Ailing railway drops, delays trips daily

"Two train journeys from Dhaka to Chittagong in July took me two hours more than scheduled in each instance," said a disheartened passenger Sultana Chowdhury, a resident of Baridhara in the

"For the third trip I was bound to choose the bus, although it cost me almost double," she added.

Years of neglect is now taking its toll on the Bangladesh Railway (BR) with 333 trips delayed and 54 cancelled only from Kamlapur Railway Station in June, sources at BR said.

Railway officials attributed the poor punctuality mainly to the appalling condition of locomotives, shortage of locomotive masters (train drivers) and stationmasters. Most of the locomotives are long past their economic lives.

"The condition is so bad that it is simply not possible to deliver punctuality anymore", said Mohammad Shahjahan,

joint director general (operations) of BR. The official informed that the railway

operates 265 trips daily across the country but only 223 engines are in running condition. About 50 percent of these engines are 40 years old.

"The current fleet is too old to show punctuality because they can no longer maintain schedule or speed," he pointed out, adding that frequent breakdowns sometimes push the number of operating engines below 200.

The official added that railway now has 698 posts of locomotive masters and 435 stationmasters vacant, which is more than half of its requirement.

"Sometimes engine is available but there is no driver to run it or there is no stationmaster available to give the goahead," said Shahjahan.

The official explained that train operation involves a diagram of sequencing engines and manpower usage. If one fails to perform, the rest in the same line is also affected.

Experts working on railway however identified negligence and lack of investment by successive governments as the main reasons behind this decline of

railway. They said the ultimate result of neglect is just becoming visible.

"All previous governments mainly focused on the development of road network and did not invest in railway when it was necessary. Now it is just falling apart", said Prof AMM Shafiullah, vice chancellor of Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (BUET).

"It is established beyond doubt that railway is the most efficient mass transport system and because of Bangladesh's geographical layout and dense population, it is especially ideal for us," he noted.

"The main advantage of railway is that it can carry a huge number of passengers and big amount of goods, ten times more than a bus. It cuts down energy demand, pollution and average operational cost," the expert said.

"So it is time for the government to decide prudently on the fate of railway", he added.

BR considers a delay of up to 15 minutes as acceptable in punctuality. In 2009, only 73 percent trains were on time but SEE PAGE 15 COL 8

EXTRA-JUDICIAL KILLING Sundarbans tigers 1 every 3 smallest in world days in last

Claims new study

The Sundarbans tigers may be the smallest tigers in the world, suggests a new study.

The study was carried out by the Sundarbans Tiger Project, a joint initiative between the Bangladesh

Forest Department, Wildlife Trust of Bangladesh (WTB) Zoological Society of London and the University of Minnesota. The research was funded by the United States Fish and

Wildlife Service Tiger and Rhino Fund. There is only one species of tiger but scientists have split this into nine subspecies based on differences in their physical

appearance and genetics, a release of the WTB said yesterday. Tigers from the mangrove forest of the Sundarbans in Bangladesh and India are currently classified under the Bengal tiger sub species along with tigers across India, Nepal and

Bhutan. However, the tigers in the Sundarbans weigh just 76.7 kg, nearly half of the weight of other wild Bengal tigers, which average at 138.2 kg. This is also less than the average weight of tigers from any of the other 8 sub-species, making the Sundarbans

Previously, it was believed that the Sumatran tiger was the smallest with an average weight of 86.7 kg. The reasons for the small size of Sundarbans are not known but the authors of the

tigers probably the smallest in the world.

JMB's Dhaka chief held

The arrestees are Dhaka divisional chief Sharful Islam Likhon alias Rana, ehsar member Sahinul Islam alias Shahinul Alam alias Belal alias Shahin and gayeri ehsar (part-time) member Chainur Rahman.

Acting on an intelligence report, Rab personnel were waiting in Boilapur area and arrested the three around 2:00am, Sohail said. Sharful was made the chief of JMB Dhaka unit after the arrest of their chief Saidur Rahman a few months ago, he added.

Likhon was the Joypurhat district chief of JMB in 2004, he said. Sharful and his two siblings -- Mohammad Rabiul Islam alias Rabi and Jahangir Alam alias Liton -- were awarded life term imprisonment on charge of series bomb blast in Joypurhat on August 17, 2005.

Liton and Rabi are behind bars in Rangpur and Joypurhat, respectively.
