Sohel leads Siddikur

BPGA makes its debut

From the onset of the **BTI Professional Golf** Championship, the race has been confined to two golfers, Siddikur Rahman

and Shakhawat Hossain Sohel, but it was newcomer Sohel who put his more illustrious opponent Siddikur behind by two strokes at the close of the third round at the Kurmitola Golf Club yesterday.

Sohel, who just qualified for the Professional Golf Tour in India last month, scored two-under-par 69 in the third round to finish with an overall score of 11-under-par while Siddikur struck a one-under-par 71 to finish with an overall score of nineunder-par after the third day.

Jamal Hossain Mollah, who was a member of Bangladesh's gold winning squad in the South Asian Games and entered the professional circuit seven months ago, lifted himself to third position from fifth after scoring a six-under-par 66 to have overall four-under par.

Golf is one of the more lucrative sports in the world in terms of money spinning but for Bangladesh golf has a long way to go even though Siddikur is already a pioneer and has captured the belief of a nation with brilliant performances at the international level.

Nevertheless, golf is a less popular every year. sport in Bangladesh as it is still con-

fined to a specific class of the society but it is a good thing that the game of golf is gradually gaining popularity through the success of country's professional golfers, who once were all ball boys or caddies.

To give country's professional golfers a perfect stage and make the game popular among the young generation, the Bangladesh Professional Golfers' Association (BPGA) has introduced the first-ever professional golf championship, sponsored by Building Technology and Ideas Limited, with the participation of 56 golfers including four amateurs.

"In the start of 2009, golfers like Siddikur, Sohel had pushed me to form a golfers' association which would work with country's professional golfers and the dream of the golfers came true through launching of the first-ever professional golf championship," said Arshi Haider, the president of BPGA, adding that the current batch of golfers would dominate the country's golf arena in the next six to seven year before the new generation comes in.

Arshi, a leading amateur golfer, believes that the country's professional golfers would get an opportunity to fine-tune themselves before taking part in tournaments like PGTI as the BPGA is determined to hold at least six professional tournaments

The BPGA president believes that the runner-up.

the success of Bangladesh's professional golf tournament would depend on the support of the sponsors who can make it a well-known tournament like in India's profes-

sional tour. Siddikur sees the introduction of the professional golf tournament as a remarkable step to take country's golf a further step forward.

"We have a number of talented players but their performance is not reflected due to a lack of tournaments. They will now get the exposure through tournaments as this one," Siddikur said. Sohel thinks the tournament will help the golfers overcome their shyness before taking part in pro-tournaments outside the country.

Jamal, who played 13 professional tournaments to earn Tk 12 lakh last year, said the tournament would help produce more players as well as keep golfers in the game.

Zakiruzzaman, one of the four amateur golfers taking part in the tournament, said the introduction of professional tournament has inspired amateur golfers as they are now thinking of turning professional to earn some money for living as well deposit some to take part in the professional tour in India.

Top 25 finishers of the tournament will have a pie of total prize money of Tk 10 lakh, with the winner bagging Tk 2 lakh followed by Tk one lakh for

Eng closing in on Aus total

England closed to within 113 runs of an innings lead over a battling Australia on Tuesday, edging an engrossing second day of the final Ashes Test at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

The tourists, chasing their first series win Down Under in 24 years, got off to a blistering start with a 98run opening partnership before Australia struck back with three wickets, including the prize scalp of Kevin Pietersen.

Michael Clarke's Australians, playing to level the series after failing to regain the Ashes, could have been in an even better position at stumps had they not had a crucial fourth wicket taken off them by an umpire's referral.

At the close, England were 167 for three in reply to Australia's 280, with Alastair Cook unbeaten on 61 and nightwatchman James Anderson not

Andrew Strauss and Jonathan Trott were out seven balls apart and Pietersen threw away his wicket on

36 when he was caught hooking.

England could have been four down at close after debutant Michael Beer celebrated what he thought was his first Test wicket when Cook, then on 45, skied to Ben Hilfenhaus at deep mid-on only for umpire Billy Bowden to ask for the third umpire to check on a suspected no-ball.

Replays showed spinner had overstepped and Cook stayed.

It was the second time in the series that England have benefited from such a reprieve after Matt Prior was recalled following a slip catch in the fourth Melbourne Test. Prior was on five at the time, and eventually scored 85.

Australia did not let the Cook decision knock their concentration and removed the dangerous Pietersen, who failed to keep down a hook shot off a Johnson bouncer and was caught by Beer at deep backward square.

Hilfenhaus got the first breakthrough of the innings bowling Strauss for 60 with an unplayable ball that collected his off-stump.

Strauss and Cook had put on 98 in 92 minutes with skipper Strauss ENGLAND: First innings 167 for 3 leading the charge in an aggressive innings, hammering eight fours and

a six off 58 balls.

Trott was out for his first Test duck in Johnson's next over, getting a thick

inside edge on to his stumps. Earlier Johnson and Hilfenhaus salvaged the home side's first innings with some lusty hitting after lunch in a lively 76-run partnership for the

ninth wicket. In three balls, Hilfenhaus smashed Tim Bresnan for a six over long-on and Johnson lofted spinner Graeme Swann into the stands and followed up by coming down the wicket to clobber Swann for four.

Their rear-guard heroics boosted Australia's score after the home side had teetered at 189 for eight. Johnson was eventually bowled by

Bresnan for 53 off 66 balls and Hilfenhaus was caught behind off Anderson for 34 from 58 balls. **SCORES IN BRIEF**

Kumble pulls PAK WC PROBABLES NAMED out of IPL Kamran in, Malik out

Former India captain Anil Kumble has pulled out of this year's Indian Premier League (IPL), citing personal commitments, India's cricket board said Tuesday.

Kumble, captain of the Royal Challengers Bangalore franchise, had been instrumental in his team's turnaround in the 2009 edition, leading the side to the final of the moneyspinning Twenty20 tournament.

The leg-spinner was not retained by his franchise for this season and was among those players put up for auction with the highest reserve price of 400,000 dollars.

Pakistan selectors Tuesday included spotfixing suspect Kamran Akmal in a preliminary 30-man squad for the World Cup but left out former captain Shoaib Malik and leg-spinner Danish Kaneria.

The committee twice deferred announcing the squad as they sought clearance from the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) on players who were reportedly under suspicion of match-fixing during Pakistan's tour of England last year.

Shahid Afridi is expected to retain the one-day captaincy for the World Cup.

The 10th World Cup will be hosted jointly by Bangladesh, India and Sri Lanka from February 19 to April 2, with 14 teams competing.

Pakistan will miss former opener Khan, Aizaz Cheama, Asad Ali.

Salman Butt and pace bowlers Mohammad Asif and Mohammad Aamer, who are suspended on spot-fixing charges. They appear before an International

Cricket Council (ICC) tribunal in Doha from January 6-11 and could face life bans. A squad for six one-days against New

Zealand will be announced next week. Teams now have until January 19 to

announce a 15-man squad.
