'Rock the Legends' was the first major open air concert of this year. Army Stadium in Dhaka rocked to the riffs of Nagarbaul, Miles and LRB on January 2. Mobile devices manufacturer Nokia arranged the event. The concert was unique since it was the fans who decided what songs they wanted the seasoned bands to play for them. Also noteworthy was the spirit and enthusiasm of the rockstars. They played more songs than any other concert in recent years.

Nagarbaul was the first to take to the stage, opening with the audience favorite "Lace Fita Lace" which was met with a sea of cheers. The band followed it with more hits, notably "Lootpat", "Dukhini Dukkho Korona" and "Mannan Miar Titas Molom" -- classics that the band seldom performs nowadays. Miles' performance was also remarkable. They broke the wall of sound created by the audience with "Shey Kon Dorodia" with an up-tempo, and following it up with "Shesh Thikana", "Kotota Tumi Haraley", "Jala Jala" and the classic "Chand Tara Shurjo", among others. The highlight of the concert was LRB covering their groundbreaking numbers, songs that the band had not performed in a few years. The segueing from one song to another, guitar solos in each number, prolonged instrumentals, and Bachchu's experimental guitar seemingly satisfied thousands of rock lovers. The band began with "Hastey Dekho Gaite Dekho". LRB hit -- "Mon Chaile Mon", "Hawker", "Adda" and "Meye" -- had the audience cheering and clapping for more. And the band complied with. LRB had not performed so many songs in a row live in recent years.

# Rabindra Sangeet Icon Suchitra Mitra No

Sangeet, Suchitra Mitra, whose rendition of "Amar Shonar Bangla Ami Tomaye Bhalobashi" during the Liberation Wa won millions of hearts in India and Bar gladesh, died at her south Kolkata resi dence yesterday of heart attack after protracted illness.

She was 86 and is survived by a son Mitra took music lessons at the Visva-Bharati University where she joined shortly after the death of Rabindrana Tagore in 1941.

She received a scholarship to learn at Sangeet Bhavan in Shantiniketan where she had the rare privilege of learning from some of the greatest exponents of Rabindra Sangeet -- Indira Devi Chaudhurani, Shantidev Ghosh and Shailajaranjan Mazumdar.

After obtaining her diploma from Shantiniketan, Mitra returned to Kolkata in 1945 and a year later she received her Master's degree in Bengali from the Scottish Church College. In the same year, her devotion and

commitment to Tagore's music encouraged her to found 'Rabitirtha', which was Rabindra Sangeet from Suchitra Mitra.



Recipient of the Indian government's prestigious civilian award the Padma Shri (in 1973), she won the Tagore Hymn Prize in 1945 from the London Tagore Hymn Society, Sangeet Natak Academy Award in 1986, and the HMV Golden Disc Award, among numerous other laurels which include Deshikottam of Visva-Bharati.

Condoling the death, another leading singer of yesteryears, Dwijen Mukhopadhyay said that Mitra had occupied a large space in the sphere of Rabindra Sangeet and her demise had created a void which cannot be fulfilled.

He described Mitra as a "pure" practitioner of Rabindra Sangeet and pointed to her absolutely chaste pronunciation and melodious voice.

## Two day Art Exhibition on '71 Genocide

A two-day art exhibition on the 1971 genocide in Kushtia recently ended in

Sundar Bangladesh, an organisation of progressive thinkers, had organised the exhibition at two locations --- Kushtia Public Library premises and Razakar Chattar (built to express abhorrence of the collaborators of 1971). Sufia Begum, mother of Bir Pratik

Shahid Didar, inaugurated the programme. A total of 31 photos were put on display. Photographer Muktaruzzaman Tipu had taken frames of the genocide from

different places in the district. According to the photographer, the pictures were taken in early 1980. The

photos include destruction of Bara Bazar bombing, the charred homestead of freedom fighter Madanlal Goenka and Durgadash Nathani by gunpowder, Morowari Temple and destruction of different establish-

ments in the district. A large number of people thronged the exhibition and recalled the atrocities of the Pakistani occupation Army and the collaborators --- Rajakar, Al-Badr, Al

In his speech, photographer Muktaruzzaman said that around 200-300 establishments were destroyed in Kushtia by occupation forces during the Liberation War.

He also called for the establishment of a war museum in Kushtia, which would remind viewers of the horrors of the genocide.
