#### BDR MUTINY TRIAL Officer tells of torture in confinement

An army officer, also a witness of a BDR mutiny case, yesterday narrated before a special court at Pilkhana how 20 BDR jawans tortured him and confined him along with his family members.

Lt Col Asif Ahmed Rouf, former commander of 24 Rifles Battalion, gave his deposition and placed evidence including mobile phone call list and video footage as BDR special court-7 resumed the trial against 667 border guards of the battalion.

All the defendants were produced before the court headed by BDR Director General Maj Gen Rafiqul Islam.

Asif said when he was released from confinement on February 26 last year, he saw Subeder Major Gofran Mallick, prime accused of the case, talking with Deputy Assistant Directors (DADs) Towhidul Islam, Nasir and Abdur Rahim -- three alleged top planners of the mutiny. This suggests he was one of the planners, he told the court.

He submitted that he saw Gofran leading a group of BDR jawans who were dragging Lt SEE PAGE 15 COL 4

#### Two more suspected militants held in city

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) personnel yesterday arrested two alleged operatives of Pakistan-based militant outfits Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) and Hizbul Mujahideen from the Airport Railway Station area in the capital.

The arrestees are LeT activist Abdul Malek alias Golam Mohammad, 45, of village Indranagar in Kaliganj upazila of Satkhira and his associate, Pakistani citizen Md Shafi alias Shamiullah alias Mostak, 30, a Hizbul Mujahideen operative.

In a press briefing held at the elite force's headquarters, Rab Director General (DG) Mukhlesur Rahman said they had information about the LeT operative trying to enter into a neighbouring country through Bangladesh.

"Malek was coordinating Lashkar activities in Satkhira area in Bangladesh and 24 Parganas in India since 2006, claimed the DG.

Malek in his childhood went to Kolkata where he worked as a labourer. Later he joined LeT in 2000 and moved to Pakistan in 2003, where he **SEE PAGE 15 COL 1**

## 170 duty-dodging Gas venture along border approved

4 wells to be drilled under the project

The Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecnec) yesterday approved a project for digging gas wells to bring down the gap with India in terms of extracting gas near Salda borders.

The Ecnec meeting with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in the chair sanctioned seven projects at a cost of Tk 5,241 crore that include digging gas wells and setting up two new rail-

The PM expressed disappointment over the delay in tabling the proposals in Ecnec meeting whereas gas is available as soon as wells are

dug, said meeting sources.

She directed the officials concerned to present any such projects to Ecnec immediately.

The premier said the whole country including Barisal would be brought under the railway network since it is a low-cost mode of communication. She directed the ministry concerned to put all the abandoned rail tracks into operation.

According to the planning ministry report, Bangladesh has been extracting much less gas than India from the field near Salda borders. From 17 gas wells in the territory, Indian extracts 50 million cubic feet (cft) of gas every day while Bangladesh only 8 million cft from

#### Rajuk, Wasa demolish risky, illegal buildings

An eviction team of Rajdhani Unnayan Kartipakkha (Rajuk) yesterday demolished the illegal portion of a six-storey structure at capital's Madhya Kunipara in Tejgaon industrial area.

Meanwhile, Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) yesterday demolished three buildings constructed illegally on the Katashur canal in Mohammadpur as part of its canal recovery drive. The first two levels of the

six-storey structure were made of concrete whereas the top four floors were made of wooden frame with tin-roof. Executive Magistrate

Rokon-Ud-Dawla, who led the Rajuk drive, said more than 2,000 people of 270 families used to live in the six-storey structure built on an eightkatha plot. Two weeks back, at least 50

people, mostly women and children, fell sick after inhaling toxic fumes emitted from a dyeing factory on the ground floor of the house. Of them, 25 were rushed to local hospitals.

Shafiqul Islam, a Rajuk officer, said, "We started demolishing the top four floors of the house as they were built without approval from the housing authority."

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#### FAMILY VIOLENCE LAW

### 6-month jail for offenders

Parliament yesterday passed a bill making strong provisions to protect women and children from family violence and repression. The legislation styled 'Family Violence (prevention and protec-

tion) Act 2010' authorises the court to hold trial in camera on

consensus of both parties to dispose of cases filed under this law. "A person might be punished with up to six month's jail term and a fine of maximum Tk 10,000 or both for committing

offence," says a provision of the bill. It also says a person, filing false case with ill motives, will face up to one-year jail term and a fine of maximum Tk 50,000 or both.

According to the legislation, family violence means physical and mental torture, sexual harassment and financial loss caused by a person who has family relation with the victim -- woman or child. Interfering in personal freedom, hampering normal move-

ment, communication or expression of personal will or opinion would be considered as mental harassment. State Minister for Women and Children Affairs, Shirin

Sharmin Chowdhury proposed to pass the bill.
