#### IMO secretary general due today

Secretary General of the International Maritime Organisation (IMO) Efthimios Mitropoulos will arrive here today for a 3-day visit to discuss how to reduce sea pollution specially from shipping industry.

Discussion regarding rescue of Bangladeshi ship MV Jahan Moni with 26 Bangladeshi sailors hijacked by Somalia pirates on December 5, security at the sea and climate change issue will dominate talks with the government ministers and others.

Officials consider IMO secretary general's visit to Dhaka important, as the organisation work in developing international regulations and recommendations to prevent pollution of the seas by ships, developing international safety regulations and recommendations for shipping, focuses on people involved in every aspect of ship safety and prevention of marine pollution.

During his visit, Efthimios Mitropoulos is due to hold meeting with Foreign Minister Dipu Moni, Shipping Minister Shahjahan Khan and other senior officials.

According to IMO figures, the shipping industry is collectively responsible for 2.7% of global CO2 emissions.

Mitropoulos has argued that the shipping industry's contribution towards climate change funding should be proportionate to that figure.

UN's High Level Advisory Group on Climate Change Funding, which recommends that the shipping industry should be responsible for providing between \$4bn and \$9bn towards the 2020 target of \$100bn in climate change mitigation project funding.

### Narsingdi municipal polls stayed

The High Court yesterday stayed for 15 days the process of the Narsingdi municipality election, which was slated for January 17.

An HC bench of Justice Miftah Uddin Choudhury and Justice Jahangir Hossain also directed Lokman Hossain, a mayoral candidate in the polls, to appear before the court within seven days to examine whether he is a fugitive.

The bench passed the order following a writ petition filed by another mayoral candidate Abdul Matin Sarker challenging the candidature of his rival Lokman.

The petitioner prayed to the court for staying the election process, saying Lokman cannot contest the election as he is a fugitive

in a murder case. Barrister M Amir-Ul Islam appeared for the petitioner.

# Cold wave hits children

The babies seek-

ing treatment

at Dhaka

Medical

College

Hospital are

suffering from

respiratory

tract infections

with fever

Most city hospitals begin to receive child patients with cold related diseases like bronchial asthma, pneumonia, coughing, and rota viral diarrhoea as children are hit hard by the recent cold wave. Almost all the babies seeking treat-

ment at Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) are suffering from respiratory tract infections with fever, said Ariful

Islam, resident physician of the hospital. "Though normally we receive children with diarrhoea, typhoid, and other diseases at the outdoor; during this season the patients come with influenza,

gastro enteritis, and respiratory tract infections" he said. Muskan, a one month

and 21 days old baby, was found basking on her mother's lap in front of the DMCH outdoor. Muskan's father said they have had to

visit the hospital four times since its birth as the baby catches cold frequently and faces severe breathing problem.

Two-year-old Trisha, Raihan, and Merry also saw doctors for the same reason while Kaosar, a one year and nine months old baby, had been suffering from rota viral diarrhoea for last two weeks.

"As the rota virus becomes more virulent in winter, the children aged between 6 and 18 months don't have enough antibody to resist the virus, " said Prof Dr Shahadat Hossain, of the International Centre for Diarrhoeal Diseases Research,

Bangladesh (ICDDR, B).

He also said 70 percent children receiving treatment at the ICDDR, B currently are 6 to 18 months of age.

Prof Shahidullah of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU) said the number of children with common cold has been doubled compared to a month before.

"The children must be covered with warm clothes properly. As the children are not able to

take care of themselves, parents should remain cautious so the babies are not infected with the virus and bacteria," he suggested.

The doctors of Mitford Hospital and Dhaka Shishu Hospital said the child patients have not been admitted to hospital in larger number, though their suffering due to the chilly weather have increased significantly. Most of them are provided treatment at the outdoor department, they said.

# Rab rescues woman, daughter: 2 held

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) yesterday claimed to have rescued a woman and her daughter and arrested two traffickers in last two days.

Bokuli Begum, 38, and her daughter Halima Akhter Akhi, 10, who were trafficked to India were rescued on Monday. Rab-1 arrested Mohammad Ukil Mollik, 25, of Sharsha

upazila of Jessore the same day and Mohammad Ali, 40, of Tongi on that night. At a press conference in the city yesterday, Rab officials

said they brought the victims back from Hawra Station of India with the help of some 'well wishers' there. Bokuli, conversely, told journalists that they managed to

get freed from the traffickers in India with the help of the locals there who helped them return home. Lt Col Rashedul Alam, commanding officer of Rab-1, said

we began investigation following a compliant by Bokuli's husband Afzal Hossain on December 27 last year. Bokul said Ali, a next-door neighbour, took her and the child to India alluring her of lucrative job there. "He told me


to take my daughter with me saying that it would add extra money to my wage." The victim said Ali took them to Abdullahpur bus stand

and handed them over to Ukil Mallik on December 27, 2010. Mallik admitted his involvement saying he bought the two for Tk 8,000 from Ali and took them to his house at Sharsha.

On December 28, Mallik took the victims to India's Hawra Station where he sold the two to three Indian

cohorts and fled. Bokuli said she sought help from locals who caught the criminals and handed them over to Indian police. Back

home she informed Rab of the incident.
