started from home in the afternoon. Living conditions at the athletes' village for the Games has been much criticised by Australia, Canada, New Zealand and Scotland amid other nations, who have termed the conditions as filthy and uninhabitable while also voicing their concern over dengue fever and snake scare. Many of the star players of the participating nations have pulled out of the Games citing health and security concerns taking

off much of the gloss of it. However, as the Games draws nearer to inauguration, things have seen visible improvement and the participating teams have been changing their minds about the hosts. Bangladesh are also extending their support to the host nation saying that the athletes' village is in 'fine condition."

"I have found no problem since arriving here a day before our athletes. All the necessary works at our apartment have been completed to make sure the athletes remain tension free during the Games" villages for the Delhi said general manager of Bangladesh Commonwealth Games as contingent Jobair Rahman Rana.

Rana though informed that he faced a bit of trouble which however was nothing compared to that of Indian shooters who had to wait for six hours before checking in.

"Our athletes are in fine condition and they have practised well today (Thursday) as there are good separate practice facilities for boxers, weightlifters, athletes, swimmers inside the Games village," said Rana adding that the condition of the games villages is far better compared to the conditions of the athletes' camp back in Bangladesh.

The seventh and eighth floors of a nine-storeyed building have been allotted for the Bangladesh athletes and officials while other South Asian participants Pakistan and Sri Lanka are also staying in the same building.

Earlier on Wednesday night, the Bangladesh contingent comprising shooters, archers, swimmers, weight-

lifters, boxers and athletes were welcomed by the officials of Delhi's Bangladesh High Commission at the Indira Gandhi International Airport after being greeted by the organisers at their arrival.

Before leaving for India, swimmer Shahjahan Ali Rony exclaimed he was not concerned about either dengue or snakes while weightlifter Fahima Akhter Moina said that they were used to such environment in Bangladesh and hoped would not face any problem in the village.

"I have heard about the issues raised by different nations, but it's not bothering me. I am fully concerned with my game," said archer Emdadul Haque Milon.

The official flag of Bangladesh at the Games village was officially hoisted yesterday in a festive mood as the national anthem was played. As souvenir of the journey of the Queen's Baton Relay 2010 Delhi, replicas of the baton were presented to the contingent.

Students from various city schools were earlier given an opportunity to visit the Games Village along with their teachers where they performed in front of the delegates from different nations.

Delhi still Taylor surrenders to weather not awake

Kiwis desperate for practice game

The Bangladesh bowlers certainly know how good Ross Taylor is. He averages a staggering 96.59 against them,

including a century that came in Chittagong during New Zealand's last visit to Bangladesh two years ago.

In fact, that was his last ODI hundred, though he's averaged more than 42 this year with four fifties. The Black Caps vicecaptain said it himself yesterday after practice at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

"I scored a hundred in Chittagong last time and that was my last hundred in oneday cricket," he said while talking to the reporters. "I still feel in good nick. I'm energised obviously, and I can churn out

some runs," added Taylor, who recently played in the Champions League Twenty20 for the Bangalore Royal Challengers.

But while the tournament in South Africa had very little downtime, Taylor and his Kiwi teammates have already sat out the first practice match here and can expect the same fate for their second practice game at the BKSP.

"It is not likely that we will play a practice game before the one-day series," he admitted. According to sources, if there is another spell of rain, the October 3 game against the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) XI will be called off. The New Zealand team have requested for a practice game and centre wicket practice in Mirpur after they were told that the Fatullah venue has no dressing room facilities due to the ongoing construction for the World Cup next year. A warm-up

game in Mirpur, too, seems to be out of the question.

New Zealand are desperate for a game, though Taylor said that they had no control over certain elements. "I guess you can't control the weather. The ground where we were supposed to play (BKSP) is supposedly under water.

"Though the wicket is good, I heard that the outfield is wet. We have no control over such matters, but today (Friday) we had a good training session," said Taylor.

He also had no qualms of playing all five matches in one venue. "We recently played the tri-series in Dambulla so I think its fine. Our gears are all in the dressing room so there's no problem with that," he said.

Taylor reiterated that Bangladesh can be a tough opponent on slow turning

The players' transfer for the 2010-11 football

season made a muted and drab opening at the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) House yesterday, as the new powerhouse of local football Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi Club and old horse Arambagh Krira Sangha only completed the registration of couple of their players.

This season's transfer programme was expected to be such an affair after all the big clubs had completed roping in most of their targeted players, a long time before the official transfers began. But it turned into an even more boring as no clubs took the trouble of bringing in the players to showcase their new recruits at least for the sake of public interest.

The BFF spokesman said they left it to the respective teams with the decision of bringing

their players for the registration process. Khalilur Rahman, the football manager of Sheikh Jamal said they did not want to interrupt the players' ongoing training camp at BKSP

which is why the players did not appear for the registration process.

Most of the attention was centred around the new Dhanmondi powerhouse, and their recruits, most of whom are stars of the national squad.

Sheikh Jamal confirmed registration of 17 of their 24 players for the season, sixteen of whom are with the national fold. Among the star recruits of the are goalkeepr Aminul Haque, defender Wali Faisal, midfielder Mamunul Islam and strikers Enamul Haq and Zahid Hasan Emily.

The seven players yet to be registered are four young players who has been with the club and three Serbian recruits -- Penisic Dragon, Stefanovic Jovan and Sucjovic Alecsandro.

The other club participating on the first day's transfer were Arambagh, who registered seven players out of their squad of 21 including four foreign recruits, three of whom are already with the squad.

The official transfer will last a week for the local footballers and while it will be fifteen days for the foreign brigade.

With the inauguration of the Commonwealth Games knocking right on the door there is lack of enthusiasm amongst the inhabitants of the capital.

On way to the main media center at the Pragati Maidan from the Indira Gandi International Stadium, there are little signs that the capital is going to host the Commonwealth Games. Just the one line of the road, which has been kept reserved for the vehicles carrying the athletes and officials, reminds one that Delhi is going to stage a showcase event a long time after hosting the first-ever Asian Games in 1951 and second time in 1982.

"It is always the case that some people of the city are happy while others are unhappy when a city is going to host a mega event like Commonwealth Games," said Saibal Bose, a journalist who works for Times of India.

The Indian journalist thinks that everything regarding the games were going right and there was hardly any cause for concern.

A Malaysian journalist, who covered the Commonwealth Games in Kuala Lumpur in 1998, said that Malaysia also faced such difficulties while hosting the Games for the first time in Asia, but they recovered from their shoddy conditions within a couple of days of the start.
