Workers of three readymade garment factories, two in Gazipur and one in the capital, yesterday staged separate demonstrations over a host of

The Dhaka-Mymensingh Highway was blockaded for two hours by the workers of Moonlit Garments in Gazipur in protest of wage discrimination against them.

Joydevpur police said several hundred vehicles were gridlocked on the highway around 9:00am due to the protest that cooled after their intervention.

Moonlit's workers said the authorities pay them as per the new wage scale being implemented from November. But junior workers benefit more than the senior ones according to the new pay scale, they claimed. They also alleged that the authorities have

reduced wage rate for extra hours' duty for both senior and junior workers.

A correspondent from Gazipur reports Moonlit's administration told the workers that they would look into the matter.

Officer-in-charge Abdur Rashid of Joydevpur Police Station said they chased the

workers who put the blockade even after the

authorities assured inquiry into the matter. Additional police have been deployed in the area to avert any untoward incident, he added. Workers of ABC Dyeing Factory in the capi-

tal's Kadomtoli staged staged a sit-in protesting closure of the factory. ABC's authorities declared the factory shut

for an indefinite period on Monday following unrest by workers over wages. Tuesday was the weekly holiday of the factory. Officer-in-charge Aiyubur Rahman o

RMG workers block road Road crashes kill 11, injure 34

Eleven people were killed and 34 others injured in separate road accidents in Sirajganj, Gaibandha, Brahmanbaria, Pabna, Netrakona and Gazipur on Tuesday and yesterday.

Our Sirajganj correspondent reports: A truck rammed a CNG-run auto rickshaw at Hatikumrul on the western side of Bangabandhu Bridge at about 7:30am, killing four people and injuring four others.

The deceased are Rahim Uddin, 48, of Shribaspara village in Salanga upazila of Sirajganj, his wife Hajera Banu, 42, Joynal Abedin, 35, of Gaibandha Sadar upazila and Aqidul Islam, 26, of Brahmakhola village in Sirajganj town.

Dinabandhu Das, officer-in-charge of Hatikumrul Highway Police Station, said Hazera died on the spot while her husband, three-wheeler driver Aqidul, and Joynal, who were standing beside the highway during the accident, succumbed to their injuries at Sirajganj General Hospital.

The truck driver fled the scene soon

after the accident.

Three people were killed in a head-on collision between a truck and a pick-up van on the Rangpur-Bogra Highway in Gobindaganj upazila on Wednesday.

Highway police said a Rangpur-bound goods-laden truck collided head-on with a pick-up van at about 4:00am Truck driver Jahangir Alam, pick-up

van driver Shafi Alam and van passenger Uzzal Chandra Singh died on the spot. Our correspondent from Brahmanbaria

Leading ecologists yesterday called for an environment revolution in the country cautioning that public health and sustainable development will be at stake soon otherwise.

Nishat suggested that the government frame laws making obligatory for the businesses to follow corporate social responsibility (CSR).

He said the oil spill in the Bay will

cause devastating effects in the Bay and the Sundarbans. The whole planning of industries in Bangladesh is flawed, said Dr Moinul Islam Sharif, fellow of Bangladesh Centre

for Advanced Studies. He added that if all industries were in zone, authorities could easily enforce laws for effluent treatment plants. Majority of the industries do not main-

tain ecological standards, mainly because

they are not aware of the issue and technologies, said Dr Sharif. "There is also no strong pressure group. Massive awareness has to be created for this." Danish Ambassador in Dhaka, Svend Olling, said Denmark could be an example

In another session on anti-corruption, Chief Information Commissioner Muhammad Zamir said low wage for the public officials and even the judges is one of the major obstacles in curbing corruption.

Right to Information (RTI) Act could greatly help establish transparency and accountability, but lack of logistics for the designated officers at the public offices is hindering effective application of RTI, he He said corruption is rampant all over

Europe and India, but Bangladesh's corruption is highlighted too much. He urged the NGOs to "work more and talk less" to help curb corruption. Iftekharuzzaman, executive director of Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB), said holding the public

officials accountable is equally important

as providing better compensation. Comptroller and Auditor General, Ahmed Ataul Hakeem, said, "We are involved in corruption so much so that we can't differ which is corruption and which is not."

It will be just like a social cancer unless corruption is curbed with strong hand, he said suggesting rewarding the honest people to check corruption.

Manusher Jonno Foundation Executive Director Shaheen Anam said corruption appears to be a normal activity in Bangladesh and corrupt and powerful people are well accepted, which is sad. She urged all to use RTI Act to hold both

public and private sectors accountable. Mamunal H Khan of UNDP also spoke at the programme chaired by BEI President Farooq Sobhan.
