HC gets four new judges

Four new additional judges were appointed in the High Court Division of the Supreme Court for two years yesterday.

President Zillur Rahman made the appointments in accordance with article 98 of the constitution.

The new judges are Bhabani Prashad Singh, district judge on leave prior to retirement (LPR); M Anwarul Haque, secretary to the law and justice department of the ministry of law, justice and parliamentary affairs; Deputy Attorney General Akram Hossain Chowdhury; and Supreme Court lawyer Md Ashraful

Their appointment will take effect from the day of their taking oath. The number of the HC judges now stands at 94.

Upon forming government, the Awami League-led grand alliance has so far appointed 42 judges in the HC.

World Human Rights Day today

The World Human Rights Day will be observed in the country as elsewhere across the globe today.

On this day in 1948, the Universal Human Rights Charter was signed in Paris, and its principles and philosophy were later included in various international human rights charters for implementation in many countries.

On the eve of the 62nd anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights Day, UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon said human rights are the foundation of freedom, peace, development and justice -- and the heart of the work of the United Nations around the world.

In a message, Ban Ki-moon called upon all states to ensure freedom of expression and freedom of assembly that make their work possible.

On the occasion, different rights groups have chalked out elaborate programmes, including discussions and rallies in Bangladesh.

crash 'unusual incident'

Says communications minister

Communications Minister Syed Abul Hossain yesterday termed Wednesday's train accident in Narsingdi an 'unusual incident' and said it is difficult to say whether it was an accident or sabo-

Referring to various casualty figures in the media, the minister said seven people were killed and 29 others injured in the accident.

Of the injured, 23 people were brought to Dhaka for better treatment and the rest are being treated at local hospitals in Narsingdi, he added.

"I saw and heard about many train accidents both at home and abroad. Accidents may occur.

"But it is unusual that a passenger coach will ride on another. I never saw such a train accident," said the minister in a statement at parliament.

Citing formation of a probe body, he said, "Proper steps will be taken based on the probe body's findings."

Bangladesh Railway formed a four-member committee to probe the accident. Headed by railway's Chief Engineer (East Zone) Yusuf Ali Mridha, the committee has been asked to come up with a report within the next 48 hours.

The minister, who rushed to the spot on Wednesday, said many journalists asked me whether it was an accident or sabotage.

"But I could not answer their questions since the accident was unusual. I will inform the nation in detail through parliament on receiving the probe report."

He assured of providing financial compensation to the deceased, injured and others affected, according to railway laws. Besides, he urged the prime minister to see if additional compensation can be given to the victims.

Earlier, Narsingdi-3 AL lawmaker Zahirul Haque Mohan, who rushed to the spot with the communications minister, raised the issue in parliament.

Star that a gang of around 10 criminals swooped on Prince with sharp weapons just as he opened the gate on the ground floor around 4:30am.

She, quoting victim's family members, said he bled profusely and some portions of his intestines came out through the wounds.

Family members immediately rushed him to Police and victim's family members could nearby Popular Hospital but were denied admission and even first aid, she said, adding that Prince was then taken to DMCH.

She said Prince came down to the ground floor from his flat on the first floor of the twostoried building on hearing the doorbell and opened the gate, as he could not find the security guard at the door.

Teachers, media professionals, lawyers, students and common people took part in the programmes.


Rokeya Haq, vice-chairman of Savar Upazila Parishad chaired the discussion moderated by Atiqur Rahman, area manager of TIB.
