Nepal's Maoists seek support to lead govt

Nepal's Maoist party scrambled yesterday to win fresh support for its bid to head the next government, a day ahead of parliament's seventh attempt to elect a new prime minister.

Nepal has been without a government since June 30, when former prime minister Madhav Kumar Nepal stood down under pressure from the opposition Maoist party to pave the way for a new power-sharing administration.

Since then, political leaders have been unable to agree on the shape of the new government and six earlier attempts to choose a new prime minister have failed, with neither of the two candidates securing an absolute majority.

The Maoists, who fought a decade-long civil war against the state before transforming themselves into a political party and winning a 2008 election, hold the largest number of seats in parliament, but not enough to govern alone.

Their candidate, party chairman Pushpa Kamal Dahal, won 240

votes in the latest vote, held on Sunday. His only opponent Ram Chandra Poudel, chairman of the second-largest party in parliament, the centrist Nepali Congress, took 122. But the Maoists now say they are close to winning the support of

an alliance of four smaller parties for Dahal, better known by his nom de guerre Prachanda or "the fierce one". The four parties represent Nepal's Madhesi ethnic minority and hold 82 of the 601 seats in parliament, enough to secure a victory for

the Maoists. Party leaders are reported to be in talks about forming a coalition government, although no deal has yet been done.

"We have asked the Madhesi parties to vote for us in the next election to end the stalemate," Maoist chief whip Post Bahadur Bogati told AFP.

Pakistan races to protect two towns from surging floods

Pakistani authorities were racing to protect two southern towns and their 360,000 residents from surging floods, as the nation struggles to cope with its worst natural disaster in living memory.

A month-and-a-half after monsoons caused devastating floods throughout the country, submerging an area the size of England, eight million people remain dependent on handouts for their survival, which many say are too slow coming.

Advancing floodwaters continue to threaten towns in Sindh province, where 19 of its 23 districts have been deluged, displacing more than 2.8 million people, according to provincial authorities.

"The situation is a bit serious in Johi town and Dadu. We are taking all-out measures to save them from ravaging floodwaters," provincial irrigation minister Jam Saifullah Dharejo told AFP.

Nato eyes 2,000 extra troops for Afghanistan

Nato may send 2,000 extra troops to Afghanistan, mainly to train Afghan security forces, following a request from war commander David Petraeus, a Nato official said yesterday.

The mission, which would include 750 trainers for Afghan forces, is in addition to the troop surge strategy, said the official, who requested anonymity.

"There is now a discussion under way for additional resources, principally trainers, that could be sent to Afghanistan to bolster the mission," he said.

The US general's request was relayed to the transatlantic alliance's 28 members and it is up to individual governments to decide on whether to make contributions, the official said.

"That discussion will play out over the coming weeks and months and will be led by Nato's military authorities," he said, adding that a CNN television report that the troops

could leave in the coming weeks was "not realistic." The war is nearing the end of its ninth year, with international troops at almost full strength of 150,000, from the United States and Nato.

The deployments include 30,000 US troops ordered up by President Barack Obama last December as part of a new counter-insurgency strategy aimed at speeding an end to the

Indian warship foils Somali pirate attack

An Indian warship on Sunday foiled an attempt by Somalian pirates to hijack merchant vessels off Somalia's coast in the Gulf of Aden, a navy spokesman saidyesterday.

PVS Satish said marine commandos on board the destroyerclass warship boarded a highspeed boat after it tried to close in on 12 merchant vessels including an Indian ship in the piracyinfested waters.

The vessel deployed in the Gulf of Eden on an anti-piracy mission since July was escorting the flotilla when the rogue boat was spotted some 180 kilometres (112 miles) off the Somalian coast, Satish said.

"A cache of arms and several fuel drums and ship boarding equipment were found," the spokesman said in a statement issued from New Delhi, adding that seven Somalians and a Yemeni national on board the boatwere disarmed.

"This is the 16th piracy attack that has been prevented and not a single ship under escort of pirates," the statement added.

Indian cop hostages AFP, Patna

Maoists free

Maoist rebels in eastern India yesterday released three policemen held hostage, three days after the guerrillas killed another abducted officer, officials said. The four men were taken

captive in the state of Bihar on August 29 during a Maoist raid on security forces that left 10 policemen dead. "I can confirm the release of

the three abducted policemen early this morning," additional director general of Bihar police PKThakurtoldAFP.

Bihar state chief minister Nitish Kumar, who came under severe criticism for his handling of the hostage drama, told reporters: "Finally it is over now and we are happy for that."

He denied any deals had been done with the rebels.

Celebrations broke out in the officers' home villages, with residents distributing sweets, setting off fire crackers and offering prayers of thanks.

"We were blindfolded early today and made to walk through hills and forests and finally they released us," one of the officers told reporters.

Graft, threats of violence cloud Afghan vote Those dates depend on the number of com-

Taliban threats, shuttered polling centres and warnings of widespread fraud are clouding hopes for Afghanistan's September 18 parliamentary election, a key test of an already fragile democracy, observers have warned.

With the poll less than two weeks away, the **UN-backed Electoral Complaints Commission** said it has already received 1,503 complaints, ranging from public resources being given to preferred candidates to interference by government officials.

Early signs for a smooth and fair process are not promising.

"Things are getting worse. Many (politicians) are just after making themselves rich and working for their own interests," said Azizullah, a 32-year-old Kabul civil servant.

"I do not want to vote, because I have lost my trust in the government, parliament and election under the current situation," he said.

The election is a litmus test of stability in Afghanistan before US President Barack Obama conducts a war strategy review in December that will examine the pace and scale of US troop withdrawals from July 2011.

Graft and cronyism are major concerns ahead of the vote after last year's fraud-marred presidential election in which a third of the votes for President Hamid Karzai were tossed out as fake.

According to the government-appointed Independent Election Commission, preliminary results should be available four days after the vote but final results may not be out until October 31.
