Eleven projects get nod

UNB, Dhaka

The Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecnec) yesterday approved 11 development projects involving Tk 2,318 crore, including construction of Inland Container Terminal at Ashuganj Port at a cost of Tk 246 crore. With Ecnec Chairperson and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina

in the chair, the approvals were given at its meeting held at the NEC conference room in the city's Sher-e-Banglanagar. "Of the total project cost of Tk 2,318 crore, Tk 1,391 crore

will come from the government exchequer while Tk 927 crore as project assistance," said Planning Minister AK Khandker while briefing reporters after the meeting. Answering a question, the Planning Minister said the

container terminal at Ashuganj port will be constructed for the self-interest of the country, adding that India may use the port in future by paying charges or fees. The project will be implemented by the Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) under the

Shipping Ministry. Of the total cost of the project, Tk 219 crore will be borne from India's \$1 billion line of credit, while Tk 27 crore from the government exchequer.

The Ecnec meeting also approved three railway sector projects under the \$1 billion Indian line of credit.

HC scraps Makbul's jail term

The High Court yesterday scrapped 13-year jail term of former Awami League lawmaker Makbul Hossain in a corruption case filed by the Anti-Corruption Commission.

A Special Judge's Court on May 6, 2008 convicted Makbul and sentenced him to 13-year imprisonment in the case filed on charges of amassing illegal wealth and concealing information about it.

An HC bench of Justice Md Abdul Hye and Justice Md Abdur Razzaque delivered the verdict overturning the special court judgment.

Hermaphrodites protest stalking of women

Recruitment of more officers demanded

Senior police officials yesterday demanded the government recruit more officers in the department to strengthen investigation and supervision capacity of the force.

They also put some other demands at a meeting with Home Minister Sahara Khatun on the occasion of Police Week-2011 that began yesterday.

State Minister for Home Shamsul Huq Tuku, Home Secretary KM Abdus Sobhan Sikder, and Inspector General of Police Hassan Mahmood Khandker, among others, were present at the meeting.

The meeting sources said some senior officials told the home minister that police cannot conduct investigation properly due to poor number of officers in proportion to the number of constable.

For the same reason, police officials neither could supervise the investigators properly nor play fruitful role in the law and order management, added the

sources. According to the sources, the top police personnel also informed her of various difficulties they face to deal with the extremist groups, criminals, and the religious

fanatics. Police department has now a total of 1.30 lakh personnel and of them only around 20,000 personnel have the investigation capacity or authorities against 90,000 constables, around 6,000 Naiks, 1,600 head constables, and 7,000 Assistant Sub-inspectors

(ASI). They also demanded cell phone allowance for all the police officials, mainly for the officer-in-charges of all

police stations.

The home minister assured the policemen of considering their demands as well as solving the problems.

Lift bar to new enrolment

CJ for similar verdicts in similar cases

The education ministry and University Grants Commission (UGC) are trying to implement a "blueprint" in the name of implementing Private University Act 2010, they alleged.


"We will establish the campuses on the basis of students' tuition fees. If the student admission is barred, our revenue would stop and we will fail to buy lands and construct him.
