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Dhaka metro rail to be mostly elevated

First phase to link Sonargaon crossing with Pallabi; project likely to end by 2015

The first part of a mostly elevated metro rail system in the capital will be built mainly over government land and existing roads, based on a Japanese study, said Communications Minister Syed Abul Hossain.

Japan showed interest in financing 80 percent of the project cost as well, amounting to US\$1.7 billion. The remaining 20 percent of the cost will be borne by the government.

The government is expecting Japan to finalise the funding during Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's visit to that country in January or February next

Japan International Cooperation Agency (Jica) conducted the study on the metro rail system, and determined that it will be doable if the majority part is built over the surface. The communications minister said some parts however will be underground.

"This project will not be a public private partnership like the elevated expressway," Syed Abul Hossain told The Daily Star recently. Rather it will be a government project funded by Japan, he added. If Japan provides untied

The Jica study chalked out three

routes. Japan showed interest in the first part dubbed Mass Rail Transit-6.

This part will be 22-kilometre long, said Dr SM Salehuddin, additional executive director of Dhaka Transport Coordination Board. The route stretches between Uttara Third Phase and Sayedabad via Pallabi, Chandrima

Udyan, and Hotel Sonargaon crossing. The remaining two parts involve circular routes from Gulshan-1, Mirpur, Azimpur, National Press Club, and Gulshan-2.


Dr Salehuddin noted that enterloan, the government will go for open prises from China, Iran, India and Malaysia showed interest in the second and third parts of the project.

The Chinese and Iranians are particularly interested in the Gulshan to Mirpur route.

According to the study, financial negotiations between Japan and MOHAMMADPUR Bangladesh could be completed by June next year, after which a detailed engineering study will be carried out till December 2013.

By July 2013, the government will be able to begin construction of the first phase. An ongoing environmental impact assessment will be completed by January next year.

In the first stage of construction, the metro rail will be built between Pallabi **SEE PAGE 15 COL 6**

Survey on 512 schools reveals the institutions lack environment for education

512 schools found shabby buildings,

noisy environment and surroundings

posing threat to mental health of students

institutions. The survey, all done by children, also reveals teachers at majority of schools inflict physical and mental tortures on students despite the government ban on corporal punishment at educational

Victims live on nerves

Apart from fear for lives, the family of Sakira Nasreen Mitu and Sanjida Nasrin Simu, the victims of stalking, is now facing financial crisis as their mother cannot run her music school at their Nikunja residence.

Sahanaz Begum, their mother, used to teach music to local children to support her family but students have stopped coming fearing that Ekabbar, the local stalker, and his gang might attack them.

"Fear for life has cut us off from the rest of the world as neither can we go out nor anybody dares to come to our house. Under this circumstance, we are facing acute financial crisis as none of my students is coming to my house for lesson", Sahanaz told The Daily Star. Her husband works as a construction worker in Dubai and

the money he sends is spent on food and the education of her two daughters. With her earnings, Sahanaz used to pay the house rent and maintain other expenses. But she cannot even go outside her house to teach her stu-

dents. "Who will resist Ekabbar and his gang if they attack for revenge?" she asked this correspondent in a feeble voice, adding that the accused stalkers are still threatening them over the
