Sheikh Jamal to lift title

Abahani emerged champions of the season's curtain-raising Grameenphone Federation Cup when they beat Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi Club 5-3 after extra-time in a thrilling encounter at the Birshreshtha Mostafa Kamal Stadium yesterday.

Abahani rode on their Ghanaian contingent with striker Awudu Ibrahim leading the way with a superb hattrick as the Sky Blues triumphed over a ten-man Sheikh Jamal after the regulation period had ended in an enthralling 3-3 tie. Yussif Aminu and Twum Frank were the other scorers for the winners.

The full-house at Kamalapur was treated to an end-to-end encounter in a dramatic game punctuated at regular intervals with welltaken goals.

Abahani beat Graft gobbles up OMS rice ANWAR ALI, Rajshahi

The government-appointed dealers for the ongoing open market sales (OMS) are selling rice on black market upsetting the effort to contain prices of the staple food.

The Daily Star investigation reveals that the dealers prepare fictitious list of potential buyers and sell the OMS rice on black market where each kilogramme of rice yields at least a profit of Tk5.50.

Food department officials, who are "strictly monitoring" the dealers during and after the sale, are also enjoying benefits from the theft.

Under the OMS programme the government appointed 751 dealers across Rajshahi division. In the divisional city, 30 dealers each receiving four metric tonnes of rice from public granaries every day at a rate of Tk 22.5 per kg sell it at Tk 24 a kg on the black market. Rice of the same quality retails between Tk 30 and 33 in the market.

The Daily Star at random visited Alupatty, City Bhaban, Bornali Crossing, Shalbagan, Nawdapara Aam Chattar, Old City Bhaban and Shaheb Bazar OMS centres in Rajshahi city and three in Poba upazila over the last few weeks. Allegations of theft were made from all of the areas.

As per the government OMS Policy 2010, a dealer must record list and take fingerprint of every customer buying a maximum of five kilograms of rice from the outlet. A food inspector must be present at his assigned outlet during the entire period of the OMS operation and sign the registers.

During a spot visit at the City Bhaban intersection around 9:30am on October 18, a dealer, who identified himself as Wahed Ali, was found commencing the day's OMS sale showing 1.5

Target genocide apology

Foreign secys of Bangladesh, Pakistan sit tomorrow, may also discuss Bihari repatriation, assets division

After a break of three years, the Bangladeshi and Pakistani foreign secretaries will hold talks on bilateral relations at a two-day annual consultation to be held in Islamabad on November 1-2.

Bangladesh will dominate the talks with its three vital issues including Pakistan's apology for the 1971 genocide. It will officially raise the issue of its con-

tinual demand for repatriation of stranded Pakistanis and division of assets at the two days talks.

Official sources said Foreign Secretary Mohamed Mijarul Quayes would lead an eight-member Bangladesh delegation at the upcoming consultation with his Pakistani counterpart Salman Bashir.

"This will be an ice-melting session in the bilateral relations between the two countries as no such meeting was held for

long since the last Foreign Secretary-level consultation in Dhaka in August 2007, said a foreign ministry official.

He said both the countries are now keen to reinvigorate the bilateral ties and to suggest their present leaderships to undertake bold steps to take the bilateral relations to a genuinely meaningful level.

Sources said, at the upcoming talks, Pakistan would be asked to officially seek

World pledges for ecosystem

UN seals historic protection treaty

A historic global treaty to protect the world's forests, coral reefs and other threatened ecosystems within 10 years was sealed at a UN summit.

Rich and poor nations agreed to take "effective and urgent" action to curb the destruction of nature in an effort to halt the loss of the world's biodiversity on which human survival depends. Delegates from 193 countries yesterday committed to key

goals by 2020 such as curbing pollution, protecting forests and coral reefs, setting aside areas of land and water for conservation, and managing fisheries sustainably. "This is a day to celebrate," UN Environment Programme

chief Achim Steiner said straight after the accord was struck early on Saturday morning following nearly two weeks of tense talks in the central Japanese city of Nagoya. Delegates and green groups also said the accord offered hope

that the United Nations could help to solve the planet's many environmental problems, particularly after the failure of climate change talks in Copenhagen last year. One of the most significant elements of the accord was a

commitment to protect 17 percent of land and 10 percent of

oceans so that biodiversity there could thrive.

War criminals must not have the last laugh

HR commission chief tells sector commanders' rally

The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) will support the movement to bring war criminals of the Liberation War to justice, said Chairman of the commission Prof Mizanur Rahman yesterday.

Addressing a rally organised by the Sector Commanders' Forum (SCF) at the Central Shaheed Minar, the chairman said, "We want those responsible for committing atrocities against humanity during the Liberation War in 1971 to be brought to justice so that they don't have the last laugh at the cost of our freedom fighters' lives."

Crimes like murder, rape, genocide, mayhem, crimes against humanity and war crimes are recognised by the international law and so those criminals should be tried according to the International Crimes Tribunal Act, 1973, he added, demanding that the trial process should be sped up.
