Caroline Wozniacki must wait at least one more day to become year-end world number one, after suffering a surprise defeat at the round robin stage of the WTA Championships here Wednesday.

The in-form favourite, who had previously lost only two out of 33 matches and won five titles, was beaten 6-4, 6-3 by Samantha Stosur, the world number five from Australia.

Wozniacki had a great chance to reach break point in the ninth game of the first set, but after missing a relatively easy kill started to play as though under pressure.

Stosur by contrast hit freely, striking 26 winners, serving excellently, and opening up the court frequently with her forceful inside-out forehand.

Wozniacki denied suggestions that she allowed the year-end number one spot to enter hermind.

"I didn't think about it at all," she claimed. 'I just wanted to win. I was just trying to get my rhythm.

Wozniacki nevertheless retains a good chance

Kevin Pietersen insists he will use the forthcoming Ashes showdown with Australia to prove he is still one of the world's best batsmen.

Pietersen has suffered a miserable run of form over the last 12 months and was dropped from England's one-day international squad which faced Pakistan in September. The flamboyant batsman knows that many

experts, including former Australia coach John Buchanan, believe he is no longer the force he once was. But Pietersen, 30, is adamant talk of his

demise is premature and he expects to make a significant impact as England try to win a Test series in Australia for the first time since 1986-87. "Even with all the doom and gloom over the

way I've been playing I think I've averaged 40

over the last 18 months or so, so it's not all bad," Pietersen told the Daily Mail. "I am looking for that Test hundred and I am looking to put myself back to where I was. I'd love people to see how hard I train and all the work I

do away from the game to put things right. "I am trying so hard to get back to where I used to be. Maybe I've been trying too hard, I don't know. But I'm doing everything I can to get

back to being the player I have been." South-African born Pietersen played a key role in England winning their first Ashes series in 18 years in 2005 and also took part in last year's successful campaign against Australia on

Pietersen, who is part of the 16-man team that will fly to Perth on Friday to prepare for England's Ashes defence, is confident Andrew Strauss's team are capable of winning in Australia -- a feat which he would regard as the finest of his international career.
