier and that is due more to his all-round abilities more than anything else.

But this could all change if the BCB can provide with sporting pitches, giving clubs enough reason to invest on a good paceman but unless that happens, the likes of Shahadat Hossain, Robiul and Rubel Hossain could be in the news

come November for not finding a club. The most coveted domestic competition is scheduled to kick off with the Twenty20 tournament from November 27 and the 50-overs battle

is scheduled to get underway from December 8. The two-day inter-club players' transfer for the Premier League will take place in between November 8 to 11.
