## Corruption in China 'still very serious'

Says a govt report

China yesterday admitted its corruption problem was "still very serious" and pledged to work harder to crush widespread official graft and win the public's confidence.

In a new government report on the anticorruption drive, the communist rulers in Beijing reiterated that the country's "harmony and stability" depended on efforts to build a clean government.

It said the ruling party had shifted its efforts to stamp out graft in the past decade to focus on senior officials who collude with corrupt businessmen or shield underworld figures, as well as cases "that cause mass disturbances".

"So far, China's effort to combat corruption... has yielded notable results," said the report issued by the State Council, or cabinet.

But it warned that "corruption persists, with some cases even involving huge sums of money. The situation in combating corruption is still very serious, and the tasks are still abundant," it said.

The government and the Communist Party pledged to "resolutely punish and effectively prevent corruption with more resolutions and

powerful measures, so as to win the people's confidence with actual achievements".

The report highlights new rules that went into effect earlier this year that require government officials to report their incomes, investments, personal assets and whereabouts of family members.

Corrupt officials in China have a long history of funnelling ill-gotten gains into the bank accounts of relatives or to family members

Wu Yuliang, member of the Communist Party's central disciplinary committee, told a press conference on the report that more curbs on "extravagant expenses" such as official travel, purchasing cars and banquets would be implemented.

Wu added that the focus of government and party anti-corruption efforts would be "institutional building", meaning efforts to structure the political system in a way that prevented corruption.

"The cause of corruption is complicated," Wu said. "Institutional building is a systematic process that will take time... (but) the party and government is fully capable of curbing corruption to the lowest level.'

## Suicide attacks kill four in Iraq

Two suicide bombers yesterday killed four policemen in a police station in the northern city of Mosul, including an officer who oversaw a deadly raid on militants, Iraqi security officials said.

A third bomber was shot dead before setting off his explosives belt in the attack targeting Lieutenant Colonel Shamil Ahmed Oglah, who commanded the operation last week against an Al-Qaeda affiliate, a police officer said.

The early morning bombings killed Oglah and three other policemen, an interior ministry source said, and destroyed most of the police station in the Qabr al-Binat area of western Mosul, according to the police officer.

The officer said Oglah had commanded an operation in western Mosul in which a leader of the Islamic State of Iraq, Al-Qaeda's Iraqi affiliate, was killed.

## Indians to outnumber Chinese in 2025

Says US Census Bureau forecast

India is on course to top China as the world's most populous country in 2025, the US Census Bureau forecast, potentially changing the dynamics between the Asian giants.

The latest Census Bureau estimates out this week, which are in line with previous studies, predicted that India would have 1.396 billion people in 2025, surpassing China, whose population growth is more modest.

China since 1980 has allowed most women to bear only one child, in a controversial policy aimed at creating a more sustainable population.

The average Chinese woman now has 1.5 children in her lifetime, compared with 2.7 children for the average Indian woman, although the so-called fertility rate has also been declining in India due to rising education and urbanization. The demographic shift could affect the Asian powers' econo-

mies, which are now among the world's fastest. China has enjoyed a stronger growth rate than India as young

people flock to manufacturing hubs that pump out exports for the world. But China in coming years will likely face a shrinking labor force and a mass of pensioners.

The US Census Bureau forecast that the ranking of the largest countries would otherwise remain the same in the coming 15 years. The United States -- whose population is growing more quickly than most wealthy countries, albeit at a slower rate than in recent

decades -- will remain the third largest nation, followed by Indonesia, Brazil, Pakistan, Bangladesh and Nigeria, the figures showed.

## Russia cargo jet crash kills 12

A giant Antonov cargo plane crashed during a training exercise in central Russia, leaving all 12 military pilots aboard the aircraft missing and presumed dead, officials said yesterday.

Rescue workers and investigators were battling thick snow as they combed the crash site -- a field hemmed in by forest -- for the pilots' bodies and black boxes of the An-22 military plane which disappeared from radar screens late Tuesday and went down after an explosion, officials said.

