"I'm excited to be launching Spinners by Shane Warne globally. It's no secret that I've always loved India. It's a beautiful country and the people are as passionate about cricket."



newly-installed floodlights failed to beam lights on the entire cricket ground. This not only forced the cancellation of Bangladesh's fielding practice yesterday, but also prompted match referee Chris Broad to have a late inspection of the venue and a declaration that the 'lights are unfit for a daynight match'.

"It is official now, the match will start from 9:00am," confirmed Gazi Ashraf Hossain, the organising secretary for the fivematch series.

"I talked to Chris Broad on behalf of the board and we took the consent of Zimbabwe Cricket (ZC). Their CEO [Ozias Bvute] talked to us and agreed to play the day game," added the former national captain, also Bangladesh Cricket Board's tournament committee secretary.

Both teams agreed the morning start from the onset when the light situation first surfaced and it was just left to the ICC match referee to give a decision on the matter.

The late development, the BCB only confirming the news via e-mail at 8:52pm last night, will put the fans in a lot of trouble. Those unlucky not to have known of the change would only get the necessary information this morning, although some might get the news through a few websites.

"We are very sorry to the fans who now have to come to the ground in the morning. But it was an undue incident that was out of our control. The light towers are fully illuminated but they

are not focused properly on the ground," said Gazi Ashraf. When the Tigers arrived after sunset yesterday, the trouble

MAHBUB'S DEATH

Murder case filed with Bandar police

Swapna Begum, wife of late sprinter Mahbub Alam, yesterday filed a murder case with Narayanganj Bandar Police Station implicating Mahbub's co-passenger and former coach Mohammad Yahia as the prime accused while Bangladesh Athletics Federation's (BAF) general secretary Shah Alam and his allies as the secondary defen-

Mahbub Alam, a gold medal-winning sprinter of the South Asian Games and twotime national champion, met a tragic death in a road accident on the Dhaka-Chittagong highway near Kanchpur Bridge early Saturday morning when the microbus carrying him and Yahia hit a stationary truck on the roadside.

Both Yahia and the driver of the vehicle suffered minor injuries while Mahbub apparently died on the spot.

Mahbub's family alleged that the dead body laid unattended while Yahia and the driver were both taken to hospital for treatment.

Sub-inspector of Bandar Police Binay Krishna Kar informed that the case alleged that the accident was preplanned.

Mukhlesur Rahman, brother-in-law of the deceased, claimed no postmortem was done on the dead body after former general secretary of BAF Ibrahim Chengis insisted on bringing the body back to Dhaka without an autopsy.

Chengis though refuted such claim saying that the autopsy was not carried out with consent from Mukhlesur's elder brother Nurul Islam.

Meanwhile the chief accused of the case Yahia could not be reached for his version of the incident as his family members claimed he

was kept under sedative. The other defendant Shah Alam, when contacted, expressed his disbelief at being named as an accused in the case. He said he only went to see the body along with

minus their captain Elton Chigumbura.

The timing of the match, having changed from the scheduled day-night to the day game due to trouble with the floodlights at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur, did not sway the Tigers team management into making any changes. "The team will be unchanged. There will be some moisture in the morning and there is a forecast of cloud and rain," said chief selector Rafigul Alam.

Bangladesh bounced back from the first match 9-run defeat to the Zimbabweans with a six-wicket triumph in the second game. Abdur Razzak's hattrick and five-for, a four-wicket haul from skipper Shakib Al Hasan and half-centuries by Rokibul Hasan and Junaed Siddiqui ensured a convincing comeback after Zimbabwe's bowling and fielding thwarted them last Wednesday.

But now the visitors are also going into the crucial match without their captain as Prosper Utseya is set to lead the side out as the stand-in.

"Elton [Chigumbura] suffered a groin injury and he has not recovered sufficiently. Prosper Utseya will be the stand-in captain in his absence," confirmed a Zimbabwe Cricket (ZC) spokesman.

Earlier in the day when all the commotion was far away, Zimbabwe wicketkeeper Tatenda Taibu said that his team were aware of the low-scoring nature of the pitch, leading to them scoring just 209 and 191 respectively in the two matches so far.

"We are not worried at all [about not making bigger scores]. We knew that there are low-scoring wickets here. So we just have to stay at the crease, accumulate runs and make sure we don't lose wickets," said Taibu.
