# Injuries taking a toll

Having managed to avoid major mishaps in their opening Euro

2012 qualifiers, the challenge facing Europe's top sides is to sustain their momentum as injuries and other distractions begin

to surface. World and European champions Spain, beaten World Cup finalists the Netherlands, World Cup semifinalists Germany and Italy have all made 100 per cent starts to

their bids to reach Poland and Ukraine in two years' time. Spain kicked off their Group I campaign with a 4-0 thrashing of Liechtenstein,

but they will face Lithuania on Friday without a number of influential players. Barcelona playmaker Xavi heads a list of stars including

Cesc Fabregas, Pedro Rodriguez, Jesus Navas and Fernando Torres, all of whom played in the World Cup final, to have been ruled out by injury. Pablo Hernandez and Aritz

Aduriz of Spanish league leaders Valencia are among the players to have benefited, with coach Vicente del Bosque having drafted them into his squad for the home game in the western city of Salamanca. "Xavi is important to the

team but there are other players who have the calmness and the confidence to do his job," said centre-back for Turkey. I am very, very

Germany, beaten 1-0 by Spain in the World Cup semifinals, have been hit with similar problems.

Influential midfielder Bastian Schweinsteiger has been ruled out of the Group A clash with Turkey in Berlin due to an ankle injury, while skipper Michael Ballack is likely to be out until next year after fracturing his tibia.

"These things happen after a World Cup," coach Joachim Loew told German daily Bild in reference to Schweinsteiger's absence with ligament damage.

"The players have only had a short time to prepare for the next season and the risk of getting injury is of course higher.'

Germany top the pool after a 1-0 win in Belgium and a 6-1 thrashing of Azerbaijan, but Friday's game is likely to take place in a charged atmosphere due to the high number of Turks and people of Turkish descent living in Berlin.

Around 30,000 Turkey supporters are expected at the match, and visiting midfielder Hamit Altintop has fanned the flames by criticising Mesut Ozil's motives for choosing to represent Germany despite having Turkish parents.

"If he had opted for Turkey, he would have not played in the World Cup and would not be at Real Madrid," said Altintop, who was born in Germany and plays for Bayern Munich. "It is that simple.

grateful to Germany. I have learned a lot and been given a lot of chances.

Turkey and my father is from Turkey. I am a Turk."

Another player steeling himself to face a hostile crowd is Italy defender Giorgio Chiellini, whose team take on Northern Ireland at Belfast's notoriously raucousWindsorPark.

Victories against Estonia and the Faroe Islands sent the 2006 world champions top of Group C, but Chiellini is anticipating a sterner test in the

England, who won their opening two matches, are not in action until a home game with Group G co-leaders Montenegro next Tuesday.

### No longer a two-horse race

Real Madrid superstar Cristiano Ronaldo says the Spain's top division is no longer a twohorse race and the club will have to work hard to achieve anything this season.

"Valencia are top of the standings, we don't only have Barca to worry about, so we have to continue working, to continue fighting for the league," he told the Spanish sports newspaper Marca published Thursday.

The Portugal striker scored a double at the weekend which helped his club to a 6-1 win over Deportivo La Coruna, and into third place in the Primera Liga, two points behind Valencia and one ahead of arch-rivals Barcelona.

For the past six seasons, the Spanish league has been won by either Real or Barcelona.

"The goals have given me confidence," said Ronaldo. "When we score and we play well then the confidence grows. I feel better each time, well-prepared to help the team.

"The team showed that it's getting better every time, we are growing and improving in many aspects. We are making a great start to the league."

Ronaldo rejoins his national side on Friday when Portugal faces Denmark in a Euro 2012 qualifier, after missing the two previous The Argentine coach called games through injury.

## N Ireland plot upset

Northern Ireland are plotting another ambush as they seek to add Italy's name to the list of high-profile footballing nations who have been beaten at Windsor Park here on Friday.

In recent years the Northern Irish have Italians. defeated England and Spain in famous victories at the ramshackle stadium, which boasts one of the smallest capacities in international football at just 14,500.

