Messi magic lifts Argentina

A brilliant solo goal in injury time by Lionel Messi earned Argentina a 1-0 victory over their arch-rivals Brazil in an international friendly here on Wednesday.

The Barcelona superstar picked up the ball midway inside the Brazil half and weaved past four defenders before firing a low shot into the bottom-right corner with just a minute of added time to play.

It was Messi's first ever goal against Brazil and allowed Argentina to record their first win against their old enemies since June 2005.

His strike also allowed coach Sergio Batista to celebrate victory in his first game in charge since he was confirmed as the long-term successor to Diego Maradona.

For Brazil it was a first defeat in four matches for new coach Mano Menezes, who had led his country to victories in his first three matches at the helm and had not previously seen his team concede a goal.

The Albiceleste were second-best for much of the first half, as Brazil impressed with their slick approach play, and Batista will have been delighted to secure a famous win after the 1-0 loss to Japan in their previous outing.

AC Milan forward Ronaldinho was making his first Brazil appearance since April 2009 and although he illuminated the game with some classy touches, he could not prise open the Argentine defence.

Clattering tackles were a recurring feature of the encounter and a glut of second-half substitutions seemed set to usher the game towards an anti-climactic conclusion.

A pitch invader who completed a hasty circuit of the pitch raised the crowd from their slumber with 10 minutes to play and Messi's magical intervention made sure that a forgettable encounter concluded in unforgettable fashion.

Messi's early touches had drawn roars of encouragement from the crowd, but the reigning World and European Footballer of the Year initially found his route to goal blocked by the imposing form of Benfica centre-back David Luiz.

Brazil's twinkle-toed attacking triumvirate of Robinho, Ronaldinho and 18-year-old Santos starlet Neymar quickly demonstrated their understanding and the early chances of note all fell to the five-time world champions.

Dani Alves cracked a shot against the crossbar after a one-two with Luiz, while Ronaldinho tested goalkeeper Sergio Romero with an instinctive back-heel following a corner from Neymar that was only partially cleared.

Messi grazed the left-hand post with a rasping shot shortly before half-time, but Brazil Both South American giants are rebuilding goalkeeper Victor's only prior involvement had after disappointing World Cups and they will been a double save from Gonzalo Higuain rendered irrelevant by the linesman's flag.

Napoli striker Ezequiel Lavezzi added industry and energy to the Argentine attack after replacing Higuain at the interval.

He scampered down the right flank early in the second half before teeing up club-mate Javier Pastore, but although the midfielder's strike appeared to hit Thiago Silva on the arm, the referee was unmoved.

Brazil were then aggrieved when the referee played advantage after Neymar was chopped down on the edge of the Argentina box, as Robinho had strayed into an offside position and the flag went up when the ball came to him.

World champions Spain suffered their worst defeat for 47 years as Portugal hammered their neighbours 4-0 in a Lisbon friendly arranged to promote the countries' joint World Cup bid on Wednesday. In another big derby, played in neutral Qatar, Argentina beat Brazil 1-0 courtesy of a stoppage-time Lionel Messi special. The heavyweight clashes were the stand-

out matches on a night of almost 40 friendlies

around the world, where swathes of debutants stepped into the international limelight as their coaches took the opportunity to experiment.

There were a clutch of impressive away wins in Europe as France beat England 2-1 at Wembley, Belgium upset Russia 2-0, Norway overcame Ireland 2-1 and Greece defeated Austria

World Cup runners-up Netherlands beat Turkey 1-0 but several of Europe's other big guns failed to ignite.

Germany were held to a goalless draw in Sweden, Italy, with four debutants, drew 1-1 with Romania in Austria in a game marred by racist chanting from Italian fans, while Denmark against Czech Republic also ended 0-0. In the night's two Euro

2012 qualifiers, Croatia beat Malta 3-0 and Finland thrashed San Marino 8-The World Cup is becoming a distant mem-

ory for Spain, who since their July triumph have lost 4-1 to Argentina and made hard work of beating Scotland in a Euro 2012 qualifier. Spain beat Portugal 1-0 in the second round

in South Africa but, despite having a near-full strength side, they were outclassed and slipped to their worst defeat since Scotland beat them 6-2 in 1963.

France continued their rehabilitation under Laurent Blanc by outplaying an inexperienced England team and handing them their first home defeat under Fabio Capello. Karim Benzema and Mathieu Valbuena

finished off good passing moves to put the visitors 2-0 up before substitute Peter Crouch maintained his remarkable

scoring record with his 22nd goal in 42 internationals seconds after coming on at the death.

Klaas-Jan Huntelaar is another on a hot streak as he headed his ninth in five internationals to secure Netherlands' win.

The Dutch had only five survivors from their World Cup final team while Turkey coach Guus Hiddink gave five players their debuts. Seventeen-year-old

Belgium striker Romelu Lukaku added to his burgeoning reputation by scoring both goals, his first in internationals, in the win over Russia in Voronezh.

Another 17-year-old had a night to remember in Cape Town as debutant Juan Agudelo scored five minutes from time to give a makeshift United States team a 1-0 win over South Africa.

Croatia marked the 20th anniversary of their first match as an independent nation by beating Malta 3-0 with two long-range goals for Niko Kranjcar and one for Nikola Kalinic to go top of Group F, two points ahead of Greece and four ahead of Georgia. Mikael Forssell hit a second-half hattrick

as Finland hammered San Marino 8-0 in Group E but, having lost their first three matches, they remain the longest of qualify-

After five years without a trophy, Arsenal are daring to dream of a sustained title challenge as Chelsea and Manchester United struggle to find the consistency which has made the league a twohorse race in recent seasons.

A victory over Spurs in Saturday's lunchtime kick-off will see Arsene Wenger's side go one point clear of Chelsea, albeit possibly for only a few hours, before the champions face a tricky away trip to Birmingham.

Arsenal head into the match on the back of two encouraging away wins at Wolves and Everton. However the defensive frailties which have haunted Wenger's team

this season have mostly occurred at home.

The Emirates has been anything but a fortress so far, with West Bromwich Albion and, most recently, Newcastle instalment of both scoring upset away wins. their bitter Another home defeat will North London rivalry here reawaken the doubts over Arsenal's ability to stay the course.

> For Spurs, however, who are three places and three points outside the Champions League reckoning, only a victory will do if they are not to risk falling further behind in the race for a top four spot. Spurs will look to maraud-

ing left-sided midfielder Gareth Bale to provide the cutting edge against Arsenal and also have Jermain Defoe fit again after two months out with an ankle injury. Chelsea meanwhile will
