Russia to host 2018 WC, Qatar get 2022 WC

Russia and the tiny Gulf state of Qatar were awarded the 2018 and 2022 World Cups Thursday after an acrimonious bidding war marred by allegations of corruption and illegal deal-making.

The bombshell conclusion to two years of frenzied lobbying saw world football supremo Sepp Blatter reveal the winners following a secret ballot of 22 FIFA executive committee members in Zurich.

The announcement means the World Cup will be staged in two countries which have never hosted the event before following the 2014 tournament in Brazil.

Russia prevailed in the 2018 race, upsetting England and joint bids from Spain and Portugal and Belgium and the Netherlands.

The outcome represented a stunning comeback for Russia, whose campaign had believed to be in trouble after Prime Minister Vladimir Putin declined to join the lobbying effort in

Putin had also launched a stinging attack on England's bid on the eve of the vote, accusing the country's media of "smearing" officials.

But the shock of the day came in the 2022 race, where Qatar beat off stiff competition from the United States, Australia and Asian rivals South Korea and Japan in a remarkable result.

Qatar 2022 bid president Mohammed bin Hamad Al-Thani promised: "We won't let you

down. You will be proud of us, proud of the Middle East."

Qatar's win came despite serious reservations being raised about the logistical problems of staging the football tournament in the Gulf during the searing heat of the summer months.

Although the Qataris have promised to build an array of state of the art stadia which are climate-controlled, the technology has never been tested on a large-scale before.

The results brought the curtain down on the most controversial World Cup votes in years, with FIFA facing myriad allegations of corruption which led to two executive committee members being suspended.

FIFA president Blatter has acknowledged that the decision to stage votes for two tournaments at the same time was a mistake, making illegal horse-trading between bids inevitable.

An increasingly acrimonious climax to the campaign saw Spanish and Russian officials issue veiled attacks earlier Thursday as the respective bids made their final presentations to FIFA voters. Spanish FIFA member Angel Villar Llona hit

out at British media reports which exposed corruption within the organisation, describing them as "slander." Meanwhile in Moscow, Russian Foreign

Minister Sergei Lavrov also hit out at perceived "intrigue and blackmail" surrounding the vote. "We stand for world sport developing

according to its own laws, independent of the political environment," Lavrov said. "And it should especially not be subject to intrigue and blackmail."

The top eight sides are separated by just two points with Marseille leading the charge on 25 points, one clear of Lille and Brest.

A share of the spoils was a justified return for both sides in a balanced encounter.

Rennes, placed fifth, have only one win to show from their last seven games, and they were left to rue an early penalty miss by Jires Kembo Ekoko in the fifth minute.

The spot kick had been awarded when

Marseille keeper Steve Mandana brought down the goal-charging Rennes striker Victor Hugo Montano but Mandana redeemed himself by diving the right way to deny Ekoko.

Rennes coach Frederic Antonetti maintained Mandana should have been sent off.

"I thought after five minutes we were going to find ourselves at 11 against 10, why is it he would have been sent off elsewhere but not

> here? Mandana shouldn't have been allowed to stay on the pitch," he complained.

As for Marseille this was the first time they have failed to find the back of the net in the league this season, although

Argentina international Lucho will wonder how he missed a gilt-edged occasion in the closing stages.

In Wednesday's second match Saint Etienne were on target to end a seven match winless streak when Jeremy Rivere put them ahead against Valenciennes only for the hosts to strike back via Gael Danic 15 minutes from the end for a deserved 1-1 draw.

Unfancied Brest snapped a three-game winless streak on Tuesday with a 4-1 thumping of Lens to go joint top for 24 hours.

Inter Milan chairman Massimo Moratti on Wednesday reflected that former striker Zlatan Ibrahimovic "left Inter the wrong year" as the club completed a rare treble under Jose Mourinho while the player struggled to impress after joining Barcelona.

"I think he left to win the Champions League but he got the wrong year and the great satisfaction of his former teammates is to have won it in that way" without their former centre forward, Moratti told a press conference.

"I find Ibrahimovic a nice guy - I'm not going to criticise him," he added.

Swede Ibrahimovic is now plying his trade across the city at AC Milan after saying prior to his move to Spain that he believed he had progressed as far as he could at Inter.

Schalke keeping Magath

Schalke 04 are to keep faith with embattled coach Felix Magath, the Bundesliga club confirmed after crisis talks late Wednesday.

Magath's future was in question after the Royal Blues were hammered 5-0 by Kaiserslautern last Saturday with one report suggesting former Tottenham boss Christian Gross was being lined up as a replacement.

But Schalke directors emerged from a two hour meeting with Magath to confirm they were sticking by their manager.

"Felix Magath explained to us what he has planned to improve our situation and he convinced us," Schalke president Clemens Tonnies said. The directors also denied

the report in the Die Zeit weekly of approaching Gross. Despite having qualified for the last 16 of the

Champions League, Schalke are 15th in the league table. Schalke face Bayern Munich on Saturday in the German league.

But the result threatened to be overshadowed by a mass pitch invasion after the final whistle that saw thousands of City fans take to the field

and confront Villa supporters, with missiles being thrown. Birmingham 2 (Larsson 12-pen, Zigic Nikola Zagic's goal six minutes from time saw Birmingham through to the

last four and gave the Blues

a measure of revenge over Villa manager Gerard Houllier. Serbia international Zigic's deflected shot settled the tie after Villa's Gabriel Agbonlahor had cancelled out an early Sebastian Larsson

penalty. Houllier was Liverpool's manager when they defeated Birmingham in the 2001

League Cup final. In Wednesday's other quarterfinal, underfire manager Roy Keane guided second-tier Ipswich to a 1-0 win over Premier League side

West Brom at Portman Road thanks to Grant Leadbitter's second-half penalty. Birmingham will now play West Ham, 4-0 conquerors of holders Manchester United on Tuesday, in a two-legged semifinal next month when Ipswich will face Arsenal after the Gunners 2-0 win over Wigan. The Blues' win over Villa was their first over

their local rivals for five and a half years. They went ahead against the run of play after Lee Bowyer was brought down by Villa

captain Richard Dunne. Larsson sent the resulting penalty low to

beat American keeper Brad Friedel. Birmingham


thought they'd scored again after 28 minutes when Zigic's low shot was pulled back by Friedel when replays suggested it may have crossed the goal-line. But a linesman's

Villa nearly pushed the tie into extra-time when Ciaran Clark headed just over from Stewart Downing's cross.


