Efficient management vital to ensure health services

WHO Regional Director tells consultation meeting

Efficient coordination and management for community clinics are important to ensure health services using the Primary Health Care approach, said South East Asia Regional Director of World Health Organisation (WHO) Dr Samlee Plianbangchang.

At the inaugural session of a three day long regional consultation meeting on 'Primary Health Care (PHC) Approach in Emergencies' held at a local hotel in the capital yesterday, he applauded the government's Community Clinic programme that aims to take primary health care to the doorstep of people.

At the same time he talked on PHC approach in emergencies that includes

universal equity, community participation, intersectional collaboration and use of appropriate technology.

Drawing the example of cyclone Sidr that hit Bangladesh in 2008, he said it led to an estimated 10,000 deaths. The number of people affected was about 2 million and 600,000 people had to be evacuated. The losses were estimated at about \$1.7 billion.

So, 'cost effective' emergency management efforts should be strengthened by adopting Primary Health Care approach, he added.

Seeking WHO's support to run the community clinics effectively, health secretary Prof Dr Syed Modasser Ali as the chief guest said all the community health care providers would be recruited from the community.

"The community health care providers should be female so that they can provide ante natal and post natal service to the mothers and can assist the mothers in safe delivery referring to the nearby healthcare centres," he said.

Pointing to the media criticism on his speech on community health care provider recruitment in Gopalganj, the adviser said that media should not focus on individual word. They have to understand the philosophy of the speech.

Prof Dr Moazzem Hossain, director, disease control, Humayun Kabir, secretary of health ministry, Prof Dr Shah Monir Hossain, director general of the Directorate General of Health Services were present at the meeting.

Undisclosed Tk 923 crore invested last fiscal

Finance minister tells JS

A total of Tk 923 crore undisclosed money was legalised last fiscal 2009-'10 through investing in share market, setting up new industries and fixing, modernisation and renovation of old industries, Finance Minister AMA Muhith told the House yesterday.

In scripted answers to lawmakers' queries, the minister said there were scopes for legalising undisclosed money by investing them in

four sectors. But no investment was made in one of the four sectors -- purchasing flats or houses, he said

The finance minister said a process is underway to formulate a policy to award tax cards to top ten tax payers in each category of individual and company.

On finalising the policy, names of ten indi-

viduals and ten companies who will give highest amount of tax will be published and they will be awarded tax cards from the current fiscal, Muhith said. Explaining the existing provision to encour-

age highest tax payers, he said top three tax payers are given awards in district/city corporation levels.

He said two individuals who are paying tax for long time are

also awarded in district/city corporations. So, no separate lists of highest tax payers in both individual and company are prepared at present in national level.

On behalf of the finance minister, who is now in USA, Information

Minister Abul Kalam Azad replied to the lawmakers' supplementary queries in parliament.

SQ Chowdhury criticises war crimes trial

BNP Standing Committee Member Salahuddin Quader Chowdhury here at a press conference yesterday evening demanded to bring back those 195 Pakistan soldiers and identified war criminals who were released in accordance with Delhi Agreement violating the constitution for trial in 1973.

He also demanded trial of Dr Kamal Hossain, the then foreign minister of Bangladesh, who signed in the agreement and also of the people who helped the then Pakistan government as auxiliary force by doing job during the nine months in 1971.

"Try them first and then take decision about others," said SQ Chowdhury who is one of the suspects against whom allegation of crimes against humanity during the Liberation War has long been raised.

Chowdhury arranged the press conference at his Good's Hills residence in the city's Rahmatganj area at around 8.30pm.

Unicef chief Mass transport planned on Rajuk bose Gazipur-Sadarghat route The government is also working on another

The government is working on developing a mass transport system with specialised rapid bus service facility stretching from Gazipur to Sadarghat.

Asian Development Bank (ADB) and World Bank will finance the project, officials said yesterday.

The disclosure came at a workshop organised by Roads and Highways Department (RHD) at a city hotel to discuss the inception report on a pilot project to develop Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) line between Tongi and Gazipur.

BRT is an articulated, comfortable and rapid bus service that runs on a dedicated lane of the existing roads.

The RHD will start implementation of the 18-kilometre Tongi-Joydevpur BRT project by 2012 and complete it by the end of the following year mainly with finance from ADB, said Md Aminur Rahman, project director of Greater Dhaka Sustainable Urban Transport Corridor Project (GDSTC).

BRT (line-3) from Uttara to Sadarghat. SM Salehuddin, additional executive direc-

tor of Dhaka Transport Coordination Board, told The Daily Star the pre-feasibility of the BRT-3 is done and it will be implemented with finance from the World Bank.

"Consultant and project director of the Uttara-Sadarghat BRT have been appointed,' said Salehuddin. Syed Abul Hossain, communications min-

ister, present at the workshop as chief guest said the government is set to sign the concession agreement with the private investor of Dhaka Elevated Expressway (DEE) this December and start the construction work by early next year.

The Tongi-Joydevpur BRT will be a pilot project out of six routes identified by the consultant of GDSTC on the fringe of Dhaka city. The ADB has allocated one million US dol-

lars under Project Preparatory Technical Assistance to identify the best suitable routes for BRT, officials said.

Check population boom: Hasan

State Minister for Environment and Forests Dr Hasan Mahmud yesterday stressed the need for taking integrated steps to check population boom to protect the ecosystem as well as face adverse impacts of the climate change.

"Users of the natural resources are increasing fast day by day, but the resources are not increasing.... This is the big challenge for the planet as well as challenge for the people," he said.