The cargo plane -- one of the world's largest -- with 12 pilots but no cargo on board, had been performing a training exercise on its way from Voronezh to Tver in central Russia when it came down, said a spokeswoman for military prosecutors of the Moscow military district.

## Pakistan's ruling party in crisis negotiations

Pakistan's US-allied ruling party scrambled yesterday to keep its fragile coalition government in power as its senior leaders met with two dissident political partners, urging them to rejoin the Cabinet.

A leader of one of the disgruntled parties, however, reiterated demands that the prime minister quit or be fired.

The political turmoil threatens to distract Pakistani lawmakers from tackling challenges ranging from a struggling economy to an Islamist insurgency that deeply worries U.S. officials overseeing the war in neighboring Afghanistan.

The Pakistan People's Party-led government faces a crisis with the secular Muttahida Qaumi Movement party quitting its two cabinet posts but remaining in the ruling coalition for now, while the Islamist Jamiat Ulema Islam party said it would defect to the opposition benches.

If the MQM decides to follow the JUI into the opposition, it could cost Prime Minister Yousuf Raza Gilani the parliamentary majority he needs to continue his almost three-year-old govern-

In an effort to forestall a possible collapse, Interior Minister Rehman Malik, a senior PPP lawmaker and envoy of President Asif Ali Zardari, held crisis meetings with MQM and JUI leaders overnight yesterday, urging them to support an increasingly unpopular government and to remain part of the policymaking cabinet.

Malik asked the MQM leadership at a face-toface meeting in the southern port city of Karachi to keep the key party's two Cabinet posts, local media reported.

JUI leader Maulana Fazlur Rehman's aide, Hafiz Hussain Ahmad, however, said their party would only return to the government if Zardari sacked Gilani. The premier must be punished for stirring up tensions when he dumped a JUI lawmaker from his Cabinet, Ahmad said.

The JUI has refused an offer to nominate a replacement Cabinet minister from its ranks.

"We will only consider working with the ruling party if President Asif Ali Zardari sacks Gilani," Ahmad said yesterday following Rehman's meeting with Malik in the capital Islamabad.

## Abbas heads to Brazil to found Palestinian embassy

Palestinian president Mahmud Abbas was to travel to Brazil later yesterday to lay the symbolic foundation stone of a Palestinian embassy in Brasilia.

The ceremony is to take place on Friday and comes after Brazil announced it was recognising a Palestinian state based on the borders which existed before the 1967 Six-Day War when Israel seized the West Bank, including east Jerusalem, and the Gaza Strip. On Saturday, Abbas is due to attend the inauguration of Brazil's

new president, Dilma Rousseff, and expected to hold meetings with Latin American leaders in Brazil for the ceremony. Brazil's outgoing President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva said on

December 3 that his country would recognise a Palestinian state following a personal request from Abbas. "The demand presented by his excellency (Abbas) is just and consistent with the principles upheld by Brazil with regard to the

Palestinian issue," Brazil's foreign ministry said. The announcement angered both Israel and the United States, which have said a Palestinian state can only be achieved

But a string of other Latin American countries, including Bolivia, Argentina and Ecuador, have followed suit, and Uruguay has said it will recognise a Palestinian state on the same basis in 2011.

## Navy to get submarine Iran's ex-president sees rise in poll 'restrictions'

Former president turned opposition backer Mohammed Khatami predicts that more and more "restrictions" will be imposed on elections in Iran, an opposition website reported yesterday.

Khatami said all sections of Iran would take part in future polls if conditions to ensure "fairness" in the electoral process were met, Rahezabz.net quoted him as telling a group of reformist MPs. "Everyone will take part in the vote if people feel that their

candidates are allowed to participate, votes are announced as they were cast, electoral preparations are not holding them back, and if they are sure of the fairness of the election," the charismatic cleric and two-time former president said. "If these conditions are met, then we will decide how to act,"

he said at the meeting on Tuesday. "But considering the current situation, it seems that conditions will become more difficult in the future, the paths will be more blocked and restrictions will be increased."
