Tigers seek to right wrongs

Bangladesh will have one eye on World Cup preparation while the other will be firmly fixed on erasing the nightmarish experiences of recent losses when they take on

New Zealand in the first one-day of the fivematch series at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur today.

The Tigers will be looking to avenge shock defeats to Ireland and Netherlands in recent months but it will not be an easy task for Mashrafe Bin Mortaza's men, as they will be missing the services of explosive opener Tamim Iqbal. Added to the fact that their middle-order has been struggling for form in the last couple of series, and the Tigers find themselves up

against it at home against the Kiwis.

Shahriar Nafees will be tasked with the unenviable job of replacing Tamim. And the left-hander who returns to one-day cricket after a two and half year hiatus is under no illusions as to the job at hand.

"It's very difficult to replace Tamim right at the moment in the team and what I will try to do is play my natural game. My main target is to establish my place in the team," said Nafees.

Bangladesh coach Jamie Siddons echoed Nafees' sentiment as the Tigers are now faced with the question of who will give them a flying start in the absence of injury victim Tamim.

"We will miss Tamim and it's a big blow. Ash (Mohammad Ashraful) is also out of form. I would have ideally liked to have both of them inform," he said.

The scorching heat, the lack of match practice and even the advantage of the home side's spin bowlers could not deter the spirit of New Zealand skipper Daniel

Vettori as he was confident of winning the five-match one-day series against the Tigers which will start today at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

"It (the heat) is not a problem. I think the guys are used to the sub continent weather," responded Vettori when asked about the present heat wave the country has been experiencing for the last few days.

"Obviously we have come here to win the series. It's a really important series for us with the World Cup in mind. Teams need to find out who their best players are for the World Cup, so we will concentrate on every game," he said explaining their target in the series.

Zealanders failed to play any practice game before the start of the series as rain ruined the scheduled two warm-up matches at BKSP.

Like in their previous trip in 2008, the New

And last time they had to start the series with a defeat which was the first-ever and so far only victory for the Tigers against the Kiwis.

"We could not play practice games last time as well. The conditions were not good enough and the outfield was not conducive. It's really disappointing if it happens in two tours in a row. It's not ideal but it is what it is and we are set to get on with it," said the allrounder, who is a key player in the team.

Bangladesh will definitely be pinning all their hopes on their spinners to repeat their success in New Zealand's last trip but Vettori, whose side got a chance to practice in the central wicket, believes that the pacers will also get help from the surface.

"We played early in the morning the last time we came here and the conditions helped the seamers. I think it will swing around and I think all the bowlers will have their chances in this condition. It's not normally a high scoring ground. So it's going to be difficult for everyone," Vettori observed.

New Zealand will miss the service of players like Jacob Oram, who played a pivotal role last time in his team success but the Kiwi skipper was quite optimistic with the new faces who have come into the team ahead of the World Cup.

"Of course, he (Oram) is very good player. So it's tough without him. I think we have some very good players who can step up into

The price is fixed for gallery at Tk 25 while the price for VIP is Tk 1000, International Gallery Tk 200 and Club House (North and South) Tk 100.







Indian archers Rahul Banerjee and Jayanta Talukdar topped the qualification round with scores of 679 and 676 respectively.

In the qualifying standings of individual compound event, Bangladesh's Abul

Kashem finished 27th in a field of 48 competitors with a score of 681 while Sajjad Hossain, who shifted to the compound event from recurvo bow, scored 653 to finish 40th and Shamsuddin finished last making 504 out of 720. All archers resume their elimination campaign today.

Bangladesh's other gold hope is shooting and the 2002 gold medalist Asif Hossain Khan pairing with Abdullah Hel Baki will compete in the 10m air rifle pair event where India, Australia, England, Singapore and Malaysia are the opponents.

Nevertheless Indian pair Abhinav Bindra and Gagan Narayan will be the main contender in the event and
