Rajuk stops drive under pressure

Rajuk had to withdraw a drive against illegal commercial occupancy of a Gulshan residential plot by the International Club in the face of ministerial instruction yesterday allowing the club two days to shift their belongings.

Md Nurul Islam, executive engineer of Rajuk, told The Daily Star that their team just knocked down the boundary wall of the club and withdrew from the drive giving the time.

The club's occupancy of the two-bigha residential plot at house no-5 on the road no-74 to run commercial activities is unauthorised, he said adding that the drive has been postponed until next Sunday.

The club is run by Bangladeshis and Indian nationals with members of other foreign nationals staying in the capital.

Land owner and Nassa Group Chairman Nazrul Islam Mazumdar earlier had served an eviction notice asking the club authorities to vacate the premises.

Later, the club authorities obtained three-month stay order from the High Court (HC) against the notice. Again, they obtained a six-month stay.

Following a petition by the Nassa Group, appellate division of the Supreme Court made the six-month stay order ineffective for six weeks with the February 9 for regular hearing on the matter at the HC bench.

As the stay was made ineffective, Mazumdar applied to Rajuk for the eviction.

PM urges expatriates

Prime Minister (PM) Sheikh Hasina urged expatriate Bangladeshis to abide by laws and customs of their host countries to avoid any hassle or harassment.

Addressing expatriate Bangladeshis at Sheikh Khalifa Bin Zayed Community School on Tuesday, she highlighted her government's various measures for the welfare of the expatriate Bangladeshis.

The PM said a separate desk has been opened at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport while security measures are in place so that expatriate Bangladeshis do not face any problems.

Besides, she said Expatriate Welfare Bank has been set up to extend financial support to workers intending to work abroad.

In every district, there will be a cell containing information data of each expatriate Bangladeshi so they can be traced in times of emergency, she added.

The PM said provisions would be made so that expatriates could send money through private banks alongside public limited banks. Moreover, ebanking and SMS system were introduced to stop remittance through `hundi'.

She said schools would be set up in areas of foreign countries where occasion.

Bangladeshis are high in density.

The PM said steps are also being taken to quickly resolve the problem facing expatriates in the UAE in getting the Machine Readable Passports (MRP).

She reassured that voting rights of the expatriates would be ensured.

Encouraging investment from expatriates, the PM said investment opportunities were increased and separate arrangements were made for their housing in Bangladesh.

At an international seminar, they also put emphasis on creating a Saarc parliamentarian forum to bring the legislators of all countries together to envision a common future of South Asia.

The two-day seminar "Envisioning New South Asia: People's perspective" held at Brac Inn in the city concluded yesterday.

Income inequality, control of economic resources by the rich, and rise of corporate interest dominating the state institutions are only adding new tensions in the countries, said the speakers.

Former Indian navy chief M Ramdas said the world saw US\$ 1,200 billion trading of armament last year and 30 percent of it went to India followed by 14-15 percent purchase by Pakistan. New Age Editor Nurul Kabir said

secularism along with an equitable distribution of wealth and income in the society could provide the basis of a sustainable state.

Pakistani labour leader Karamat Ali, Lalita Ramdas of India, Netra Prasad Timsina of Nepal, and Nazma Sadiq of Pakistan also spoke at the seminar.

Participants from the Maldives, Sri Lanka, India, Nepal, Pakistan, the Philippines, and Afghanistan were present at the programme.

HC grants anticipatory bail to Sircar, Akhtar

The High Court yesterday granted anticipatory bail for four months to former speaker Jamiruddin Sircar and deputy speaker Akhtar Hamid Siddiqui in three separate corruption cases filed by the Anti Corruption Commission (ACC).

The commission on January 16 filed the cases with Shere-Bangla Nagar Police Station in the city against them on charges of unauthorised use of government vehicles. Jamiruddin is accused in two cases, while Akhtar is accused in one case.

An HC bench of Justice Shamim Hasnain and Justice MR Hasan issued separate rules upon the ACC and the government to explain why the former speaker and deputy speaker should not be granted regular bail in the cases.

The bench passed the orders and issued the rules following three bail petitions filed by the BNP leaders on January 18.

Advocate TH Khan, Barrister Rafiqul Islam Mia and Barrister Bodruddoza Badal appeared for the petitioners.

NGO heads worried over 'propaganda'

Govt forced to begin war crimes trial

Speakers at a programme yesterday said the process of war crimes trial comes alive, as the issue has become a demand of mass people following years of campaign by some social organisations.

The government was compelled to start the trial as the demand for the trial had taken the shape of a huge social movement following the campaign, they said.

'Municipal polls were free, fair'

The just concluded municipal elections across the country were free and fair except for a few stray incidents, says a report of Election Working Group (EWG), an alliance of nongovernment organisations.

The report released yesterday at a press conference at Dhaka Reporters' Unity also read that in the first three days, the polls were free from political influence but the last day witnessed direct political influence in some municipalities.

About the role of Election Commission (EC), it said the EC proved itself to be impartial through holding free and fair

elections and gained people's trust. But some incidents of violence would not have happened had the EC been more active, the report said.

Reading out the report summary, EWG Co-chairman Prof Nazmul Ahsan Kalimullah said turnout rate of women voters has been significant in the polls.

Besides, the polls witnessed positive changes in behaviour of candidates, voters and law enforcement agencies.

Referring to the report, Kalimullah, however, said contenders violated election code in some municipalities including Bhola, Chapainawabganj, Dinajpur, Rajshahi and Munshiganj while stuffing ballot boxes with fake votes was seen at Jamalpur, Narayanganj, Sherpur and Chapainawabganj polling stations.

No special arrangements were made for disabled and elderly people in 81 polling stations.

EWG co-chairman, Taleya Rahman also spoke.

The EWC prepared the report after its 390 workers visited 78 municipalities across the country and collected data during the polls.
