Iran put 6 past hosts

yesterday. Neighboring India, however, kept their hopes of moving to the second qualifying round alive with a 2-0 win over Jordan in the

day's first match. With two rounds of matches being played in the group, Iran top the points table with maximum six points, three ahead of both Jordan and India. Hosts Bangladesh have zero points from two outings. Iran only need a draw in their last match against Jordan on Friday to qualify for the second round.

In the second match, Seyedeh Tanin Naraghi struck a hattrick while Sahra Ghanbair scored twice and Farhadikhah Parvin netted once for Iran to shove the hosts to concede 12 goals from their two matches.

The margin of defeat for Bangladesh though gives a false impression when considering the fact that they kept their opponents at bay for most of the first half before conceding one at the stroke of half.

On the contrary, Bangladesh might have gone ahead in the sixth minute had a goal by Mirana not been disallowed for off-side and then Iranian goalkeeper Yektaei made a goalline clearance from a Sabina Khatun drive minutes later.

In the first match, hammered by 4-2 in their first match against Iran, India bounced back strongly with a speedy show in front of some fifteen hundred spectators as striking duo Rina Roy and Jabamani Soren struck one goal apiece before the lemon break.

India and Jordan are now equal on three points, both teams have a game in hand.

It was a must-win game for India and they adopted an attacking strategy from the beginning. Despite facing some tough challenge from early in the match Jordan, who outplayed hosts Bangladesh 6-1 in their opener, India took the lead in the 20th minute.

India might have got on to the scoresheet earlier when but defender Ayah Faisal Ayed made a last-ditch save. On the other hand, Jordanian forward Shahnaz Yaseen, who was well guarded throughout the game following her hattrick against Bangladesh, nearly gave
