Furnace blows up at steel mill

1 killed, 15 badly injured in melting iron; work safety missing

Explosion of a furnace at a steel factory in the city left one dead and 15 workers seriously injured yesterday reminding the horrible lack of workers' safety in this sector.

Eight of the workers of Hasan Steel Mill at Kadamtoli were admitted to the burn unit of Dhaka Medical College Hospital with severe burn injuries sustained by melted iron. Four of them are in critical condition.

About 20,000 workers in over 100 steel factories in the country work in very unsafe conditions mostly without any protective gear and under almost non-existent government monitoring.

The deceased was identified as Billal, 26, said Officer-in-Charge Kazi Aiyubur Rahman of Kadamtoli Police Station. He claimed the factory authorities tried to hide the body of the victim and police recovered it in the evening.

The body of the deceased was sent to Sir Salimullah Medical College morgue.

The factory owners could not be contacted for comments and the secretary of the Bangladesh Steel Mills Owners' Association did not pick up his telephone.

Those admitted to DMCH yesterday were identified as Assistant Manager Ataur Rahman, 40, Manager Madan Mohan, 50, labourers Farhad, 22, Raju, 27, Ripon, 38, Fahad, 30, Ahidul, 30, and Abdur Rob, 30.

Locals and the injured said the furnace melting iron exploded around 10:30am. "The furnace of the re-rolling mill exploded SEE PAGE 15 COL 1

Court's ruling on Ershad era today

After the Supreme Court's nullifying the fifth amendment to the country's constitution, the High Court will today deliver a verdict on the seventh amendment that legitimises HM Ershad's military takeover and the acts under his military

An HC bench of Justice Shamsuddin Chowdhury Manik and Justice Sheikh Md Zakir Hossain yesterday fixed Thursday (today) for the verdict on a writ petition that challenged the seventh amendment to the constitution.

The seventh amendment ratified the proclamation of martial law and other regulations, orders and instructions by Ershad between March 24, 1982, and November 10, 1986. Ershad, the then chief of army staff, declared himself the chief martial law administrator and imposed martial law on March 24, 1982.

Siddique Ahmed, sentenced to life for murder by a martial law court in Chittagong in 1986, filed the petition on January 24 this year.

Chinese firm gets repair job

The government has selected a Chinese firm to do repairs five years after the Bangabandhu Multipurpose Bridge had developed cracks, communications ministry officials have said.

China Road and Bridge Corporation (CRBC) has been chosen for the task involving Tk 165 crore. The government earlier tried twice in vain to find a firm for repairs to the 4.8 km-long bridge.

Four companies submitted bids for the task. They are -- World Kaihatsu Kogyo Co Ltd and The Nippon Road Co Ltd from Japan, Second Highway Engineering Ltd-CATIC Beijing Co Ltd of China in joint venture with Bangladesh's Reza Construction Ltd and the CRBC from China.

The China-Bangladesh joint venture could not qualify in technical evaluation.

The other three fulfilled the requirements and made it to the technical and financial evaluation category, said the report of **SEE PAGE 15 COL 3**

Presidential ordinances to become scarce

Apex court's verdict boosts parliament's legislative power

Extensive promulgation of presidential ordinances during caretaker governments will no longer be possible, as the president's sweeping legislative authority, in absence of a parliament, has been declared void by the apex

court of the country. The same will also be applicable for any outgoing elected government between the dissolution of a parliament and forma-

tion of a caretaker government, legal experts said. The original 1972 constitution allowed presidential ordinances on any urgent matter when the parliament would not be

in session, and only to meet urgent financial expenditure from a consolidated fund, at the president's discretion, when the parliament would stand dissolved. The framers of the original constitution did not foresee a

situation when the country would be governed by a caretaker government, devoid of a parliament. According to the original constitution, a parliamentary elec-

tion would be held within 90 days prior to the normal dissolution of a parliament, and in case of a sudden disbandment the poll would be held within the following 90 days.

In 1996, against a backdrop of agitation by Awami League and an electoral stale-

mate between AL and BNP, the then parliament brought the 13th amendment to the constitution introducing the system of caretaker governments.

A caretaker regime is to assist the Election Commission in holding parliamentary polls within 90 days following a parliament's dissolution, in all cases.

But the president's sweeping authority to exercise the parliament's legislative power was ensured years before in 1978, when military ruler Gen Ziaur Rahman, who also assumed the office of the president, amended article 93 of the constitution through a martial law proclamation.

The proclamation empowered the president to promulgate ordinances on any matter even when the parliament stood SEE PAGE 15 COL 7


