Bangladesh coach Jamie Siddons stressed on the importance of his batsmen to carry on after getting starts in today's third one-dayer against New Zealand at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

The Tigers lead the 5-match series 1-0 through a fantastic one-man show from Shakib Al Hasan who struck a half-century and picked up four wickets. But Shakib aside, none of the batsmen passed the 40-mark. "One of the four batsmen needs to make a big score. I think

then we'll have a really close match," said Siddons while speaking to reporters yesterday. "Four batsmen making thirties yet everyone contributes

which is probably something we need to do again. But someone needs to get a hundred or make a big score," he added.

Siddons pointed out that rival captain Daniel Vettori is the "danger man". "Vettori is our No 1 threat. His wicket in the first game for 24 was crucial. We need to take 35-40 runs off him for maybe one wicket," he said, adding, "He is obviously a danger man in batting or bowling.'

The 46-year-old Australian also hinted that they could pick a three-man left-arm spin attack, by picking Suhrawardi Shuvo. When asked for a change in the third one-dayer, Siddons said,

"Maybe [Suhrawardi] Shuvo for Naeem [Islam]." But when Siddons talked about the top-order batsmen, it obviously means that some of that responsibility to score a big one

falls on opener Imrul Kayes, who made just 16 in the first game. The left-hander admitted that he failed in his plan in last

Tuesday's game but has an eye on making amends. "I have some confidence against New Zealand because I

Ratna, Sadia fail once more Singapore and Malaysia take the medals

Bangladesh's hopes of winning a XIX Commonwealth Games gold medal evaporated when the country's two prospective women shooters -- Sharmin Akhter Ratna and Sadia Sultana -- fin-

ished at a low in the individual 10m air rifle event finals at the Dr Karni Singh Shooting Range here yesterday.

Ratna, who had all the focus on her after successes in the SA Games and Commonwealth Shooting Championships early this year, finished seventh in the eight-shooter field with a score of 494.7,

seven point less than Singaporean gold medalist Xiang Wei Jasmine, who rewrote the Games record with a score of 398 out of 400. She then hit 103.7 in the shoot-off to finish on top with a total score of 501.7.

However, teenage Bangladeshi shooter Sadia overpowered her more illustrious compatriot and partner Ratna for the first time to finish sixth through tie-break after the class nine student jointly finished fifth with famous Indian shooter Kavitha Yadav.

Sadia, who was Ratna's partner when they won the SA Games and Commonwealth Shooting gold medals, made highest 104.1 in the shoot-off to recover from her poor score of 391 in the

qualification. The girl from Chittagong also entered the finals through tie-break after finishing on top among three.

After a frustrating result in the pair event on Friday, everybody hoped that Ratna would bring back another moment of celebration like the 2002 Commonwealth Games when Asif Hossain Khan won a gold medal. But the expectations failed to realise in the qualification round when she hit 98, 98, 100 and 98 to finish fifth.

With Wei Jasmine scoring highest 398 followed by Malaysians Nur Ayuni (396) and Taibi Nur Suryani (395), there was little chance for Ratna to win the gold, but she stood a good chance of winning the SEE PAGE 18 COL 2

Rajasthan, Punjab kicked out of IPL

Rajasthan Royals and Kings XI Punjab have been thrown out of the Indian Premier League over ownership issues, tournament organisers said on Sunday.

The governing council of the cash-rich Twenty20 event, owned by the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI), also issued notices to the new Kochi franchise to resolve their ownership disputes.

"The governing council of the IPL met today to discuss and decide on the breaches committed by three of the franchisees, Punjab, Rajasthan and Kochi," the BCCI said in a statement.

"It was unanimously decided that franchise agreements with Punjab and Rajasthan be terminated forthwith based on legal opinions obtained by the BCCI in the matters.

"It was further unanimously decided to issue a notice to Kochi calling upon them to resolve all their disputes and form a joint venture company which will hold the IPL Franchise rights." The BCCI did not specify the alleged

breaches committed by the franchise owners.

Kings XI Punjab was bought for 76 million dollars in 2008 by a consortium of businessmen including Ness Wadia, Mohit Burman, Karan Paul, Aditya Khanna and Bollywood actress Preity Zinta.

The doctors at the polyclinic, which looks nothing less than a multispecialty hospital, have been kept busy 24 hours attending to sportsmen coming in with complaints of minor injuries and fever.

The polyclinic has almost all the departments a topnotch hospital in a big city would have. It boasts of X-ray, ultrasound, a dental clinic, gynecology centre, ICU, life support ambulances and many more ancillary facilities to solve almost all problems at the clinic itself. It was reported that some 30 to 40 patients are coming to the clinic daily.

HUNTERS IN REALLIFE

Canadian shooters Jason Caswell and Richard McBride, who are men's skeet event contenders, are both licensed hunters in real life as hunting birds is their passion.


