Hard work pays dividends

The Micromax Cup, apparently the largest trophy for a bilateral series, will soon have a permanent place at the heart of the museum at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium.

The foot-long adornment will set the entrance of the Mirpur venue alight due to its eye-catching design and sheer size, plus the importance of the trophy will give it the centre stage.

And much like that long aisle at the home of cricket, cricket folklore of this country will have to be reconstituted, stretched from one side to make room for the memories of the epic series against New Zealand that concluded on Sunday.

Maybe Rubel Hossain's yorker that ended New Zealand's innings in the fifth and final one-dayer would be the freshest in our mind, but a look back at the two last two weeks would bring back some great moments.

It all started with rain playing a major role in New Zealand's adjustment to Bangladeshi conditions. It washed out their two practice matches with such finality that the players didn't even have to turn up in BKSP on October 1 and 3.

Two days later, Bangladesh brilliantly latched on to those uncertainties among the Kiwis by bowling intelligently and making sure the loss of Mashrafe Bin Mortaza (in the third over of the Kiwi chase) did not affect them. Shakib Al Hasan's fourwicket haul included the McCullum brothers dismissed in crucial moments, the thruster Jesse Ryder and Grant Elliott but what would later become an enduring part of the series was how brilliantly Nazmul Hossain, Shafiul Islam and Rubel would mix up the slower balls and the fast yorkers. Nazmul was unlucky to have hurt a finger in the match to put him out of the rest of the series but the Kiwi batsmen had not much of an answer to the younger duo.

The teams had a five-day unscheduled break as rain again washed out a match, this time the second ODI of the series. It gave New Zealand chance to prepare a little more but on October 11, their wheels came off in the morning. Shafiul removed McCullum early to set the tone for the spinners to take

Knives out for Kiwis

Before embarking on the recently concluded five match one-day series against Bangladesh, the New Zealand team sounded reasonably assured of winning the series comfortably.

After all they had beaten Bangladesh 3-0 at home earlier in the year, there was no reason to

not be confident.

Probably one or two hiccups might have been on their mind, but a 4-0 series defeat was beyond the realm of even their worst nightmare. But following their poorest ever performance in recent times, the relationship with the fans back home is at an all time low. Understandably the media have been unforgiving in a defeat that was completely unexpected.

Speaking on an online sport radio talk show, former fast bowler Simon Doull labelled the 4-0 series loss as simply 'embarrassing'.

"It's embarrassing. 4-0 to Bangladesh, yes they're improving, they're a better side and not easy at home but they're a side we should beat nine times out of ten. I can't see any answers," Doull

The big paceman cited lack of proper coaching and Daniel Vettori's dual role as coach-cum-selector as the main problems behind the Black Caps' form slump.

Doull's feelings were seconded by top website 3 news.co.nz.

"Knives out for Black Caps top brass' read their lead headline. The proverbial knives had been sharpening ever since the series loss. Following their slump in the fourth ODI, another former Black Cap, paceman John Morrison had predicted that this might go down as the worst series defeat in Black Caps'

"It's shaping up as one of the worst ever because Bangladesh is so lowly rated," Morrison told the New Zealand Herald.

Morrison found out to his chagrin that he couldn't have been any more spot on.

The Kiwis made a low-key return in the early hours of Monday. A report on the website stuff.co.nz summarised the ignominy of the Black Caps.

"Casey Williams [netball gold medallist at the Commonwealth Games] returned from the subcontinent with a golden glow, cricket counterpart Daniel Vettori probably grimaced until travel arrangements revealed a midnight touch down at Auckland airport.

"Even so, the cover of darkness might not be sufficient to convince the New Zealand captain and his humiliated teammates not to try and exit the back way instead of traipsing through the arrivals hall. "Vettori could originally rely on the Delhi Commonwealth

Games for deflecting attention from New Zealand's disastrous one-day tour of Bangladesh, but there will be no avoiding the ignominy associated with an unprecedented 0-4 series loss."

If the media were unforgiving, the general public themselves showed no lack of vitriol.
