



From this year onward, NCCB (NCCB) and Bengal Foundation jointly and Bengal Foundation will jointly confer this award every year," said the President of NCCB.

> "The role of art, literature and culture in creating universal brotherhood is undeniable. Bengal Foundation has been working to achieve this goal for the last two decades. We are setting up an art museum with separate galleries for art and photography on a 40-acre land located in Savar," said Abul Khair.

Welcoming the award winners and organisers, Dr Shamsuzzaman Khan said, "This effort will enrich our long standing heritage. We should also consider introducing courses on cultural studies, folklore, ethnology etc at educational institutes, so that we can learn more about our identity."

Terming the arrangement as "exceptional and extensive," Nurul Islam Nahid said, "Inviting ministers as chief guests to such programme has become a tradition. We

should change this custom. I think, experts should deliver speeches while I sit in the audience, as I would like to know more."

Later, the guests handed over Taka 50,000 along with a crest and a certificate to each of the four award winners.

This year Kamal Chandra Sarkar of Jhenidah; Shilpi Rani Biswas of Narayanganj; Ratan Chandra Das of Dhaka and Kartik Bashak of Tangail received awards for their respective contributions towards crafts like local musical instruments (banshi), chikonkari (needlework), leather goods and handloom. Fortyseven artisans involved in twenty-six crafts have been honoured so far.

The organisers also arranged a crafts fair and exhibition at Nalini Kanto Bhattashali Hall of National Museum where 42 artisans from across the country are displaying their crafts.

The Education Minister with other dignitaries inaugurated the fair after the award giving ceremony. The fair will remain open from 10 am to 5:30 pm everyday till September 22.

Dev Patel, of "Slumdog Millionaire" fame, recently called Hollywood racist. But Anil Kapoor, his co-star in the film, definitely doesn't feel so. Not only does he say that they are the epitome of equality, but he also claims that being cast as the president of a fictional Middle Eastern country modelled on Iran in the TV show "24" did not feel demeaning in anyway.

Says Kapoor, "I have worked all over the world, and I have never seen this kind of equality when it comes to being offered roles. I have never felt like I have been typecast. They treat everyone equally. If you are talented, can draw people, deliver the quality of work and bring in the money, they will accept you even if you are from Timbuktu." He also adds that Patel's statement was highly misconstrued. "I know Dev too well, and he

could never have said something like that." The actor, who is currently concentrating on being a producer, recently announced his plans to step into TV programming. When

asked if he was nervous about the telecast of "24", he laughs, "I am always excited, but not nervous. I am anxious to see everyone's reactions. The appreciation I have received internationally has cushioned me."

Kapoor, who was catapulted to global fame after Danny Boyle's Oscar-winning film, "Slumdog Millionaire", was picked up to play President Omar Hassan last year.

Kapoor claims that his character in the TV show allows him to showcase a wide array of emotions. "It's a grey character; a liberal man who works hard to make it to the top. And during his journey to the UN to sign a peace treaty, he slowly loses everyone's trust. I was told that the vulnerability that I brought to the character is not something that can be taught in film school. How can these same people typecast anyone?"

Ban on Satyajit Ray film lifted

India has finally lifted the ban on a documentary film made on the Himalayan state of Sikkim by the legendary director Satyajit Ray, his family said.

The film was banned after Sikkim merged with India in

It was made 40 years ago when Sikkim was an independent kingdom -- Sikkim's last ruler Palden Thondup Namgyal commissioned the film to woo tourists. Ray died in April 1992 after receiving an Oscar for

lifetime achievement. His son, Sandip Ray, also a filmmaker, told the BBC that

he was delighted that the ban on the documentary -- called "Sikkim" -- had been lifted. "I hope the documentary is screened soon," he said.

"I have fond memories of the shooting in different seasons, going up and down the hills with the equipment and staying in the royal palace.

"My father was a great friend of the king's American wife Hope Cooke and she was instrumental in getting him involved." When the film was completed, the king and his wife were

reportedly furious -- especially over a shot that showed poor people scrambling for leftover food behind the royal palace in the capital, Gangtok.

"My father was asked to drop some shots and redo the final product," said Sandip Ray. "He did that but the situation changed."

By the time the final cut emerged, Sikkim had been merged with India in 1975.

Unsure how the people of Sikkim would react to the controversial shots in the film, the Indian government decided to ban "Sikkim".

"Except for a private screening by my father, the film has not been seen by anybody else," Ray said.

The two existing copies of the film are in the US and the British Film Institute.

It is not yet clear when the first screening of "Sikkim" will be held, but an official said it could take a few months.

Satyajit Ray was one of the greatest Indian filmmakers. "Sikkim" is believed to be a personal favourite of actor Sir Richard Attenborough, who made it available for the Academy of Motion Pictures, Arts

and Sciences in 2003 for preservation and restoration.
