6 lakh die every year from passive smoking

The first global study into the effects of passive smoking has found it causes 6,00,000 deaths every year.

One-third of those killed are children, often exposed to smoke at home, the World Health Organization (WHO) found.

LDC DIALOGUE ENDS

Call for more active role of development partners

A three-day international dialogue on development strategies for least developed countries concluded yesterday with a call for more active engagement from global development partners.

The dialogue also concluded that the positions of the world's weakest economies must be redefined in light of the post crisis evolving global economic relation-Trade experts, economists, bureau-

crats, academicians and civil society

members, who took part in the event, also suggested that the 49-nation-bloc look for new opportunities amid the rapidly changing global economic order.

The observations came at the closing ceremony of the 'International Dialogue on Exploring New Global Partnership for the LDCs' in Dhaka Sheraton Hotel.

The Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD), an independent think tank of Bangladesh, organised the event in partnership with the Development Centre of the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD).

The dialogue sought to design a new international strategy for LDCs to graduate from the listing, which will be negotiated at the Fourth UN LDC Conference in Istanbul in May next year.

CPD's Distinguished Fellow Debapriya Bhattacharya told reporters after the event that the main demands of LDCs are clear -- food security, climate change adaptation fund, access to foreign markets, and foreign direct investments. "Without proper attention from inter-

A public hospital with a difference

DMCH burn unit achieves commendable recovery rate, reduces number of deaths

When success story is rare in public service institutions, the Burn and Plastic Surgery unit at Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) is an exception with increasing recovery rate and sliding death toll since its inception in December 2003.

The specialised unit can now cure patients with 40 percent burns, up from around 32 percent six years ago. Sometimes patients with 55 percent burns are also cured, claim doctors

of the unit.

The commendable success is achieved despite shortage of doctors and nurses. There are 50 doctors and 21 nurses against a requirement of 80 doctors and 125 nurses.

The unit also has no employees though it requires around 200. Only 35 outsiders work there without any remuneration hoping to get the job in future.

Despite all setbacks, the mystery behind the unit's success is nothing but sincere efforts by a SEE PAGE 7 COL 6
