If you are planning to go to the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur next month to watch the one-day series between Bangladesh and New Zealand, you better book your tickets early.

It is very apparent now that a very small number of spectators can watch the matches from the stands during the five-match series, as the Mirpur venue cannot hold even half of its 26,000capacity.

The "Home of Cricket" is now under construction for the 2011 World Cup as six out of eight matches including two quarterfinals will be take place at this venue. The pace of the work has caused the seating arrangement to

be incomplete, forcing the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) to print a maximum of 10,000 tickets for each match, of which almost two to three thousand will be complimentary tickets, leaving at best 6,000-7,000 seats for the general public. New Zealand will arrive in Dhaka on September 28 to play five

one-day internationals against the Tigers at Mirpur. The first match will be held on October 5 while the subsequent matches are scheduled for October 8, 11, 14 and 17 respectively. "For the greater interest, we have to accept some difficulties

for the coming series. Within a very short time we will get a guideline from the local organising committee (LOC) about the capacity for the series," said BCB's director and tour organising secretary Gazi Ashraf Hossain. "But the number will not be more than 10,000. From them we are not sure how much we can offer for sale as we have to print an

estimated number of complementary tickets also," said Ashraf, adding that BCB's ticket and seating committee will make the deal for the ticket sponsor within 2-3 days. The board has to use the manual scoreboard as there is no chance for the electronic one to be installed by the time of the

series, while there is hardly any chance to see the giant screen also being set up. Sources have said that the progress of the renovation work was not satisfactory and it will be further delayed as Gazi Ashraf informed that the development work will be stopped on match

"We should stop the development work on match days and

there is no other choice," said Ashraf. Though the tour organising secretary said that they were waiting for guidelines from the LOC, the host tournament director Ali Ahsan Babu could not give a clear picture of the progress of the development work.

"It's very difficult to say right now about the percentage of work that has been completed so far," said Babu.

"For the New Zealand series, the capacity will be more or less 10,000 but it is not confirmed yet. As far as I know, everything is going according to plan. We are hopeful that the floodlights will be installed by next month and all the other things will be also done according to the schedule," said Babu.

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Pakistan draw level Series decider at Rose Bowl today

to play Monday's match and Wednesday's fifth and final one-day international at Hampshire's Rose Bowl despite their "strong misgivings" because of their "responsibilities to the game of cricket". The opening batsman's mood would not

have been improved by the way England, chasing 266, to win, lost a trio of wickets for 14 runs to slump from the commanding position of 113 without loss to 127 for three.

Fast bowler Umar Gul, one of the world's best under floodlights, took four for 32 in 8.1 overs

Imran complains of 'double standards'

Pakistani sporting hero Imran Khan brushed aside calls to ban his nation from international cricket until corruption allegations are investigated, saying a country cannot be punished collectively.

Former England captains Ian Botham and Michael Vaughan have demanded Pakistan are kicked out of international cricket until a probe into their cricketers has been completed. Their calls follow allegations of spot-fixing

against Pakistani cricketers during their ongoing tour of England, which triggered a war of words between cricket officials from the two countries. Former Pakistan cricket captain Imran said

a country cannot be thrown out on the basis of allegations. "In any form of illegal activity you cannot give

collective punishment to a country and deprive millions of fans, more so because these are still allegations yet to be proven," Imran told AFP.

Pakistani cricket has been embroiled in the spot-fixing scandal since last month's News of the World report in which the British newspaper claimed several players took money to underperform during the Lord's Test

Test captain Salman Butt and bowlers Mohammad Asif and Mohammad Aamer were provisionally suspended by the International Cricket Council (ICC) earlier this month as British police interviewed the players.

prosecutors are deciding whether to press charges. Imran said the only evidence comes from a

The police completed an initial report and

newspaper report and its footage.

"The only evidence is that of News of the World footage showing someone [alleged bookie Mazhar Majeed] with money to be given to the players, and on that basis you cannot punish a country," said Imran, who played 88 Tests and 175 one-day matches for Pakistan. He said the whole issue should be handled

with common sense and urged all parties to refrain from making "inappropriate statements", referring to comments made by Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) chairman Ijaz Butt.

Butt accused England players of matchfixing in the third one-dayer across London at The Oval on Friday.

"Butt was wrong in levelling allegations," said Imran, who now heads his own political party -- Tehrik-e-Insaaf [Movement for Justice]. "Even if any other team is involved that does

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Badminton meet now elsewhere

Gym still in the dark

Bangladesh Badminton Federation were forced to shift its Summer Open tournament to the Mirpur Indoor Stadium from the newly-build Wooden Floor Gymnasium, which is in dark for two-and-a-half months following the disconnection of electricity.

The National Sports Council (NSC) had earlier promised the badminton and table tennis federations to re-establish the power before the Eid-ul-Fitr holidays, but the fact is that the sports regulatory body is yet to make anything of it. The electricity was taken away by DESA for unpaid bills worth Tk 4.69 lakh.

The offices of both federations are being operated by the temporary electricity line brought from the volleyball stadium adjacent to the gymnasium.

"The authorities have been saying time and again that it will be reconnected immediately, but at the moment I have nothing to say about it," said BBF joint secretary Jahidul Haq Kochi, adding that they took the Summer Open to the Sohrawardi Indoor Stadium and it will get underway on September 28. He also informed that they also have plans to shift the Second

Division League to another venue.

However, the table tennis federation is going to arrange the Dhaka Metropolis Table Tennis League from October 2 at the gymnasium and it will cost them an extra Tk 60,000 for renting the bulbs, light-stands and wire.

"We first wanted the allotment of the venue at Physical College but they did not respond to our appeal. We have been SEE PAGE 18 COL 5
