Egypt set **USA** date

The United States will visit Egypt for a football friendly against the reigning Africa Cup of Nations champions on February 9 at Cairo, the US Soccer Federation announced Monday.

The Americans have beaten the seven-time Africa Cup winners in their only prior meetings, the most recent a 3-0 triumph over the Pharoahs at the 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup in South Africa.

The other US triumph also came at a neutral venue, a 3-1 victory at Seoul in 1987.

US coach Bob Bradley was excited about the chance for the American side to play a first-ever match in Egypt ahead of next June's Gold Cup tournament, the North American continental championship.


"Egypt is an extremely talented and competitive team," Bradley said. "Their performances in the Confederations Cup and the Africa Cup of Nations have demonstrated their ability to challenge the top teams in the "To play against the cham-

pions of Africa in what will be a fantastic environment in Cairo is a great opportunity." The Americans open their

2011 campaign on January 22 against Chile at Los Angeles. The Pharoahs, ranked 10th

in the world by FIFA, went undefeated to win this year's Africa Cup of Nations with Mohamed Nagy scoring five goals and captain Ahmed Hassan being named player of the tournament.

However, unlike the United States they failed to qualify for the World Cup finals, losing in a play-off to bitter rivals Algeria.



Park fires MU atop

South Korea international Park Ji-Sung's sixth goal of the season sent Manchester United two points clear at the top of the Premier League table after they beat former leaders Arsenal 1-0 at Old Trafford here on Monday.

United, who also have a game in hand over all their title rivals, could even afford the luxury of a missed penalty 17 minutes from time when Wayne Rooney fired wildly over the bar after Gael Clichy was adjudged to have handled

inside his own area. It was hardly a vintage performance but United, who visit reigning champions Chelsea on Sunday, were full value for a fifth successive home win which meant they also retained their unbeaten Premier League record this season.

United manager Sir Alex Ferguson was delighted by Park's display, telling Sky Sports: "His record against Arsenal is very good and he's been in fantastic form, the lad. "Unfortunately we are going to lose him after December 26 for

the Asia Cup, so we are going to miss him for seven matches, which is disappointing." This was United's first league game in 16 days. Ferguson's team

have been eliminated from the League Cup, held by Valencia in the Champions League and knocked off the Premier League summit since they stuck seven past Blackburn last month. Yet they went into the first of two titanic back-to-back games

knowing victory would send them back to the top ahead of the trip to Chelsea. There was little to choose between the two teams in a predict-

ably tightly-fought first half in which chances were at a premium. Wenger sprang a major surprise before kick off by handing young Poland keeper Wojciech Szczesny his first league start as Lukasz Fabianski was unfit.

And Szczesny, half the age of United's 40-year-old veteran Edwin van der Sar, had a relatively trouble free first-half. Rooney did sting Szczesny's finger-tips from 22-yards in the

ninth minute, but it was one of few saves the youngster was called to make in a tense and edgy game.

Arsenal, who started with Cesc Fabregas on the substitutes bench, responded through Marouane Chamakh but the striker's header failed to trouble van der Sar.

As the game wore on, it became apparent that one moment of quality would secure the points.

And just as Arsenal thought they had done enough to go in at the interval on level terms, United broke the deadlock in the 41st minute through Park.

Despite being one of the smallest players on the pitch, the midfielder was allowed to leap above the visitors' defence and

Van Marwijk to quit after **Euro 2012**

Dutch coach Bert van Marwijk says he intends to quit his post and return to club football after Euro 2012, Dutch magazine NUsport on Tuesday quoted him as saying.

"I think I will leave my post as national coach after 2012. I will be at the end of my contract and it will be time to think of something else," said the 58-year-old who guided the Dutch to the World Cup final in the summer where they lost to Spain.

He added he was thinking of a return to club manage-Netherlands.

"My preference would be Germany, England or Spain. Various clubs have already contacted me but for the time being my heart still lies with the Oranje," said Van Marwijk, who has coach Feyenoord and Germany's Borussia Dortmund.

