Maryam wins with ease

Peng, Somdev clinch tennis titles



World champion Maryam Jamal comfortably defeated her 1,900m Asian Games title on Tuesday as Somdev Devvarman and Peng Shuai defeated their opponents to win gold medals.

The Ethiopian-born Jamal, running for Bahrain, lived up to her top billing on the track to win a slow-paced race she never looked like losing with Vietnam's Truong Thanh Hang shocking silver medalist.

All but 11 of the 100 runners were in the world and Bahrain. I'm still the best in the world.

Her success was Bahrain's third gold in Guangzhou, far behind dominant table-tennis China on 164, with South Korea next up on 64 while Japan has 33.

With men's world champion Youssef Saad Kamel failing to qualify for the final, Saudi Arabia's Mohammed Shaveen claimed a 1,500m gold ahead of Iran's Sajad Moradian.

Another Baharini, Kenyan-born Tareq Mubarak Rath, defended his 3,000m steeplechase title while China's Li Fangting won the women's 500m race.

South Korea's Jung Soon-Ok was crowned women's long jump champion.

Datar's Muztar Hashim clinched 2.27 metres to take the men's high jump title.

It was India's Somdev Devvarman who took top honours at the Aoti Tennis Centre, upsetting Uzbek ATP stalwart Denis Istomin 6-1, 6-2 in the men's final.

Devvarman has already won the doubles title when he teamed with Sanam Singh on Monday and was ecstatic.

"It's beyond my expectations," said the 25-year-old, who is the first man in 24 years to win a singles and doubles gold at the same Games.

"I just came over here to do my best. I am happy to win for my country."

Peng Shuai convincingly kept the women's tennis crown in Chinese hands as she also clinched her second title of the Guangzhou Asian.

Peng, who had linked up with Li Na to win the women's team event, claimed a 7-5, 6-2 victory over Uzbekistan's Algul Amanmuradova of a pair of packed hours.

Taiwan now has 12 titles after claiming three roller sport gold while cyclist Hsiao Mei-yun won the 100 kilometre women's individual road race.

Meanwhile, China's diving juggernaut Chen Yanyan took Olympic gold medalist Chen Ruolin and Wang Hao to good effect in the women's 3m and 10m metre platform event.

The pairing of Qin Kai and Lao Yutong then kept China on track for a clean sweep by winning the men's synchronised 3m springboard.

At the University Town Main Stadium, defending champions Japan beat Hong Kong 28-21 to win the men's rugby gold, while Kazakhstan shocked favourites China to claim the inaugural women's title.

The Japanese found more success on the football field with goals from Kota Mizunuma and Kensuke Nagai helping them beat four-time champions Iran to capture the final when they met Korea South Korea or United Arab Emirates.

Rehman left arm spinner Abdul Rehman took his maiden half-century to foil South Africa's attempts to win the second Test at Abu Dhabi Stadium on Tuesday.

Rehman checked South Africa's quest for quick runs in order to set a target for Pakistan with wickets of Alvar Petersen (35), Hashim Amla (62) and AB de Villiers (25) before South Africa closed the fourth day at 173-4 for an overall lead of 223.

Rehman was unbeaten in his 40-ball 100-run knock on 27 and Mark Boucher was 13 not out on a day when the 30-year-old Rehman became Pakistan's saviour.

Rehman scored a career-best 60 to help Pakistan score 434 in their first innings in reply to South Africa's mammoth 594 declared.

The first time Pakistan scored the 400 mark in Test history was South Africa, for whom

captain Graeme Smith could not open the innings after a recurrence of his finger injury, were winning out of time to enforce a result in this match and the series which is tied 0-0.

The first Test ended in a draw in Dubai last week.

Amla and Petersen gave South Africa a flying start of 81 before Rehman put the brakes on their progress, taking three wickets in the space of 30 balls. He removed Petersen, caught by Younis Khan in the last over before tea.

Amla, who completed 1,000 runs in the calendar year with his first shot for boundary, was bowled off an arm-ball. Amla hit eight boundaries during his 64-ball 100-run knock.

Amla is the third batsman behind India's David of Scania and South Africa's Graeme Smith to score 1,000 or more runs in this current year.

Rehman then trapped first innings double century maker AB de Villiers at 25, before he became the 40th wicket to be taken by spinner Mohammad Hafeez

forten. Rehman had figures of 3-73 off his 21 overs.

The morning, South Africa started on a positive note when they dismissed Pakistan skipper Misbah-ul-Haq for 77 off the first delivery of the day, trapped leg before by paceman Dale Steyn.

Rehman then became Pakistan's last hope, adding 36 for the eighth wicket with Umar Gul, who scored 21, to bring Pakistan close to avoiding follow-on.

Ryder to miss India ODIs

Key New Zealand batsman Jesse Ryder will miss an upcoming five-match one-day international series against India following a calf injury.

