

C'nawabganj: 63 polling centres 'risky' in 4 municipalities

Sixty-three polling centres out of 80 in four municipalities of the district have been identified as 'risky', said Police Superintendent Sajjadur Rahman.

He said police, paramilitary troops, and Ansars will be deployed at the 'risky' centres during voting.

Deputy Commissioner (DC) K.M Ali Azam said necessary steps have been taken to ensure free, fair and peaceful elections to Chapainaabganj, Shibganj, Rohonpur and Nachole municipalities scheduled for January 12.

The Election Commission (EC) on Thursday announced deployment of army in Shibganj and Chapainawabganj municipalities as the commission has identified the two municipal areas as vulnerable to poll violence.

Noakhali: Candidates move door to door for vote

Urdu speaking voters, commonly known as Biharis, are likely to play the decisive role in the upcoming municipality election in Saidpur 'railway town' as the community constitutes about half of 70,706-strong electorate in the area.

This time seven candidates are contesting for the mayor post in Saidpur municipality comprising 15 wards.

They are Awami League leader Aktar Hossain Badal (symbol television), Awami League leader Hitler Chowdhury (symbol cup and plate), BNP leader Shahin Akhtar Shahin (symbol pineapple), BNP leader Amzan Hossain Sarker (symbol pen and ink pot), JP leader Siddiqul Alam Siddique (symbol telephone), Jobaidul Islam backed by Muktijoddha Punarbason Samity (symbol wall clock) and independent candidate Tawhid Imam Mukta (symbol) spectacles.

Besides, 84 candidates are contesting for 15 councillor seats and 26 female women councillors.

After the independence, most of the Urdu speaking people at Saidpur declared themselves as Pakistani citizens and got their names listed with International Red Cross Society, indicating that they would like to go to Pakistan. They began to live in 21 refugee camps run by Red Cross at Saidpur, waiting for their repatriation.

On the other hand, a good number of Biharis who accepted Bangladesh as their own land and became citizens here started enjoying voting rights as well as other rights like Bangla speaking citizens of the country.

With the passage of time, the once adamant Urdu speaking people, especially their descendents, changed mind and started movement to be citizens of the country. In connection with a writ

Three mayor, eight councillor candidates fined

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Three mayor and eight councillor candidates have been fined in Gaibandha, Kishoreganj, Sunamganj and Lalmonirhat districts.

In Gaibandha, an electoral summary court led by judicial magistrate Azizur Rahman yesterday fined 11 people including two mayor and four councillor candidates. The court fined Awami

League (AL) backed mayor candidate Shah Masud Jahangir Kabir Milon Tk2,000 for hanging oversized posters and JSD backed mayor candidate Shah Shariful Islam Bablu Tk500 on charge of pasting posters on walls, reports our correspondent.

Besides, four councillor candidates were also fined. They are Md Shaheed (Tk2000), Abdul Aziz (Tk1,000), Jahangir Hossain (Tk500) and Nurul Islam (Tk100). The fines were slapped on charge of pasting poster on wall violating election code.

The court also fined five traders Jahidul Huq, Shahidul Islam, Abdul Gafur, Mahbubur Rahman and Ameer Hossain on charge of pasting posters on the wall of business houses.

In Kishoreganj, a mayor and two councillor candidates were fined by a mobile court for violating electoral code of conduct during campaign, reports our correspondent.

A mobile court on Friday fined BNP mayoral candidate of Kishoreganj municipality Majharul Istam Tk2000 for using loudspeakers after 9:00pm during a street meeting at Kalibari crossing.

The court led by assistant commissioner (land) Aminur Rahman also fined councillor candidate of ward no 5 Ashraful Alam Shamim Tk

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2000 for organising procession and councillor candidate of the same ward Masudur Rahman Pallab Tk2000 for staging big showdown.

A mobile court in Derai municipality of Sunamganj yesterday fined six people including a councillor candidate for violating electoral code of conduct, reports our staff correspondent in Sylhet.

Md Shamsul Haque, the returning officer for the municipal election fined Joinul Haque, a councillor candidate from ward no. 1 and five other people for violation code of conduct. They were fined for pasting posters on public buildings and other places.

In Lalmonirhat, a councillor candidate of Patgram municipal election was fined by a mobile court on Thursday night.

Accused Rakin Hasan Ripon of ward 8 had to pay a fine of Tk5000.

Patgram upazila nirbahi officer (UNO) and upazila returning officer Harunur Rashid said, as per electoral code of conduct, a councillor candidate can open one electioneering office. But the accused councillor candidate opened three electioneering offices in the ward for campaigning in favour of him.



Giving the Gorai a new life

The ongoing excavation of the Gorai River bears bright prospect of ensuring natural flow of freshwater to the country's south-western region and saving the Sundarbans, the world's largest mangrove forest, from salinity.

Under a Tk 942 crore project, huge amount of silt from the riverbed will be removed and a 2,200 metre flow-divider and Ganga-Gorai guide embankment will be built in the 31 kilometres of river way from Kushtia Sadar to Khoksha upazila, project sources said.

During the first phase of the work till April this year, silt from 12 kilometres of the riverbed from the main flow will be removed while maintenance dredging will be done during the one-year-long second phase till April 2012.

China Harbor Engineering Company is conducting the work that

The 386-kilometre-long Gorai River,

an important source of fresh water in the south-western region, depends on the Padma for its flow.

As the Padma itself remains lean in the dry season (December-May), its main branch Gorai also sees gradual decline in flow during the period. Consequently, intrusion of increased saline water in the coastal areas in greater Khulna region poses a serious threat to the Sundarbans and leaves an adverse effect on water quality, nature, fishery, agriculture, navigability and trade in a vast area.

Seven of the 15 rivers dependent on the Gorai River are now nearly dead while eight others are following. The nearly dead rivers include Hisna, Kaliganga, Kumar, Hamkumra, Harihar and Chitra.

In 1996, the then government took a large-scale dredging scheme on the Gorai and 34 km river was dredged in two phases. But before its maintenance dredging started, the project work was abandoned in 2001 when the BNP-led government took over.

To keep Gorai River alive, around 50,000 to 55,000 cusec of water is necessary in the Padma.

But the river in Bangladesh gets on an average 38,000 to 42,000 cusec water in last three months of dry season although it was supposed to get 55,000 to 70,000 cusec as per the India-Bangladesh agreement signed in 199, WDB sources said.

Padma sees scanty flow, affecting the GK (Ganges-Kobadak) project, which has been used to irrigate around 1.16 lakh hectares of land in the region since 1959. After assuming the office in 2009, the

present government initiated resumption of excavation of the Gorai River and donors assured necessary assistance for it.

A joint team of Bangladesh and India started recording the water level at different points of the Ganges and the Padma on January 1 and the work

will continue till May this year.

Due to withdrawal of Ganges water by India at Farakka in the upstream, the
