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It was a bid to 'avenge' BDR carnage

Army finds Major Helal chose on his own Taposh as target, tagged along 4 juniors, collected explosives from Pilkhana

The five army officers dismissed recently for the bomb attack on Fazle Noor Taposh had done so, believing that the Awami League lawmaker had a hand in the BDR mutiny.

Major Helal, one of the five, was the mastermind behind the blast, which took place on October 21 last year, army sources said.

The officers--one major and four captains--have been sen-

tenced to five years in prison by a court-martial. They began serving their term at Dhaka Central Jail on Thursday. The convicted servicemen had collected the explosives used

in the blast from the BDR Pilkhana headquarters while on duty there after the bloody mutiny, the sources told The Daily Star, citing findings of the probe into the attack on Taposh.

During their trial at Dhaka cantonment, they pleaded guilty to the charges brought against them.

The evidence produced before the court too proved they planned and executed the blast all by themselves.

Taposh, also nephew of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, came under the attack in front of his law chamber at Motijheel. He escaped unscathed, but at least 13 people were injured.

The army sources said Helal and the four captains--Rezaul Karim, Rajib, Fuad and Subayel Ibne Rafique--had been "confined to the line (officers' mess in Dhaka cantonment)" soon after their links to the blast surfaced.

For their conviction, the five will not be allowed to use their ranks as former army officers. They will also not get any benefits from the force.

Obama wins India business; criticised

US President Barack Obama announced \$10 billion in business deals yesterday as he arrived in India to boost US exports and jobs after a mauling in mid-term polls, but he ran into immediate controversy over Pakistan.

Obama flew into Mumbai, India's financial hub, and announced the United States would also relax export controls over sensitive technology, a demand of India's that will help deepen US ties with the emerging global power and its trillion dollar economy.

While most of the announced deals had been pending for months, Obama's visit, the first leg of a 10-day Asian tour, has been hailed

as moving the United States closer to India as Washington tries to revive a weak economy and gather support to pressure China on its cur-

"The United States sees Asia, especially India, as the market of the future," Obama told a meeting of US and Indian business leaders. "There still exists a caricature of India as a land of call centres and back-offices that cost American jobs. But these old stereotypes, these old concerns, ignore today's realities."

Obama's first act was to pay tribute to victims of the 2008 Mumbai attacks, but he was criticised for making no reference to India's traditional foe Pakistan, which New Delhi SEE PAGE 15 COL 7

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Sweater workers go on rampage

50 hurt as they block road, clash with cops

At least 50 people including an assistant superintendent of police and 14 other policemen were injured as garment workers clashed with law enforcers at Naojore in Gazipur yesterday. Several thousand workers of Diganta Sweater Factory took to

the streets at about 8:30am protesting low pay. They were paid Tk 42 per piece of sweater instead of Tk 45 settled earlier. Vehicular movement on the Dhaka-Mymensingh highway

remained suspended for nearly six hours, as the workers put blockade on the motorway and vandalised at least eight vehicles.

They also damaged two covered vans and a bus of the factory, and set fire to a motorbike of an employee.

The clash ensued as police attempted to disperse the agitating workers and clear the road. The two sides got involved in chase and counter chase from 9:30am to 12:00 noon with an
