A park killed 15 years ago

DCC built community centre at Narinda Park, more structures came up over the years

Fatima, a student of class ten at Bangla Bazar Government Girls High School, spent her entire childhood confined within her house in Narinda for lack of open space for outdoor

"Watching TV and playing games on computer are the ways I entertain myself," said Fatima.

Twenty-five years old Rohijan, Fatima's sister, who used to play at Narinda Park when she was a child, said in those days there were slides, swings and see-saws in the park.

"My daughter Muskan, a student of playgroup at Maitri Kindergarten, is tired of being cooped up like a chicken in a farm as there is no open space," said Nazrul Islam, a resident of

"Even her school doesn't have space open 1969. enough for children to run around," he added.

Places like Narinda Park and Bagan Bari Math which were favourite haunts of young children don't exist today, he added.

The Narinda Park, one of the most affected parks in the city, now remains only in papers as Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) constructed a community centre on the park 15 years ago followed by a multi-storey mosque, ten years

The park with 0.33 acres of land in ward 77 had a few amenities to entertain children but those vanished after the construction of the two concrete structures leaving no scope for anyone to recognise that there was a park even around five years back, the locals said.

Asif Ahmed, a resident of Narinda, said the park had been there as far as he could remember and served as an amusement park for children. Asif had been living in Narinda since

Forest dept move worries hill people

The Department of Forest has moved to take control of a vasi area declared as reserved forest in three Chittagong Hill Tracts districts, putting thousands of indigenous hill people in fear of becoming landless.

Hill people say their homes and livelihoods will be jeopardised if the district administrations of Rangamati, Khagrachhari, and Bandarban hand over the forestland to DoF. Two decades ago 12,849 acres of forest in 6 mouzas under

Dighinala upazila of Khagrachhari, was declared as reserved. In a letter on October 12, Divisional Forest Officer (Jhum Control) in Rangamati ABM Abdul Barik requested Deputy Commissioner (DC) of Khagrachhari Anis-ul Haque to hand over the forest land.

Of the forestland to be handed over, 1,400 acres are in 55 Hazachara Mouza, 4,600 acres in 28 Renkazya, 1,750 acres in 29 SEE PAGE 19 COL 7 POLLS SECURITY

BNP demands Law being used to serve petty interest

Speakers at roundtable express concern over rule of law

Rule of law in the country is at stake now as people are worried they won't get justice from the existing system, said speakers at a roundtable yesterday.

The speakers also stressed the need for a mass movement saying rule of law won't be established until transparency and accountability are ensured in every sector.

They criticised lawmakers, lawenforcement agencies and the judiciary for violating laws and said law is now being used in the interest of politics and certain individuals.

Shushashoner Janney Nagorik (Shujan), a platform of civil society members, organised the roundtable titled "Current state of rule of law in Bangladesh" at the Jatiya Press Club in the capital.

Shujan President Prof Muzaffer Ahmad said people expected a democratic environment after the national polls but it could not be achieved.

"Rule of law is now questioned as there is no such situation in the country where people can expect justice," he said. Even efforts are on to snatch people's rights through use of law, he added.

Journalists' death toll reaches 105 this year

Mexico, Pakistan most dangerous places for them, says media watchdog

Some 105 journalists have been killed while doing their job this year, media watchdog Press Emblem Campaign said yesterday, describing the killing of reporters as an "epidemic with no cure."

Fewer fatalities have been reported this year compared to 2009 when 122 journalists died, but the toll is nevertheless higher than the 91 deaths recorded in 2008. "The killing of journalists has become an

epidemic with no cure," noted the watchdog's secretary-general Blaise Lempen.

"The international community has not found solutions to it, or put in place effective mechanisms for bringing the perpetrators of those crimes against journalists to trial," he

Mexico and Pakistan are the two most dangerous countries for media workers this year.

Fourteen journalists were killed in Mexico's drug war, while another 14 fatalities were reported in Pakistan, most of them occurring in the border areas with Afghanistan.

Over five years, some 529 journalists have been killed, with Iraq topping the list as the SEE PAGE 19 COL 3
