Peace prize for **Divine Ponytail**

Italian football legend Roberto Baggio has been selected as the annual winner of a special prize bestowed by Nobel Peace Prize laureates. The 43-year-old has been recognised for his lifetime contributions to charities across the world. The former Italy international has helped fund money for hospitals, earthquake victims and charities combating world disease since retiring from football in May 2004. Baggio will receive the world peace award 2010 on Sunday on the last day of the 11th world summit of Nobel peace laureates.

The 100 days countdown of the 2011 World Cup will be officially inaugurated at midnight tonight. Deputy speaker Shawkat Ali

will inaugurate the countdown at the South Plaza of the Jatiya Sangsad which will be followed by a fireworks

The campaign has already started with the airport branding and a total of 12 mascots (Stumpy) will be placed in Dhaka and three in Chittagong on November 11. It is the countdown ahead of the February 17

opening ceremony in Dhaka with the International Cricket Council (ICC) giving a thumbs-up to the work done by the three host nations -- India, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh.

"I am confident we will get a good tournament," ICC chief executive Haroon Lorgat told AFP. "Preparations have been going on well and there has been good co-operation between the three host nations.

"With mega-events like these, there will always be something that needs to be done till the end, but we are in control of things."

The World Cup returns to the sub-continent, the nerve-centre and financial powerhouse of cricket, after India and Pakistan co-hosted the event in 1987 and were joined by Sri Lanka for the 1996 tournament.

Pakistan were also due to co-host the 2011 party, but were stripped of their rights due to security concerns in the volatile nation in the aftermath of the terror attack on the Sri Lankan team in March last year.

The 43-day, 49-match tournament will be played under a new format with India hosting a majority of matches (29), including the final at

the new-look Wankhede Stadium in Mumbai on April 2.

Sri Lanka's 12 matches will be held at three venues, including two brand new 25,000-seater stadia in Pallekele near the hill resort of Kandy and Hambantota in the deep south.

The third venue, the existing Premadasa Stadium in Colombo, is being re-built from scratch to host seven matches, including a quarterfinal and semifinal.

The eight matches alloted to Bangladesh will be played at the Sher-e-Bangla National Cricket Stadium in Mirpur on the outskirts of Dhaka and the Zohur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium in Chittagong.

India will use eight regular Test venues for its 29 matches, having re-constructed the Wankhede Stadium and renovated the Eden Gardens in Kolkata and the Chidambaram Stadium in Chennai.

ICC president Sharad Pawar, who also heads the tournament organising committee, said the new venues would be ready on schedule. "I can assure everyone that they will be

attending an exciting event staged in the most modern of cricket facilities," said Pawar. "All stadia will be completed by November

30 and all playing facilities will be match-ready by December 31." Unlike major sporting events like the

Olympics where visas are exempted for accreditated personnel, everyone including players, officials, media and spectators will need visas to travel to the World Cup.

Lorgat said Pawar, a senior Indian government minister, had stepped in to ensure that visas are

granted easily to genuine ticket-holders. The safety of the tournament will be looked

Bangladesh's hopes of qualifying for the second round in the Asian Games all but evaporated when the U23 football team suffered a 3-0 reverse against United Arab Emirates in their second Group Ematch at the Yingdong Stadium in

Guangzhou, China yesterday. Bangladesh, who conceded an identical 3-0 defeat against Uzbekistan in the first match, remain glued at the bottom of the group and will play their last match against Hong Kong tomorrow. Meanwhile, Hong Kong stunned 2004 champions Uzbekistan 1-0 in the other match of the group yesterday. UAE and Hong Kong are now level on four points while Uzbekistan have three points and Bangladesh have none.

Bangladesh's strategy of protecting their own territory and going on counterattacks went seemingly in the right direction till the end of the first half which ended goalless. Bangladesh made three changes to the starting eleven from the match against Uzbekistan with fit-again Zahid Hossain replacing off-form striker Zahid Hasan Emily.

The cricket World Cup trophy was displayed by South African players Morne Morkel and Dale Steyn in the Dubai aquarium as the 100-day countdown to the event began here Tuesday.

Morkel and Steyn, who were later joined by members of the South African and Pakistani teams, dived into the aquarium to start the ceremony which was also attended by officials of International Cricket Council (ICC).

The opening ceremony of the World Cup will be held in Dhaka, Bangladesh on February 17. India, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka jointly host the 10th World Cup from February 19 to April 2.

"It was spectacular to watch the 100-day countdown ceremony and the ICC and the three host countries are gearing up for the World Cup," ICC chief executive Haroon Lorgat told reporters.

Pakistan were also due to co-host the 2011 party, but were stripped of their rights due to security concerns in the volatile nation in the aftermath of the terror attack on the Sri Lankan team in March last year.

Lorgat said he feels for Pakistan's fans.

"Due to unavoidable circumstances we had to shift the matches from Pakistan and I welcome all the fans there to come to Sri Lanka and support

their team as they always do," said Lorgat. Pakistan will play all its group matches in Sri