He was addressing a National Inception Workshop on 'Bangladesh environment and climate change outlook' at the LGED auditorium in the city.

The Department of Environment (DoE) with the support from United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) organised the workshop. Environment and Forests Secretary Dr Mihir Kanti

Majumdar, UNEP experts for Asia and Pacific Mujaharul Alam and Tunnie Srisakulchairak and ECCO project director Solaiman Haider spoke at the workshop with DoE Director General Monwar Islam in the chair. Dr Hasan said the rapid growth of urbanisation will be a great

threat to the country's ecosystem as the urban population will be double within next 15-20 years. "Urban population is degrading the ecosystem. The rapid

urbanisation of few cities in developing countries is against the environment," he said. About the vulnerability of the country, he said Bangladesh is

not only vulnerable but the most vulnerable country to climate change," he said. Referring to initiatives to face the climate challenge, Dr

Hasan said the government has already undertaken various actions to face the challenges posed by the changing cli-

He said the government will give more emphasis on checking population growth in preparing the 'Bangladesh Environment and Climate Change Outlook' for saving the natural resources as well as protecting ecosystem.

TAX EVASION CASE Hearing on charge framing against Sayedee on Oct 30

A Dhaka court yesterday fixed October 30 for hearing on charge framing against Jamaat-e-Islami's Nayeb-e-Ameer Delwar Hossain Sayedee in connection with a tax evasion case. The same court asked

Jamaat leader Mir Kashem Ali to appear before it the same day in a similar case. Judge (In-charge)

Mohammad Ismail Hossain of

the Senior Special Judge's Court passed the orders. The National Board of Revenue (NBR) filed the case

against Sayedee for evading incometaxon August 19 this year In the case statement, Masuma Khatun, deputy tax commissioner of NBR, said

Sayedee, former Jamaat lawmaker, evaded Tk 56.45 lakh as income tax from 2005-06 fiscal year to 2009-10 fiscal year and provided false information repeatedly to misguide the NBR.

Earlier, on September 16, Sayedee was shown arrested in connection with the case, as he had already been in jail from June 29 in a case filed for hurting religious sentiment of Muslims.

Rajuk boss, 6 top officials standing STAFF CORRESPONDENT

A High Court bench yesterday kept seven government high officials including the Rajuk chairman and Kushtia deputy commissioner (DC) standing before it for defying its orders. Kushtia DC Abdul Mannan

was kept standing on the court's dock from 11:00am to 4:00pm, with an hour's lunch break, for violating its order asking to stop sand extraction from river Gorain in the district. The HC bench of Justice AHM

Shamsuddin Chowdhury Manik and Justice Sheikh Md Zakir Hossain kept him and other officials standing. The court also asked

Mannan to appear before it this morning (Wednesday) in connection with the contempt of court petition filed by one Anwarul Haque Masum, a contractor in the district.

During Mannan's fivehour-long standing at the dock, the court kept him just there without allowing him to talk while it heard the other cases.

Apart from the DC of Kustia, the contemner officials are Rajuk Chairman Md Nurul Huda, Dhaka Medical College Hospital Director Brig Gen Shahidul Haque Mallik, its Director Khizir Ahmed and Deputy Director Khalilur Rahman, Director General of the Directorate General of Health Service (DGHS) Shah Monir Hossain and Senior Assistant Secretary to the Ministry of Health and Family

However the court exempted them, as they offered "unconditional apologies" to it, and promised through their counsels not to ignore its orders in future.

3 criminals using DB

Detective Branch personnel yesterday arrested three men who used to cheat people with fake DB identities, handcuffs and police sticker at South Sayadabad in the city.

The criminals -- Motaleb Hossain alias Don, 37, Enamul Huq alias Enam, 46, and Jasim Uddin, 45 -- used to make fraud arrests of businessmen in disguise of detective police and realise money from them.

At a DB office press briefing, officials said the criminals, arrested with a microbus, managed the handcuffs from the city's Polwell Market where police equipment and uniform are available for sale.

DB (south) Deputy Commissioner Monirul Islam said several criminal gangs at Sayadabad are doing the same crime, and detectives are trying to arrest the other gangs active in the city.

3 muggers hurt in gunfights with Rab, police

Three alleged muggers sustained bullet wounds in two separate gunfights between law enforcers and criminals in the capital's Agargaon and Gendaria early yesterday.

Sumon, 22, and Jamal Hossain, 24, received bullets in a gun battle with the members of Rapid Action Battalion (Rab-2) at Agargaon while Faisal, 23, was bullet wounded in another gunfight with Gendaria police.

A team of plainclothes Rab men challenged a gang of five muggers for their suspicious movement at Agargaon at about 12:45am, Rab said. Sensing presence of the law enforcers, the criminals opened

fire on Rab members forcing them to retaliate with gunshots that left Sumon and Jamal bullet injured in their legs. Three other criminals of the gang, however, managed to flee during the fight. Two firearms were recovered from the

Suman and Jamal were admitted to Pongu Hospital. Faisal was fleeing after snatching valuables from a pedestrian at gunpoint near Gendaria graveyard around 4:00am, police said.

When the victim cried out for help, police chased Faisal. At one stage, he opened fire at the law enforcers forcing them to retaliate. Faisal received bullet wound in his leg, police added. He was admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

The court fixed October 14 for hearing the matter. Barrister Sara Hossain and Advocate Taufiqul Islam appeared Samorendro Biswas stood for the government.
