Ambassador Olling said his government viewed relations with Bangladesh as excellent.




A mother wraps a shawl over her child to keep them warm in the cold during a rickshaw ride in front of Curzon Hall at Dhaka University yesterday.

Today is the 8th death anniversary of former minister M Mansur Ali, says a press release.



Dhaka, Thimphu trade to go up to \$100m, hopes Bhutanese PM

Visiting Bhutanese Prime Minister Jigmi Y Thinley hoped that bilateral trade could go up to US \$ 100 million from current US\$ 30 million in the next few years.

In an interview with the news agency at his Sonargaon Hotel suit on Tuesday night Thinley said, "We both the sides see the possibilities of very rapid expansion of bilateral trade going up to US \$ 100 million within next few years."

"We are also looking at trade in services."


Thinley said Bhutan can also take advantage of Bangladesh's human resources-professionals, skilled and semi-skilled people to develop their

infrastructure, industries and information technology.

Asked how many doctors Bhutan is planning to recruit from Bangladesh, he said it would be nice if 25-30 doctors could be recruited on yearly basis for the next three years. Some of these doctors will be highly specialised and some general doctors with 5 years' experience.

Asked whether the theory of Gross National Happiness (GNH) can be applicable for Bangladesh as well, Thinley said many of the programmes of the Bangladesh government are creating conditions for pursuit of happiness and enabling people to be happy.

BSS Adds: The Bhutanese premier said the geographic

features that made his country landlocked would not obstruct Thimphu's connectivity or cooperation particularly in energy sector with Bangladesh.

He told the state-run news agency in the interview with the private news agency.

Thinley, who earlier assured Hasina of extending

cooperation in the hydropower sector, said his country expected to reach a deal "as soon as possible" on energy cooperation but right this moment it was "over capacitated" with its pledges to India in exporting electricity.

Asked about the trade or business relations, he said the two sides already have identified many tradable goods, as "there are so many complementary items."

"For instances, I can tell you Bangladesh can export vegetables to Bhutan during winter months (when extreme cold hampers production in Bhutan) while we can export vegetables to your country in summer months," he said.

The Bhutanese premier

also suggested the tour operators of the two countries to attract western tourists to visit the mountainous kingdom and Bangladesh under a single trip.

Thinley called Bangladesh's offer to Thimphu in using its port facilities as a gesture of "large-ness of heart and sympathy" for the landlocked "smaller neighbour" like Bhutan and said "it would be extremely useful" for his country.

"We will be sending a team of experts to study how best Bhutan can avail the facilities immediately and in future," he said.

He also stressed exploring more trade routes between the two countries beyond the existing only route through Fulpar frontier.

Save birds from extinction
Sheikh Rehana urges all

Sheikh Rehana, youngest daughter of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, yesterday called upon all to save birds saying a number of bird species of the country is becoming extinct day by day.

"We all should care more about birds and grow more affection for the independent but weak creature," she told a launching ceremony of a book titled "A photographic guide to birds of Bangladesh" written by Ronald R Halder.

Independent University, Bangladesh organised the function on its Bashundhara campus in the city.

Ronald R Halder said the lives of two birds of every eight birds in the globe are at stake and destruction of birds' habitat is the main reason behind their extinction.

The book is first of its kind in the country to recognise birds through illustration. It contains photographs of 472 main species birds in Bangladesh, said the organisers.

IUB Governing Council Chairman Towhid Samad; Vice Chancellor (in charge) Prof M Omar Rahman; IUCN Country Representative Dr Niaz Ahmed Khan; Ornithologist and Bangladesh Bird Club President Enam Ul Haque and environmentalist Enam Talukdar also spoke.

25 arrested for illegal registration of SIM cards

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) in a massive drive at different places in the city during the last two days arrested 25 people for selling subscriber identity modules (SIM) of different mobile operators using fake identities and photos for registration.

Rab personnel also seized 437 SIM cards of different mobile operators, 120 fake national identity cards, 150 fake passport size photos and 690 subscriber's forms from them.

According to Rab, police, extortion demands, threats to high-profile people and harassment of women over cell phones are going unabated, especially in the capital.

Police can hardly trace perpetrators as many of the SIM cards used in the crimes are unregistered or their registrations are based on false information.

Rab official sources said Rab-1 personnel arrested 8 people from Mohakali and seized 115 SIM cards with fake registration from their possession. Rab-2 personnel

arrested 6 people from Adabar and seized 120 fake national identity cards, 150 fake passport size photos and 690 subscriber's forms from them.

Accordingly, Rab-3 members arrested 3 people from Moulana Bhashani Stadium area and seized 49 SIM cards with fake registrations, Rab-4 personnel arrested 4 people from Shah Ali Plaza in Mirpur and seized 93 SIM cards with fake registrations, 104 forms and 350 fake photos and Rab-10 members arrested 4 people with 64 SIM cards with fake registrations.

Earlier on March 10 last year, the government introduced fresh measures tightening the registration process of SIM cards following a rise in the use of cell phone for criminal activities.

A 10-member committee headed by BRTC chairman was also formed for recommendations regarding curbing of cell phone crimes.

According to sources, 15 lakh SIM cards have so far been blocked for irregularities in registration process or their abuse by subscribers.
