Stars rally for relief

Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal are among the big names in tennis to take part in a special exhibition on the eve of the Australian Open to raise money for the victims of Australia's flood disaster.

All-time Grand Slam champion Federer, world number one Nadal, Kim Clijsters, Lleyton Hewitt, Novak Djokovic and Pat Rafter are among the elite players who will play in the Rally for Relief match at Melbourne's Rod Laver Arena on Sunday.

The heart-rending scenes of Queensland's floods which have left 15 people dead and inundated Australia's thirdlargest city Brisbane have shaken the international tennis fraternity, gathering in Melbourne for Monday's season-opening Grand Slam.

"Along with many of the other players I was moved by the devastation caused by the floods in Australia," Federer said in a statement.

"We just wanted to do something to help aid the recovery because we know there are thousands of Australians who will continue

to suffer as a result of this disaster." Nadal said he was delighted to be able to

contribute in some way to the flood victims. "This is a terrible tragedy, not only the loss of life but the destruction of people's homes," Nadal said.

"I am pleased to be able to contribute in some way to help bring it to the attention of the world and raise some money for the

victims in the process." Hewitt, Australia's two-time Grand Slam champion, said it was time for the tennis

"The plight of the flood victims has struck a chord with the entire tennis fraternity," Rafter said.

"As a Queenslander I am really heartened by the concern and the keenness from our sport to get in and do something to ease the suffering."

Fellow Queenslander Stosur is already donating Aus\$100 (\$100) for every ace she serves in Australian tournaments this summer.

Former Australian Test cricketer Shane Warne is also trying to organise a Twenty20 game to aid the flood relief.

Warne said via his social network site Twitter that he was planning a charity match between his XI and a team led by former England captain Michael Vaughan at the Melbourne Cricket Ground featuring excricketers and celebrities.

England's cricketers have also donated a slice of their match fee from Wednesday's T20 international against Australia and star batsman Kevin Pietersen is auctioning bats and shirts he used in the recent Ashes series.

Seven-time Tour de France winner Lance Armstrong, in Australia for next week's Tour Down Under, said on his Twit ter site that he would be pledging \$50,000 to the relief efforts.

South Africa's fast bowlers struck early to set up a comprehensive 135-run win in the first one-day international against India at Kingsmead on Wednesday.

Chasing a target of 290, India's hopes were effectively ended when they were reduced to 43 for four in the 11th over. Despite a halfcentury by Virat Kohli they were bowled out for 154.

"We were outplayed completely," admitted Indian captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni. "We are a side that banks

on a good start and having wickets in hand to chase eight or nine runs an over . . . it never happened."

Dhoni said the one-day specialists in his team had been restricted in their practice opportunities because of rain.

"As we go into the series we will get acclimatised more and hopefully make the series more interesting."

South African captain Graeme Smith, meanwhile, hailed 'a pretty complete' performance in the opening match of a five-game series, with particular praise for the bowlers. "We were superb with the

ball," he said. Dale Steyn dismissed

Murali Vijay in the first over and left-arm bowler and man of the match Lonwabo Tsotsobe picked up the key wicket of Sachin Tendulkar three overs later.

South Africa looked on target for a total of more than 300 but both fell to the parttime off-spin of Rohit Sharma instead of cashing in towards the end of the innings.

In a departure from their normal tactics, South Africa took the batting powerplay after 27 overs and it seemed to pay off as De Villiers and Duminy added 45 runs in five overs and forced India to use some of their better bowlers early.

But De Villiers holed out to deep midwicket and Duminy was leg before wicket when he missed an attempted reverse sweep, leaving South Africa without a specialist batsman for the last eight overs in which they were restricted to 45 runs while losing four wickets.

Opening bowler Zaheer Khan took two for 44, with both his wickets coming in the last over of the innings, while Sharma's seven overs brought him two for 30.

Second Test against NZ starts tomorrow

Pakistan will set aside off-field controversies to chase their first series win for four years when the second Test begins in Wellington on Saturday, as hosts New Zealand struggle for form.

Unable to hold international matches at home due to security concerns and beset by corruption allegations, Pakistan have not won a Test series since defeating the West Indies in early 2007. But after crushing the Black Caps by 10

wickets in the first Test, the tourists are in prime position to go 2-0 up and record a clean sweep in the two-match series.

Coach Waqar Younis paid tribute to his players for maintaining their focus on the pitch as teammates Salman Butt, Mohammad Asif and Mohammad Aamer faced corruption hearings in Doha.

"It's not that we've been playing bad cricket, it's just that the controversy has just been following us," he said.

"It's very, very hard for the boys to keep going and keep hearing this but I'm very proud of these boys, they've stuck to the task and every morning they get up and keep positive."

Butt, Asif and Aamer are set to learn their fate when an anti-corruption tribunal into spot-fixing allegations resumes hearings on February 5. New Zealand coach John Wright has

labelled as "unacceptable" the Black Caps' performance in his first Test in charge in Hamilton, when the batting line-up was dismissed for a paltry second innings total of 110. Critics, including former Test opener Mark Richardson, expressed concern that

the focus on Twenty20 had turned New Zealand's batsmen into one-dimensional players prone to wild shots and poor decision making. Skipper Daniel Vettori denied the accusation in the wake of the Hamilton loss but

McKay out of WC

Australia's fast bowling stock has taken another significant blow before next month's World Cup in the subcontinent with paceman Clint Mckay being diagnosed with a stress fracture in his left foot.

With injury to the 27-yearold Mckay, the current world No 1 side in ODIs will now go to the World Cup without two of their top three wickettakers for the past year with the other being Ryan Harris, who is nursing a stress fracture in his foot that emerged during the Boxing Day Test.

The foot soreness McKay felt during Victoria's Big Bash win over Queensland on January 3 has been revealed as a stress fracture of the navicular bone in his left foot.

Medical staff decided the moon boot Mckay has been wearing to aid healing is not sufficient and instead he will have surgery next week, ruling him out for at least 10 weeks, the Sydney Morning Herald reported.
