Eyewitnesses of the killing, on condition of anonymity, also spoke against Zakir to The Daily Star.



# Bangladesh at highest risk

South Asia is the world's most climate-vulnerable region, its fast-growing populations badly exposed to flood, drought, storms and sea-level rise, according to a survey of 170 nations.

Of the 16 countries listed as being at "extreme" risk from climate change over the next 30 years, five are from South Asia, with Bangladesh and India in first and second places, Nepal in fourth, Afghanistan in eighth and Pakistan at 16th.

The Climate Change Vulnerability Index, compiled by a British-based global risks advisory firm, Maplecroft, is intended as a guide for strategic investment and policymaking. The barometer is based on 42 social, economic and environ-

mental factors, including the responsiveness of government, to assess the risk to population, ecosystems and business from SEE PAGE 15 COL 1

### Regional centre of counter-terrorism in Dhaka next yr

A regional Counter-Terrorism Centre will be set up in Dhaka with financial and technological assistance from European Union to train people across South Asia to combat terrorism.

The international standard centre will start functioning early

next year, said Dr Stefan Frowein, ambassador of EU Delegation to Bangladesh. Talking to The Daily Star yesterday, the EU envoy said they will not set up any building for the centre. Renowned counter-

terrorism experts from European countries, United States and Canada will train investigators, police and intelligence agency personnel to fight terrorism. He noted happily that South Asian countries like India and

Pakistan agreed with the EU plan to set up the counter-terrorism centre in Bangladesh, which will be the second after the first one in Indonesia.

## Mahbub trashes Ashraf's claim

Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA) President Khandaker Mahbub Hossain yesterday countered Syed Ashraful Islam's statement that he (Mahbub) was a DGFI agent and said a number of lawyers, including some pro-Awami League ones, were panel solicitors of the military intelligence and received money from it during the last caretaker rule.

"The government has a list of those lawyers. Let it make the list public if it has that much courage," Khandaker Mahbub told The Daily Star.

The SCBA president said he was the sole president candidate of the pro-AL panel in the election for 2008. But all of a sudden DGFI halted the poll and made current Law Minister Shafique Ahmed a candidate. "Why Barrister Shafique was made a contender all of a sudden

sidelining me though he was not a candidate earlier?" he asked. Shafique won 589 votes, while Mahbub came closest with 431

votes at the two-day voting that ended on April 30, 2008.
