Series ends in dull draw Colly quits Test

India validated their ranking as the number one team in Test cricket when they drew the third and final Test and earned a share of the series against second-ranked South Africa at Newlands here on Thursday.

Opening batsman Gautam Gambhir guided India to safety with a cautious innings of 64. Set to make an improbable 340 to win, India were 166 for three when play was called off with eight overs remaining.

Man of the match and man of the series Jacques Kallis took his career total of Test centuries to 40 with innings of 161 and 109 not out, while Sachin Tendulkar, the only man ahead of him on the alltime list, made a battling 146 for India.

Dale Steyn, the world's leading fast bowler, took five for 75 in the first innings but had to wait until an hour and a half before the scheduled close Thursday to add to his tally, having Gambhir caught down the leg side by wicketkeeper Mark Boucher.

Gambhir suffered a left elbow injury while making 93 in the first innings and looked in distress when he was struck by Morkel just below the injured elbow in the second over of the second innings.

He received treatment on the field before carrying on batting with no further obvious signs of discomfort.

The left-handed Gambhir batted for 271 minutes and faced 154 balls as he made virtually certain India could not be beaten.

South Africa could make only one breakthrough in each of the three sessions. Although there was some uneven bounce, the pitch did not help the bowlers as much as the South Africans had hoped.

Following a 2-1 defeat against Australia in 2008/ 09 and a drawn series against England last season, it was the third successive home series that South Africa failed to win.

Even the normally aggressive Virender Sehwag made no attempt to score quickly when India started the final innings of the series.

The first of his two boundaries came only in

the seventh over, when he square-cut Steyn to the boundary, and the second was a half-chance to a leaping JP Duminy at backward point when he played a similar shot against Lonwabo Tsotsobe.

Sehwag completed a disappointing series when he was caught at first slip by South African captain Graeme Smith off Morkel for 11 after batting for three minutes short of an hour. Sehwag scored 144 runs in the series at an average of 24.

Gambhir and Rahul Dravid defied the South African bowlers until after the afternoon drinks break in a second-wicket stand of 79 before Dravid was caught at third slip for 31 when he got a ball from Tsotsobe which kicked from just short of a length.

England batsman Paul Collingwood said it was time to move on and give younger players an opportunity as he announced his retirement from Test cricket on Thursday.

Collingwood, 34, has been under increasing pressure to keep his number five batting spot after a dismal run at the crease this Ashes series that has garnered just 83 runs at 13.83.

Former captain and teammate Andrew Flintoff said this week it was time for the England team management to be ruthless and drop the under-performing Collingwood from the Ashes-winning team. Collingwood chose not to wait until the end of the

Sydney Test, which is expected to finish on Friday with a huge England series-clinching victory, and made his announcement to teammates before the start of the fourth day's play. While he will no longer be a part of Test cricket,

Collingwood will remain England's Twenty20 captain and play for the one-day team, the England and Wales Cricket Board said.

"In many ways it's a sad moment, but I honestly think it's the right time," Collingwood said after Thursday's play.

"This is what I have been playing cricket for to be in a position against Australia, in Australia, like this, and it's going to be the perfect moment to bow out of Test cricket."

One of the chief beneficiaries of Collingwood's decision could be Eoin Morgan, 24, who has been on the sidelines during the Australian series.

"I am happy with the contributions I've made to the England team in the Test format and there are a lot of youngsters coming through," the England stalwart said.

"This team will progress without me and get better and better, so I am looking forward to tomorrow as my final farewell."

In-form Ian Bell, who scored his first Ashes century with 115 in England's first innings in Sydney, is also in line to move up the batting order from six to five in a reshuffle.

Collingwood told his teammates of his decision on the field ahead of Thursday's fourth day in the Sydney Test and was given hugs and pats on the back by the England players.

"I wanted the guys to know before they found out off anybody else and there were a few whispers going around and I also thought there might be a chance of us winning the game today," he said.

"I spoke to my wife in Melbourne (last week) about it and pretty much made my decision three days ago.