Northern Ireland are hoping their raucous home support can help them deliver another upset on Friday when they take on former world champions Italy in a Euro 2012 Group C clash. However, Northern Ireland captain Aaron

Hughes has warned his team-mates against complacency as they prepare to face an Italy side entering a period of transition following a disastrous World Cup campaign. "At home over the last few years we've had

some really good results," Fulham defender Hughes said on www.fulhamfc.com.

"The England and Spain games will be talked about for years and we beat a lot of good teams that were ranked higher than us at home. "Our home form is strong and we should go into the game with plenty of confidence.

"We beat them at Euro 2008, but on that day they were better than us," admitted Loew.

"This team knows how to move the ball quickly, their football is refined, they have six points, they have confidence and we will have to be at our best to beat them."

Schweinsteiger's place in the midfield is likely to go to Bayern team-mate Toni Kroos, the national coach said in a press conference in Berlin.

The 20-year-old is set to start alongside Real Madrid's Sami Khedira in the heart of the Germany midfield.

Having missed the Euro 2012 qualifiers against Belgium and Azerbaijan with injury, Manchester City defender Jerome Boateng is likely to start on the left side of the German defence with stand-in captain Philipp Lahm on the right.

Bremen defender Per Mertesacker should partner Bayern's Holger Badstuber at centre-back while Mesut Ozil, Lukas Podolski and Thomas Mueller will lead the attack from the midfield.

Bayern striker Miroslav Klose is set to win his 104th cap, which will make him the fourth most capped German of all time and by-passes Franz Beckenbauer's haulof 103.

Turkey coach Guus Hiddink is likely to start with two Bundesliga players in his side: Dortmund midfielder Nuri Sahin and Bayern Munich's

Hamit Altintop. Galatasaray's Arda Turan will sit out the match after suffering a groin injury in training.

## L'pool accept bid

Liverpool's board of directors agreed Wednesday to sell the English football giants to the owner of the Boston Red Sox baseball team, despite fierce opposition from the club's current American

The deal with New England Sports Ventures (NESV) is subject to approval by the Premier League and a legal battle with US owners Tom Hicks and George Gillett, who bought the club three years ago and tried to scupper the latest sale.

"I am delighted that we have been able to successfully conclude the sale process which has been thorough and extensive," Liverpool chairman Martin Broughton said.

The Premier League said it was ready to give its approval by Friday in order to allow the sale to proceed.

NESV promised to clear the club's debts when they take over "to create a long-term financially solid foundation" in a deal believed to be worth 300 million pounds (475 million dollars).

The group said it was "dedicated to ensuring that the club has the resources to build for the future, including the removal of all acquisition debt".

"Our objective is to stabilise the club and ultimately return Liverpool FC to its rightful place in English and European football, successfully competing for and winning trophies," it added in

NESV, headed by John William Henry II and Tom Werner, also pointed to its success in transforming the fortunes of the Red Sox, who have won two World Series since their takeover of the club in 2002.

If confirmed, the deal would signal the end of Hicks and Gillett's turbulent three-year ownership of Liverpool, which remains the most successful club in the history of English football.

The American owners have been the subject of fierce protests from Liverpool fans, who have blamed them for a steady decline in the club's fortunes on the field and failure to deliver on a promised new stadium.

Around 7,000 supporters demonstrated on Sunday before the club suffered a shock home defeat to Blackpool, a new humiliation which sent Liverpool into the relegation zone and confirmed their worst start to a season for 57 years.

New manager Roy Hodgson has had limited

funds available to rebuild a squad which failed to qualify for the Champions League last season, another embarrassing blow for the five-time European champions. Hicks and Gillett were under pressure to sell with an October 15 deadline looming for repay-

ment of the club's 282-million-pound debts with the Royal Bank of Scotland and US holding companyWachovia. Liverpool were put up for sale by the unpopu-

lar US duo in April, who initially sought an asking price of around 800 million pounds, before dropping it to 600 million pounds.
