- This was Bangladesh's biggest win over a major Test-playing nation in terms of balls remaining --60 balls. It beat the previous best of winning with 43 balls to spare against Sri Lanka in January 2009.
- Yesterday's win equals the biggest in terms of wickets (7-wicket victory). The previous 7-wicket win also came over these opponents in 2008.
- The Tigers have now won three times each against a second major Test-playing nation after three victories over the West Indies.
- Sohrawardi Shuvo's bowling figures of 10-2-14-3 was the most economical spell by a Bangladeshi against a major Test-playing nation.
- The 127-run opening partnership between Shahriar Nafees and Imrul Kayes was the best against New Zealand.
- It was the seventh firstwicket stand that crossed the 100-run mark.
- It was also the second highest partnership for the Tigers in 2010. Shahriar's 73 was his high-
- est against New Zealand, his 11th half-century overall in ODIs.
- Ross Taylor now has the most runs -- 435 --in New Zealand-Bangladesh ODIs after his unbeaten 62.

Sachin Tendulkar smashed his 49th Test century and Murali Vijay his first as India matched Australia's batting prowess in the second and final Test on Monday. Australia managed just three wickets as the hosts took their

overnight score of 128-2 to 435-5 by stumps on the third day at the Chinnaswamy Stadium in Bangalore. India, who lead 1-0 in the short series after winning the first

Test in Mohali by one wicket, are 43 runs away from Australia's 478 with five wickets in hand. Tendulkar finished the day unbeaten on a monumental 191

Suresh Raina (32) put on 61 for the fifth wicket with Tendulkar when he drove Michael Clarke to mid-on where Ben Hilfenhaus took a low catch.

Tendulkar reached his 58th Test half-century in the day's first

over with two pedal-sweep boundaries off Hauritz. At the other end, Vijay drove Johnson through the covers to

bring up the 100-run partnership with Tendulkar. Vijay survived an anxious moment when he was on 49 as he

charged down the wicket, but a direct throw from Hauritz narrowly missed the stumps.

Tendulkar was severe on Johnson, flicking him to fine-leg before pulling the next ball for another boundary. The duo scored 60 runs from 14 overs in the first hour, but an

accurate spell from debutant fast bowler Peter George after the drinks break slowed down the run-rate. The lanky South Australian, who conceded 18 runs in five

overs late on Sunday, gave away only 12 runs in his five overs in the morning session. Hauritz was the most expensive Australian bowler with 0-153 from 39 unsuccessful overs, while Johnson took 3-89 from 23

Sushil on a roll

Three gold medal winners and three officials sat on a big dais with hundreds of journalists around and more than 25 video cameras zooming in. But the spotlight was firmly focused on a bearded wrestler at the main press centre of the XIX

Delhi yesterday.

The wrestler laughed and made the crowded conference room laugh, made them cheer with humorous but intellectual replies. The wrestler is Sushil Kumar, who became a national hero in India after winning a bronze medal in Beijing Olympics in 2008, emulating the feat of Kasab Yadav achieved 56 years ago in Helsinki.

Since that bronze medal two years ago, the 27-year old wrestler has won world championship this year in Moscow before giving India another gold in the same category

at these Commonwealth Games. But it was not a sudden or meteoric rise for Sushil, who had won gold medal in World Cadet Games in 1998 and then went on to win gold in the Junior Asian Wrestling championship two years later.

So, it was not unexpected that all the atten-

tion at the press centre was on Sushil, and his partners Yogeshwar Dutta and Narsingh Yadav were almost sitting idle as Sushil sat in middle of them and took all replied to journalists' queries.

There were few funny questions thrown at the star wrestler, such as what he liked to eat, whether he would want to act in Bollywood, the report of his marriage, and whether he got a promotion at his Indian Railway office where he serves as an assistant commercial manager. Commonwealth Games in New The famed wrestler was equally expert and humorous in handling these questions.

"I am a vegetarian. I am not thinking of acting in film. I am basically confined to the practice hall and my room. Apart from practice, I play football and basketball. You [journalists] know about my marriage, I still don't," were some of the answers from Sushil, who is now targeting November's Asian Games in China.

Wrestling is an ancient and popular sport in subcontinent. Also known as Mallah-Yuddha locally, the sport is played mostly in villages. Wrestling is considered as India's most popular sport after cricket, shooting and boxing though the game is played mostly in Haryana, Punjab, the 66-kg title in the Moda Pradesh and Rajasthan.

"Each sport has a certain region where it thrives. Look at West Bengal from where great footballers have been produced. I think these states fertile land for producing good wrestlers," said Indian Wrestling Federation president GS Mander.

Soon after the conclusion of Commonwealth Games, the Indian wrestlers will start their training for the Asian Games. But the federation is eyeing bigger achievement as general secretary Tartar Singh said they expect




