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### Cricket earns maiden Asian Games gold

The flashing blades of Sabbir Rahman and Naeem Islam took the country's sports to a new height yesterday as their rescue act in Bangladesh's five-wicket win over Afghanistan in the cricket final clinched the long cherished Asian Games gold medal for the first time.

Despite the Twenty20 competition's second-string nature with a majority of smaller cricketing nations taking part, it was important to bring a gold -- the ultimate prize in multi-sport event -- to the country that has long starved of sporting excellence. The past decade has seen cricket take centre-stage and it was only fitting that the cricket team made a contribution to the medals' tally.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and President Zillur Rahman congratulated the players and officlas of the cricket team for winning gold. In separate messages, they expressed hope that Bangladesh would be able to succeed further in sports and the government will give all out support for its development.

# Probes designed to fail

Incidents of "crossfire," "encounter," "shootout" and "gunfight" claimed around 1,200 lives in the last six years thanks to shady enquiries into the allegations of extrajudicial killings to get the responsible law enforcers legally protected.

In cases when investigation reports were submitted complying with court orders or persistent media reports, victims' families and rights organisations invariably found those incomplete, biased, misleading, self-contradictory and flawed.

Each government enquiry committee usually comprises a joint or additional



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secretary and police commissioners. "A universal maxim goes that you cannot be the judge in your own case. The system they are following is wrong and flawed," said National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) Chairman Prof Mizanur Rahman.

"It is not acceptable anywhere in the

world," he added.

Recently, the NHRC rejected the government probe report into the disappearance of Tusher Islam Titu, who allegedly went missing after Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) picked up him from his village home in Sirajganj in 2008.

Following the NHRC rejection, the home ministry has formed a fresh onemember committee with a joint secretary to review the past investigation.

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### TRANSIT FOR TRIPURA POWER PLANT

## Deal likely next week

4-nation transit talks to continue separately

Bangladesh is likely to sign an agreement with India next week to allow the neighbouring country transit for a year and a half to carry power plant equipment to Tripura from West Bengal.

The deal would not be done as part of the on-going talks on transit and transhipment between Bangladesh and three neighbouring nations -- India, Nepal and Bhutan, said Shipping Secretary Abdul Mannan Howlader.

The governments of the two countries would sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) next week allowing India to have road


and river transit without any charge, he said.

India would not pay any fees for the transit in line with the agreed principle of the joint communiqué signed by the prime ministers of the two countries, said a high official at the shipping ministry.

Bangladesh has granted India the waiver to transit fees only for transport of power plant machinery because of the friendly relations between the two nations, the secretary said.

He said India would pay Bangladesh the estimated cost of Tk 25 crore for renovation and repair of roads and ports, and Bangladeshi contractors would do the work.

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
