Bangladesh among best spots for IT outsourcing

Bangladesh has carved its place among the world's best destinations for IT outsourcing, largely thanks to its low cost, according to a study by a leading research and consulting firm.

Bangladesh usually offers an attractive cost proposition for the investors, as its low salary level and low-cost of living are ideal for jobs that are commoditised and have low risk, said the study conducted by Gartner in its annual listing of top countries for IT outsourcing globally.

"Bangladesh is an emerging country from an offshore location perspective, but ranks poorly in language, infrastructure and data and intellectual property security," the research said.

"Although it offers a good cost proposition, the government has to address many issues such as education, infrastructure and data security or IP protection in order to propel the top ranks," said Gartner, which has put Bangladesh on its list of top 30 destinations for global IT outsourcing for 2010-11.

This is the first time that Bangladesh has been listed in the top ranking by any global research company on IT outsourcing and has been placed on par with China, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Vietnam in Asia.

list along with eight other countries that have made it for the first time to the Top 30 of the Gartner ranking.

"The country offers an attractive cost proposition, given its low salary levels and low cost of living," said the study, which took into account ten separate criteria for rating the individual destinations.

The criteria include language, government support, labour pool, infrastructure, educational system, "The achievement is significant cost, political and economical environment, cultural compatibility,

global and legal maturity as well as data and Intellectual Property Security and Privacy.

Bangladesh has been ranked 'very good' in the criteria of cost, according to the Gartner findings while rating 'fair' in all criteria apart from the areas of language, infrastructure and data and IP security and privacy.

Noting that Bangladesh's cost of living is one of the lowest in the world, the report found that the median salary per annum of a software engineer or developer in Bangladesh is about \$5,070, while the median salary of a senior software engineer is \$7,300 and that of an IT manager is \$9,734.

"In recent years, the government has taken several bold steps in boosting the country's IT industry, which has been partly reflected in this rating," said State Minister for Science and ICT Yeafish Osman.

"Most recently, the office of electronic signature certifying authority has been set up for authorising a digital signature system, while a cyber security policy is going to be formulated and cyber tribunals are going to be formed to address the cyber crime issue," he added.

The Gartner report finds the country's PC penetration and teledensity 'low' and the overall English language competency 'poor' while stating that the essential infrastructure elements such as electricity, airways and rail networks are not up to the global standard.

The central bank has detected a case of sending a fake circular to different banks using the name of Bangladesh Bank. The central bank has alerted the banks to the fraud case.

The fake circular "directed" the banks to take the subscription fees paid to international news agency Reuters by different local news agencies, in local currency instead of foreign currency.

It also said the "chief executive officer" (CEO) of Reuters in Bangladesh and the BB entered into an agreement that the fees against the services of the international news agency should be paid in local cur-

The circular also said if the banks

did not comply with the directive, action would be taken against them under anti-money laundering law. The fake circular, issued on

December 9, was sent to different banks by courier. As the circular raised suspicion

among the officials of the private banks, an official brought the matter to the notice of the central bank yesterday. Bangladesh Bank Governor Atiur Rahman held a meeting with the

BB to review Tk 200cr fund for shipbuilders

.......... The booming shipbuilding industry may get a Tk 200 crore refinancing fund, as the Bangladesh Bank (BB) will review the scheme tomorrow at its board meet-

The central bank is keen to start funding the industry under the scheme, said an official of the central bank vesterday.

The BB earlier sanctioned the fund to give a further boost to the sector, which is considered to be the country's second largest export industry after readymade garment.

Once approved, shipbuilders will get loan at a 10 percent interest rate. The other criteria of the scheme will be disclosed elaborately after the finance ministry's approval, the BB official added.

Industry insiders said the much expected refinancing is being delayed due to an apprehension that such funding may influence the rising inflation.

But people from the banking sector, dismissing the fear, said the fund is too small to impact inflation.

High financing cost is the only bottleneck in the growing industry, said Abdullahhel Bari, president of Association of Export Oriented Shipbuilding Industries of Bangladesh.

Govt moves to curb sea fishing

After years of inertia, the government has moved to curb indiscriminate fishing by engine boats in the Bay of Bengal.

As part of the initiative, the Ministry of Fisheries and Livestock has sought help from the Attorney General's Office for quick disposal of temporary fishing related cases at the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court.

The ministry is also supplying evidence and documents to the Attorney General's Office so these can be presented in court.

Trawlers that are engaged in temporary fishing in the Bay on High Court orders will be at the heart of the legal battle.

"It's our top priority to protect the marine fish stocks for the future. We are supplying documents and evidence to get the verdict in our favour," said M Shamsul Kibria, joint secretary of the fisheries ministry.

Also, Bangladesh Marine Fisheries Association (BMFA), a body of the officially approved trawler owners, signed up as a co-petitioner to move against the High Court directive that allowed dozens of small trawlers to go fishing in the Bay.

Now 56 small trawlers fish in the sea based on a trial fishing permission. In addition, 113 officially approved trawlers and nearly 44,000 fishing engine and non-engine boats ply the sea regularly, threatening the sustainability of the marine fish stock.

Kibria said the government has taken the matter seriously. "We have taken a move to overturn permission for trial fishing," he said.

To fast-track the disposal of the appeals, an inter-ministerial meeting was held last month at the fisheries ministry where Attorney General Mahbubey Alam was present.

In the past, the Appellate Division heard these cases but they remained unsettled due to negligence of the government, insiders said.

The High Court on several occasions issued orders to the government to allow these trawlers into temporary fishing, which the government impounded during illegal fishing in Bangladesh's territory. The authorities later auctioned these trawlers on condition that they would not be reused for fishing.

But buyers of these seized trawlers, hiding the bonds of not to use these for fishing, sought directives from the High Court saying that they would face financial losses unless these trawlers were allowed to fish, they added.


Monowarul Hoque, vice president of BMFA, said the association decided to place arguments along with the government in a bid to stop trial and illegal fishing.

"Uncontrolled and illegal fishing has wiped out marine fish stocks in many countries. That's why we are worried."

The rise in uncontrolled and illegal fishing not only harms the existing stocks but also threatens investment, Hoque added.