The Durham right-hander restated his commitment to limited overs cricket and "the opportunity to continue leading the Twenty20 squad and playing a significant role in England's ODI team.'

Collingwood made his Test debut in 2003 against Sri Lanka at Galle and has earned 68 caps, scoring 4,259 Test runs at 40.95 and taken 17 wickets.

Collingwood led England to their first-ever success in a global tournament when his team defeated Australia by seven wickets in the World Twenty20 final in Barbados last May.

Hugh Morris, Managing Director of England Cricket, said: "Paul Collingwood has made an outstanding contribution to the England Test team.

"His tireless commitment in the Test match arena will be something he will always be remembered for.

"I'm delighted that Paul will be available to continue to make important contributions to our ODI and Twenty20 teams."

Nadal, Federer in qrts

Roger Federer and fever-hit Rafael Nadal both had to fight their way out of trouble before reaching the quarterfinals of the Qatar Open on Wednesday.

Federer needed to recover from 4-5

down in the first set tie-breaker and from a break of serve down at 1-4 in the second against Swiss compatriot, and childhood friend, Marco Chiudinelli, ranked only 117 in the world, before coming through 7-6 (7/5), 7-5. World number one Nadal had to survive a tight first set and the loss of his first love set in nearly two years before overcoming the inspired hitting of Lukas Lacko, the world number 83 from Slovakia, by 7-6 (7/3), 0-6, 6-3.

Both superstars were confronted with opponents who hit hard and flat and had little to lose, enabling them to attack the ball freely.

But both had reasons for being below par. Nadal has been feeling unwell for several days and spent much of one day here resting, while Federer found it difficult to generate his usual intensity while playing against a compatriot and long-term friend. Lacko often took the breath away with

the way he hurtled around the court and hit the ball as though trying to puncture it. Had he held on to his early break of serve at 2-1 or pushed through when he had Nadal at deuce at 5-5 later in the first

set, much may have been different. But Nadal focussed fiercely at the start of the final set, ran hard, and played solid counter-attacking percentages, and was rewarded by a far higher ratio of errors

"It was a very difficult match," said Nadal, who celebrated his survival with evident relief and enthusiasm.

"But I resisted. I just made up my mind to do my best in the final set. I came back but it was very tiring for me."

Federer's survival against Chiudinelli followed a knife-edge recovery in saving three successive set points in his opening encounter against Thomas Schoorel, the Dutch qualifier, before progressing similarly in two tight sets.

"Playing such a good friend is so rare for me," Federer said. "And seeing him maybe having an injury as well, and feeling bad for him, and hopeful that he's not going to have another injury, was really difficult."

Federer will next face Viktor Troicki, a member of the Serbian team which won the Davis Cup in Belgrade last month and who reached the last eight with a 6-3, 6win over Teimuraz Gabashvili of Russia.

Nadal's next opponent is Ernests Gulbis, the dangerously talented Latvian who overwhelmed Antonio Veic, a Croatian qualifier, by 6-3, 6-1, and who will probably enjoy recalling memories of troubling Federer in a three-set quarterfinal battle here last year.

Philipp Kohlschreiber, the eighthseeded German, was beaten 7-6 (7/5), 6-7 (2/7), 7-6 (7/4) by Ivo Karlovic, the sixfoot ten-inch Croatian whose serve descends from steeper angles than any player on the tour.

Jo-Wilfried Tsonga continued his comeback from a knee injury by reaching the medal pole vaulter Sergey Bubka.

New Zealand and Pakistan open their Test series here Friday, keen to salvage reputations despite the series' sideline status on a tour dominated by the short form of the game and eyes focused on the spot-fixing scandal.

Only two Tests are on the schedule, instead of the customary three, with the focus of the Pakistan tour more on the six one-day internationals to follow as a warm-up to the World Cup.

But New Zealand captain Daniel Vettori said the teams needed to make the most of their limited Test time as their current world rankings -- Pakistan are sixth and New Zealand eighth -- show a need for improvement.

Pakistan, however, are without Test series. opener Salman Butt and bowlers Mohammad Asif and Mohammad Aamer who are facing a six-day
