Mashrafe vows to overcome

Mashrafe Bin Mortaza is all about heart, courage and his never-saydie attitude. When he talked to this reporter at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium yesterday, the man dubbed the Narail Express

spoke of his desire and determination to play a part in the Bangladesh team for the ICC 2011 World Cup. It was unmistakably evident that

a brave and jovial Mashrafe had recovered from the initial distress after sustaining an injury to his right knee a week ago. "Only a brave man can achieve

something in his life," a self-assured Mashrafe said while sitting in the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) headquarters.

The 27-year-old pace spearhead, who has resumed normal walking and

cycling exercise, was not ready to give up the fight for the World Cup even though injuries have kept piling up to frustrate him to no

Mashrafe, thankfully, has retained a sense of perspective and insisted that he wants to continue to overcome all adversities and continue on with his cricket career. At one point, he was speaking so confidently that it was impossible to not be positive about his chances of playing in cricket's mega event. "It's very easy to say goodbye but I'm not ready to give up the fight.

"In my career on most of the occasions I had to fight with injuries with my back, ankle and of course the dreadful knee injuries. But

every time, I have come back strongly. And there will be no exceptions this time," he said, words from the man who has been living under the vice of injury since he made his international debut in 2001.

"Many people wrote off my career after the first two games against Zimbabwe. There was a lot of rumours which made me upset. Many

> even said the time has come for me to say goodbye. But I took little time to prove those men wrong. But it's my bad luck that I got injured again just when I was recovering my rhythm. And just think of the timing! (with only two months go to the World Cup)," he added.

> Mashrafe didn't try to hide his emotions about the World Cup. "It would be hypocrisy if I said

that I have no emotions attached to the World Cup especially when it is going to be held in my home soil. I want to play in the World Cup and I am confident about my chance. I love to take a challenge and I am hopeful that I will be able to present

myself for selection," said Mashrafe, who will be able to bowl in four weeks time as per the physicians' suggestion. Mashrafe also has a lot of faith on Australian surgeon Dr David Young and according to him

Young gave him the confidence about regaining the match fitness before the World Cup. He will also try to meet with Young when the Australian visits Sri Lanka in the middle of the next month. "He gave his go-ahead already but still I want

to meet him if it is possible when he comes to Sri Lanka. Actually it all depends on whether I am confident or not. "And, yes I am," finished Mashrafe.

India level series Urn stays with England

India completed an 87-run win on the fourth day of the second Test against South Africa at Kingsmead on Wednesday to set up a series decider in the final match in Cape Town.

Set a target of 303, South Africa were bowled out for 215.

The match finished an hour after lunch but South Africa's hopes were effectively ended when overnight batsmen Jacques Kallis and AB de Villiers were dismissed in the first hour of the

It was a remarkable fightback by India, who lost the first Test in Centurion by an innings and 25 runs and whose chances seemed to have nosedived when they were sent in at Kingsmead and bowled out for 205.

But India's bowlers shot out South Africa for 131 to take control of the match and an innings of 96 by man of the match VVS Laxman meant that South Africa had to score by far the highest total of the match to snatch victory.

number one ranking in Test cricket, irrespective of the result in the final Test.

Second-placed South Africa needed to win the series 3-0 to displace the tourists at the top of the rankings.

Sree Sreesanth struck the first, crucial blow of the day when he produced a vicious bouncer that star batsman Kallis could only fend off his glove to Virender Sehwag at gully.

Kallis was out for 17 after he and De Villiers had added 12 runs in half an hour to the overnight total of 111 for three.

bowler with 4-50 off 21.4 overs, while England number three Jonathan Trott was named man-of-the-match for his unbeaten 168.

In 1986 England won the series and the Ashes after an innings and 14-run victory at the MCG. Australia can still level the series if they

can win next week's fifth Sydney Test, but the Ashes are gone.

Now working as the Asian Cricket Council's cricket development officer, Aminul is regarded as one of the driving forces behind China's cricket growth over the last few years. Here Aminul talks to The Daily Star Sport about his World Cup experience.


Daily Star Sport (DSS): How excited were you before the start of the 1999 World Cup?

Aminul Islam (AI): The World Cup excitement had started for Bangladesh from the moment we qualified through the 1997 ICC Trophy win. It was a preparation that was long, we played the Asia Cup, and we toured England in 1998.

One thing that changed for me though was that I was confirmed captain a few we thought we should win. It was in their condimonths ahead of the World Cup in 1999, and so I had to make a plan, though not written, but it was to prove to the world that Bangladesh can play exciting cricket.

DSS: When you took the field against New Zealand for the first match, what was going through your mind?

AI: Here I would like to thank the cricket board for arranging the 1998 tour and also ensuring we arrived in England a month ahead of the World Cup. We beat Middlesex and Essex in the warm-up matches and as a result, I didn't


AI: We lost six wickets very early and yes, we thought we might lose the game. Scotland were the only team who were close to us in terms of strength, so it was the one game
