Noman Khan receives Ramon Magsaysay Award 2010

AHM Noman Khan, founder and Executive Director of Centre for Disability in Development (CDD), on Tuesday received the Ramon Magsaysay Award 2010 for significant contribution towards development of people with disabilities.

Philippine President Benigno Aquino gave away the award to Noman Khan as well as six others at a grand function at the Philippine's main cultural centre, said a CDD press release.

Noman Khan is the ninth Bangladeshi to win the award, considered as Asia's Nobel Prize.

Asked how he felt, Noman said, "This is a recognition for participating in the movement to ensure rights of people with disabilities. This is the result of a long-time movement of challenged people and the people who work for them."

Now a total of 350 development organisations are working in the country for the development of people with disabilities, the release added.

The award was introduced in 1957 to commemorate the Philippine's third president Ramon Magsaysay, who died in a plane crash.

Oath-taking of two new judges still uncertain

The responsibility of swearing-in of the two new additional judges of the High Court will go to the shoulder of the next chief justice if any step is not taken to resolve the crisis within this month.

Chief Justice Mohammad Fazlul Karim will retire on September 30 this year. If Fazlul Karim does not administer oath to the two judges within his tenure, the responsibility will lie on the new chief justice.

Attorney General Mahbubey Alam recently told The Daily Star that if the present chief justice does not administer oath to two High Court judges--Ruhul Quddus Babu and M Khasruzzaman, the next chief justice might administer them oath.

He, however, said he does not know whether there was any initiative from the government or the chief justice to resolve the crisis.

Meanwhile, Law Minister Shafique Ahmed has not yet met the president to solve this crisis as per advice of the parliamentary standing committee on the law, justice and parliamentary affairs ministry.

Advocate AM Amin Uddin, a former secretary of the Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA), recently told The Daily Star that Chief Justice Mohammad Fazlul Karim had assured them of solving the problem regarding oath of the two judges, but they did not get any information about any step of the chief justice.

He hoped that the present chief justice would administer oath to Ruhul Quddus and Khasruzzamn within his

Law Minister Shafique Ahmed has not yet met President Zillur Rahman although the parliamentary standing committee on law, justice and parliamentary affairs ministry at a meeting on May 24 this year, asked

the law minister to meet the president within three days to resolve the

The law minister recently told this correspondent that he did not feel necessary to meet the president in this regard, as their appointments are still valid.

President of the SCBA Khandaker Mahbub Hossain in July told this correspondent that the government should cancel the two judges' appointment for the sake of the judiciary.

Lawyers of the country would not accept it if the chief justice administer oath to these two "controversial" persons, he said.

Justice Fazlul Karim swore in 15 of the 17 newly appointed HC additional judges on April 18, leaving out the two considering "unavoidable circumstances."

The crisis over swearing-in of the two judges has not been resolved since their appointment on April 11 by the presi-

Manpower agents asked not to send workers to Iraq illegally

Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas Employment Minister Khandker Mosharraf Hossain yesterday cautioned the manpower agents not to send Bangladeshi workers to Iraq illegally, which would badly affect Bangladesh's labour market abroad.

Since the GulfWar, oil-rich Iraq had stopped hiring workers from Bangladesh. Recently Bangladesh has opened its mission in Baghdad and workers have started going there.

According to official statistics, beginning in 2009, only around 2000 Bangladeshi workers have so far gone to Iraq. But unofficial estimates suggest that there are already around 10,000 Bangladeshis in Iraq. "I would earnestly request you not to send

Bangladeshi workers to Iraq illegally on Ziarat visas [visas for religious purpose]," he said, while addressing an Iftar party organised by Bangladesh Association of International Recruiting Agencies (Baira).
