The government should provide IT training to the rural women, particularly working in the agriculture sector, a former caretaker government adviser said yesterday.

"They should get opportunities so they can make their own fortune," said Rokia Afzal Rahman.

She was speaking at a certificate giving ceremony of 'Beautification and Beauty Parlour Management' Centre in Dhaka.

Managing Director of SME Foundation Syed Rezwanul Kabir presided over the event, while its Chairman Aftab ul Islam and Deputy General Manager Nurul Quadir and Persona Managing Director Kaniz Almas Khan also spoke.

Rokia said: "With the training, these women now will be able to set up beauty parlours at their village homes and earn Tk 5,000 to Tk 10,000 a month."

"We hope they now know how to man-

age beauty parlour business efficiently."

The BFWE president thanked the SME Foundation, Thengamara Mohila Sabuj Sangha (TMSS), a microcredit organisation, and Persona for extending their support to the training programme.

SME Foundation provided daily allowances and tool kits for the trainees from Bogra, Joypurhat, Gaibandha and Dhaka districts, while TMSS arranged accommodation and Persona offered training free of cost.

Rokia called upon the trainees to work training course at Spectra Convention hard to become successful entrepreneurs. "Kaniz Almas started with only Tk 2 lakh, but now she is a successful entrepreneur."

Aftab ul Islam said easy credit with low interest rates should be made available for such trainees to help them succeed in their career.

"There should be allocation for the beauty parlour sector in the national budget, as it is generating jobs for women. Besides, a minimal duty should be imposed on imported equipment and tools used in the sector." Islam, also the president of American

India boasts billionaires: Forbes

Tycoon Mukesh Ambani kept his title of richest Indian as the fast-growing economy minted 17 new billionaires in 2010, driving the total to a record 69, according to a Forbes rich listThursday.

Ambani, chairman of India's biggest private sector firm Reliance Industries, retained his top slot as the wealthiest Indian for a third consecutive year with a net worth of 27 billion dollars, Forbes India magazine said.

Ambani was closely followed by London-based steel magnate Lakshmi Mittal, at 26.1 billion dollars.

The record number of billionaires "is yet another clear signal the centre of gravity will increasingly shift to India and China over the next decade," said Indrajit Gupta, editor of Forbes India.

Indian entrepreneurs are displaying "their ability to harness the unprecedented wealth creation opportunities that exist in this part of the world," Gupta said.

Workshop suggests more revenue income for local government

A suggestion came from a workshop in Dhaka yesterday that taxes on mobile phone towers, rural electric poles and auto-rickshaws could be lucrative sources of income for the local government.

The speakers said such government representatives should brainstorm new, innovative sources of income that can be used to fund local needs.

Held at Bangabandhu International Convention Centre, the workshop on 'union parishad revenue mobilisation' was organised by the Local Government Division in association with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). Many a discussant said taxes should

be fixed fairly and be collected in a way that encourages more people to pay. They also pointed out that the amount of taxes presently collected at the local government level is low compared to international standards.

"Fixing tax and administering its masses should be equitable and fair.

There is a need to make it sure that taxes collected are proportionate to incomes and assets of the local taxpayers, he said. "Besides, it should also be checked whether tax collecting officials are doing their jobs efficiently and awareness so that more people are ethically."

"Once the local government authorities of England levied taxes on house windows," said Professor Simon De-Lay from the University of Birmingham.
