Nadal, Clijsters romp

Ivanovic falls at first hurdle

Top seed Rafael Nadal was handed an easy win at the Australian Open Tuesday, as Kim Clijsters humiliated Dinara Safina 6-0, 6-0 and former number one Ana Ivanovic was another highprofile casualty.

Nadal, the French Open, Wimbledon and US Open champion, was leading 6-0, 5-0 when Brazilian journeyman Marcos Daniel threw in the towel after being troubled by a left knee problem.

Andy Murray went through in similar circumstances when Slovakia's Karol Beck retired with a shoulder problem while trailing 6-3, 6-1, 4-2, during an action-packed day two.

Swedish fourth seed Robin Soderling beat Italy's Potito Starace in straight sets and 2009 US Open champion Juan Martin del Potro enjoyed a successful return to Grand Slam tennis after being injured for most

Aussies pick Lee, Tait

Defending champions Australia Tuesday unveiled their squad for next month's World Cup, banking on the fitness of a pair of injury-prone pacemen and elder statesmen Ricky Ponting and

Mike Hussey.

Veteran Brett Lee and enigmatic shortform specialist Shaun Tait were both included in the 15-man squad for the tournament in India, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh, which they are trying to win for the fourth successive time. Ponting was named as skipper, but is still

recovering from a broken finger, while Hussey made the squad but is a major doubt after a severe hamstring tear in the six-wicket win over England at the MCG on Sunday. Hussey is expected to be sidelined for at

least six weeks, with Australia's first game on February 21, and chairman of selectors Andrew Hilditch conceded he was a doubt for the showpiece event. Players can be replaced before the tour-

By selecting Lee and Tait, as well as erratic duo Mitchell Johnson and Doug Bollinger, Australia will rely heavily on their pace bowlers to be at their best. Lee performed well in Australia's win over

England on Sunday, but the 34-year-old and

Tait are both on the comeback trail after serious elbowinjuries.

Sunday's game was Lee's first one-day international for Australia since October 2009 and he missed the 2007 World Cup triumph due to injury.

Tait, who played in the 2007 final but mainly plays Twenty20 cricket these days, was ruled out of Sunday's game with a back problem.

The 27-year-old has only played three ODIs since February 2009, but taken eight wickets in those three matches.

Hilditch said the squad was perfectly balanced.

The shock selection was Victorian allrounder John Hastings, who has played just two one-day internationals, while David Hussey, Mike's younger brother, also made the squad.

Tasmanian wicketkeeper-batsman Tim Paine, touted by many as a future Australian captain, is part of the 15.

Victorian paceman Peter Siddle was not included, despite being one of the better Ashes performers for Australia with ball and bat.

Wellington poised for thrilling day

Pakistan dismissed New Zealand for 293 at stumps on Tuesday after a dynamic late spell from Umar Gul threw the second Test at the Basin Reserve wide open heading into the final day. Honours were even on the fourth day,

with New Zealand's openers finally clicking to post a 120-run stand and Pakistan then taking seven wickets for 112 in the final session to give themselves a second innings target of 274. Gul was the pick of Pakistan's bowlers,

producing reverse swing to take four wickets for 61 runs -- including first innings centurion Daniel Vettori (1) -- supported by Abdur

win in Hamilton, the visitors will be content to bat out the day for a draw if Wellington's weather interrupts play as forecast. The Black Caps appeared headed for a big

total when Brendon McCullum (64) and Martin Guptill (73) began the second innings with a 120-run stand, the first time New Zealand's openers have reached 50 in the series. The opening partnership, only the sec-

ond to make 100 for the Black caps since 2004, was broken when left-arm spinner Rehman tempted McCullum into an ambitious shot just after lunch that Tanvir Ahmed took comfortably at long off. From there, only Ross Taylor (52) offered

any serious resistance as New Zealand's batting frailties were again exposed when the home side tried to push up the run rate and set an imposing target. Coach John Wright will be concerned at

some of the dismissals as he seeks to improve New Zealand's brittle top order following his appointment in December. While Reece Young (20) was unlucky to

fall to a sensational one-handed catch by Azhar Ali at silly mid-off, Jesse Ryder (17) shouldered arms and allowed an innocuous delivery from part-time spinner Mohammad Hafeez into his stumps.
