When Dr Reza Khan looks at nature, he goes for the miniscule detail. Even, with his one eye impaired, he can pick a camouflaged spider that looks like a scorpion from the hillside. He has an enormous interest in nature and its wildlife.

So, when Dr Khan goes for a checklist of wildlife, it certainly becomes an asset for the country. This is what he did when he introduced yesterday his book titled "Wildlife of Bangladesh A Checklist" for 1,042 animals in four categories -- 42 species of amphibians or toads and frogs, 157 species of reptiles, 718 species of birds and 125 species of mammals.

And he has put Bangla names for each living creature in the checklist. Now that is an enormous job done by this eminent zoologist Dr Reza Khan.

For the first time, the book with photographs of the wildlife and zoological and English or common names of the animals has reported three birds and animals, which are found in the country.

The newly recorded birds and animals are---Kankrabhook Bang (crab-eating frog), Chhoto Bhua Daini Badur/Chhoto Daini Chamchika (megaderma spasma) and Radir Pata Futki (Phylloscopus schwarzi Radde's Warbler).

Unwrapping the book at a function at the National Press Club auditorium in the city,

Encourage posts the challenged

Rights body urges EC

National Alliance of Disabled People's Organisation (NADPO) demanded of the Election Commission to take steps to create positions for the persons with disabilities in the political parties

for ensuring their participation in politics of Bangladesh.

The organisation made the demand when NADPO leaders called on Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) ATM Shamsul Huda at latter's office in the city yesterday.

It placed a 13-point demand to ensure rights of persons with disabilities.

Election Commission (EC) has to deal with political parties carefully as the parties consider the EC obstacle for them, said Shamsul Huda in response to the demand. Terming the demand "sensitive," the CEC said the politi-

cal parties run their activities freely after the liberation war but they are now brought under a framework.

Other demands include challenged persons friendly polling centres, inclusion of detailed information in voter ID cards, providing orientation to local EC officials on disability and provision to allow the challenged to enter polling centres with their preferred persons.

ATM Shamsul Huda said the EC will consider the demand and fulfill as much as possible.

Election Commissioner Shakhawat Hossain, President Md Abdur Sattar Dulal and Secretary General Jahangir Alam of NADPO, among others, were present.

Persons with disability represent about 10 percent of the total population. Of them, around 80 lakh have the voting rights in the country.

Huge pirated books seized, 9 held STAFF CORRESPONDENT

An anti-piracy taskforce seized over 4,000 copies of pirated foreign books worth around Tk 30 lakh from two Kalabagan binding houses in the city yesterday.

Member Secretary Manzurur Rahman of the taskforce, which was created by the ministry of cultural affairs, led the drive and arrested nine employees -- six of Shatata Book Binders and three of Shimu Book Binders -- for doing the

illicit business. The owners of the binding houses at Free School Street were absent during the drive, and two cases were filed with the Kalabagan Police

Station. Manzurur said the seized books on medical and commerce education had been printed

elsewhere, and are worth over Tk 30 lakh.

Also a registrar of copyright, Manzurur, said the yesterday's drive was part of their regular drive against pirated books and compact discs (CD).

On Tuesday, the taskforce seized around 1,000 pirated albums and non-brand illegal CDs including pornographies from some shops at Mirpur-1 Cooperative Market.

They also conducted the anti-piracy drive at Banglabazar and other places before Ramadan, said Manzurur, adding the drive will be on as piracy of books tarnish the image of the country abroad.

Members of Rapid Action Battalion and Kalabagan Police Station accompanied the taskforce.

DU cancels admission of 12 students