Van Marwijk succeeded Marco van Basten two years ago in the national job and under his tutelage the Dutch have, as well as their World Cup run, started off strongly in the Euro 2012 qualifiers as they target a berth in the finals in Poland and Ukraine.

Lyon suffer triple blow

Lyon will be without defenders Cris and Pape Diakhate and French international midfielder Jeremy Toulalan for Sunday's clash at French champions Marseille, the club revealed on Monday. Both Toulalan and Diakhate

missed last Sunday's 2-0 victory over Toulouse, the former with a recurrence of a left thigh injury, but the latter's absence was not explained.

Cris became a doubt for the Marseille match when the Brazilian veteran finished the Toulouse game with a painful

groin. French international rightback Anthony Reveillere, meanwhile, is another doubt after he went off before the final whistle with a calf problem.

Better news for Lyon was that Argentine attacking midfielder Cesar Delgado made a return to action in a reserve game on Sunday, while French international midfielder Yoann Gourcuff is also back in training after suffering an injury in a Champions League match

with Schalke three weeks ago. Lyon are presently third in the title race as they chase their first league crown in three years, two points adrift of leaders Lille, while Marseille are fifth, a further two points behind.



Big Sam sacked

sacked as manager of Blackburn Rovers with immediate effect on Monday after nearly two years in charge, the English Premier League club announced on their official

website.

Also on the way out of Ewood Park was Allardyce's assistant, Neil McDonald, with first team coach Steve Kean placed in temporary charge.

A stunned Allardyce, in a statement issued via England's League Managers' Association (LMA), said: "I am very shocked and disappointed to be leaving Blackburn Rovers.

"I am extremely proud to have managed this club and I enjoyed a fantastic relationship with the players, my staff and the supporters during my time in charge. I now wish them and the football club every success for the future."

LMA chief executive Richard Bevan said Allardyce, as happened when he was at Newcastle, had paid the price for being in the post when the club had been sold.

"When new owners take over a club, sadly, the manager's position often hangs by a thread,' Bevan said.

Diego for Rovers?

Argentine legend Diego Maradona is being lined up as the new manager of Blackburn Rovers, according to a report in the Daily Mirror.

Rovers' new owners, Balaji and Venkatesh Rao, are determined to make the club sexier, and to do that they are determined to bring in someone with iconic status. The overall plan, the Mirror claims, is to help launch Venky's as a UK-wide fast food chain.

The newspaper quoting "an insider" at the VH Group claimed that "Maradona is seen as the right profile for the VH Group."

Given Maradona's well-known weakness for fast food, they might just be on to something.

In terms of football management, the picture is less clear. After two abortive starts in club coaching in South America the 50-year-old was handed the reins of the Argentina national team in 2008. He led a nation with an absurd array of talent to their worst ever defeat, a 6-1 loss to Bolivia, during a spell which almost saw them fail to qualify for the World Cup, though he did turn things round subsequently.

Big Sam's sacking takes up plenty of column inches, with The Daily Telegraph and The Sun reporting slightly less entertaining reasons for him getting the boot: a dispute over having players bought against his wishes in the January transfer window.

The Telegraph claims that the new owners at Blackburn want to bring in Rangers striker Kris Boyd and former Hull man Geovanni. The Daily Mail is not so sure, quoting Allardyce himself claiming, "it has still not really been explained to me and I am a bit confused in my own head as to why."

Still, it's not all bad for Sam. At least he can sit around the house counting his pay-off - either £1.5 or £2.5 million depending on who you believe - while he figures out what happened.

Wales appoint Speed

Gary Speed has been appointed as the new manager of the Wales national team on a three-and-a-halfyear contract, the Football Association of Wales (FAW) announced here on Tuesday.

The 41-year-old former

Wales captain was given permission by English Championship side Sheffield United, where he had been the manager, to speak to the FAW, who wanted him as their firstchoice successor to John Toshack.

Wales had been without a manager since Toshack's exit on September 9.

Several candidates, including caretaker boss Brian Flynn and former Sweden national manager Lars Lagerback, were interviewed last week before the FAW opted for Speed, who holds a Welsh record 85 caps for an outfield player.