The left-hander picked up a calf strain in the second Test in Hyderabad and aggravated it further during the final game in Nagpur, where he batted with a runner.

"Ryder is flying back home and will not be available for the one-day series against India," team manager Dave Currie said after New Zealand were thrashed by an innings and 198 runs in the final Test to lose the series 1-0.

Ryder finished as the second-highest run getter for New Zealand with 274 runs from five innings in the three-Test series.

"I was in Guwahati on November 28 followed by matches in Jaipur (December 1), Vadodra (December 2), Bangalore (December 7) and Chennai (December 10).

"When I started, I had to fight for my place with Iaved (Omar Belmi) Bahi and Nafis Iqbal, Inamud (Siddiqui) and the others. I think the competition was always there," he said.

"I have been batting at No. 3 for awhile and have opened for Bangladesh all the time. And I think it won't be a problem to bat in those positions because I have the experience to play spin from the fifth or sixth over. We hardly face fast bowling that we are used to our conditions," added Nafees.

Surprises in semis

Malaysia upend India, Pakistan Korea

Amin Rahim slammed two late goals as Malaysia came back from the brink to stun favourites India 4-3 on Tuesday and set up an Asian Games men's hockey final against Pakistan.

As India led 3-2 with just three minutes remaining, Rahim drew level with a penalty corner and then converted another in extra-time to hand Malaysia a thrilling win.

The other semifinal also produced edge-of-the-seat excitement as Pakistan goalkeeper Salman Akbar saved the last shot of a penalty shoot-out to help his team knock out defending champions South Korea.

The final on Thursday will be Pakistan's first since they won the last of their seven Asian titles way back in Beijing in 1990.

For Malaysia it will be their maiden appearance in the title clash after breaking a jinx against India to whom they had lost all 10 previous Asian Games encounters.

Vaagas Muhammad put Pakistan ahead in the 22nd minute, before Kang Moon-ki drew level for South Korea four minutes into

the second session.

When the first five penalty shots produced a 3-3 deadlock, the sudden death rule was applied, which produced even more drama.

Soheil Abbas and Jang Jong-hyun saw their shots saved, but Hassem Khan scored off the next to put Pakistan 4-3 ahead.

Jang Jong-hyun stepped in for the next shot amid mounting tension and his feeble push was easily saved by Akbar to carry Pakistan into the final.

Zereshan Ashraf's men are desperate to make amends in Guangzhou after finishing an embarrassing last at the World Cup and lowly sixth at the Commonwealth Games this year.

The Koreans, whose hopes of bagging a hat-trick of titles ended, will return on Thursday to fight for the bronze medal against India.

The second semifinal swung wildly as Malaysia took the lead through Tengku Jali before Sandeep Singh equalised for India with a penalty corner a few seconds before the interval.

A goal by India's Tushar Khandekar soon after resumption was neutralised by Azlan Miskon 12 minutes later, but captain Rajpal Singh put India 3-2 ahead in the 54th minute.

Rahim's two late goals ended Malaysia to avenge the 3-2 defeat at India's hands at the Commonwealth Games in New Delhi last month.

India's Spanish coach Jose Abreu attributed the Indian's offensive errors towards the end of the semifinal.

works in line with modern requirements at some venues," said Abdur Rahman, National Sports Council director for venue preparation and development.

Rahman, however maintained that all the remaining venues would be completed by mid-December.

Among those venues, the BNS will host the opening ceremony on February 17, Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium will stage two group matches while Narayanganj's Osmani Stadium and Khulna's Abu Naser Stadium have been kept as practice and backup venues respectively.

Apart from new carparking, stands, extended media centre and modernised briefing centre, hospitality boxes, installation of chairs on all galleries, floodlights, digital scoreboard, giant screen and the Bangladesh Cricket Board has asked the NSC to build 10 more corporate-house boxes at the South-Western corner of the stadium.

NSC already in place, in face of increasing demands while the authorities concerned with the renovation and modernisation capacity gallery at the east side of Zohur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium, which currently has a capacity of about 9,000 spectators.

India's victory owed much to their recognition of the requirements of limited-overs cricket, requirements that they introduced in their matches against Zimbabwe. A loss in that match would have seen them going out of the tournament, having been beaten in their previous two matches against West Indies and England. The captain and batsman opus his (only current) in limited-over-internationals) turned the tide and they went on to win all their remaining matches, culminating in a come-from-behind victory in the final.

In the final they were all out for 183, but after the West Indies reached 50 for 1 with Viv Richards in murderous mood, his wicket turned the tables with India eventually winning by 43 runs. The Caribbean triumphs of the previous two editions signalled the dominance to come. India's victory had implications further-reaching than that; with this triumph, the popularity of the game peaked in India, resulting in them becoming the sole financial superpower.
