

India aim for history

Fourth ODI against SA today

Having gained a 2-1 lead after registering back-to-back victories in the last two games against the Proteas, India go into the fourth one-dayer here on Friday seeking to clinch their first-ever ODI series triumph on South African soil.

The Indians have never won a limited-overs series in South Africa and Mahendra Singh Dhoni and his young bravehearts will leave no stone unturned to achieve the feat at the St. George's Park.

After not-so-impressive batting performances in the first two matches, India, riding on Yusuf Pathan's batting prowess, managed to get the better of the hosts by two wickets in the third one-dayer in Cape Town.

In a close encounter, Pathan was the difference between the two sides as he scored a superb 50-ball 59, including three big sixes in one over off Johan Botha to turn the tide in India's favour. He also chipped in with a wicket and a catch to bag the man of the match award.

But barring Pathan's knock in the previous game, an injury-hit India's batting line-up has not shown much teeth, with the form of the top order batsmen continuing to be a cause of worry for the team.

The batting has come a cropper in all the three matches so far and the visitors managed to pull off an incredible one-run victory over South Africa in the second game mainly because of the efforts of the bowlers, especially pacer Munaf Patel.

Going into the fourth one-dayer, India would not only want to win the series here but also be keen to see their talented batting line-up, which has been a disappointment so far, show some character on the pacy wickets of South Africa.

With seniors like Sachin Tendulkar, Virender Sehwag and Gautam Gambhir missing from the ranks, the youngsters, who have done well in the recent past, have not been able to cope with the conditions.

However, except in the first game, even the South Africans have not been too impressive with the bat.

In Friday's match, the likes of Yuvraj Singh, Virat Kohli and Suresh Raina, who have showed mere flashes of brilliance so far, would need to fire if the visitors hope to take an unassailable lead.

It is also high time that captain MS Dhoni produce something valuable with his bat.

Besides, Murali Vijay, who got into the side due to the absence of regular openers -- Sehwag and Gambhir -- must also score some runs to show his worth in the limited-overs format. Lack

of solid starts has put undue pressure on India's middle order.

The visitors would need to sort out this problem in Friday's game if they want to counter the home team, who are expected to play out of their skins to level the series.

South African batsmen, in the absence of veteran all-rounder Jacques Kallis, lack the required balance in the side and even as captain Graeme Smith, Hashim Amla, AB de Villiers, JP Duminy and new comer Faf du Plessis have all chipped in with runs, they simply could not make up for the lost sheen so far in the tournament.

The hosts would be required to put in a great effort in all departments of their game if they wanted to overcome a confident and spirited Indians in Friday's encounter.

Sarwan gets call-up

Veteran batsman and former skipper Ramnaresh Sarwan was recalled by the West Indies for the World Cup on Wednesday.

The 30-year-old was dropped from the tour of Sri Lanka last year and hasn't played for the national team since the home series against South Africa in June 2010.

Sarwan, who took over the captaincy from Brian Lara after the 2007 World Cup before being succeeded by Chris Gayle, is one of the West Indies' most experienced players having featured in 156 ODIs, scoring 5,098 runs.

Although indifferent form in 2010 meant he missed out on a central contract, he possesses a formidable record in India where the West Indies will play five of their six group games.

He has hit five fifties in the country and averages over 57 in 50-overs cricket.

The West Indies will be captained by Darren Sammy who took over from Gayle when the former skipper refused a West Indies Cricket Board contract.

Fellow rebels Dwayne Bravo and Kieron Pollard are also included in the 15-man squad for the February 19-April 2 tournament being played in India, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh.

The squad sees a debut for Andre Russell while Carlton Baugh, who hasn't played

international one-day cricket for over two years, got the wicketkeeper's nod over Denesh Ramdin.

"The selection committee deliberated extensively over the selection of this squad and while choosing some players was straightforward we believe that we have come up with a good mix of players who will be able to do well in the Asian conditions," said chairman of the selection committee Clyde Butts.

"We have some of the most experienced ODI cricketers on the international stage along with the effervescence and freshness of some quality young players who we are confident can not only contribute to the team but win matches."

Prior to the World Cup, the West Indies will play three ODIs in Sri Lanka on January 31, February 4 and 6.

They are in Group B at the World Cup and will face South Africa in their opener on February 24 in New Delhi followed by games against Netherlands, Bangladesh, Ireland, England and India.

Bagai to lead Canada in WC

Wicketkeeper-batsman Ashish Bagai will lead a 15-man squad named by Cricket Canada on Thursday for the ICC Cricket World Cup 2011.

Also named in the squad are two other survivors of the Canada team from the ICC Cricket World Cup 2007, paceman Henry Osinde and all-rounder John Davison. Both Bagai and Davison also played in the 2003 edition.

The rest of the players will be playing in their first World Cup. There are as many as seven players who have come through Cricket Canada's Youth Programme. Nitish Kumar, Hiral Patel, Ruvindu Gunaskera and Parth Desai were members of the Canada U-19 squad at the ICC U-19 Cricket World Cup in 2010.

Also making debuts for Canada in a World Cup squad are Tyson Gordon, Karl Whatham, Balaji Rao, Harvir Baidwan, Khurram Chohan, Rizwan Cheema and Amarbir Hansra.

The team leaves for a pre-tournament training camp in Dubai on 26 January 26 and will head to Bangladesh on 8 February for warm-up matches against Bangladesh and England before opening the tournament on 20 February against co-hosts Sri Lanka.

Top guns sail smoothly

World number one Rafael Nadal stepped up his bid for a fourth straight Grand Slam title with a crushing win, as leading seeds Andy Murray and Robin Soderling had trouble-free passage at the Australian Open Thursday.

Nadal, chasing a non-calendar year Grand Slam, overran American qualifier Ryan Sweeting 6-2, 6-1, 6-1 to set up an intriguing third round match with exciting Australian teenager Bernard Tomic.

While Nadal continued to march on, fourth seed Soderling again did not drop a set in disposing of Gilles Muller of Luxembourg, 6-3, 7-6, 6-1.

British fifth seed Murray

cruised past Illya Marchenko of Ukraine 6-1, 6-3, 6-3 to also progress to the last 32.

Nadal, the Spanish nine-time major winner, is satisfied with his form, saying his serve had greatly improved from his opening round encounter with Marcos Daniel.

"I think I played a solid match. A few mistakes with the backhand, that's all," Nadal said. "My serve improved a lot since the first day, so I am happy with that."

"My backhand had a few more mistakes than usual and maybe I will have to play a little bit more aggressively, more inside the court. But in general I am happy."

Nadal stretched his Grand Slam winning streak to 23 matches going back to the French Open last June and taking in his victories at Wimbledon and the US Open.

He is also chasing his

second Australian Open title and 10th Grand Slam title overall. At last September's US Open he became the youngest man in the Open Era to achieve a career Grand Slam.

"I am very happy about what I have done. That's given me a lot of calmness," he said. "I have probably less pressure right now after last year's season, winning a lot."

Tomic, 18, will have the home crowd behind him when he takes on Nadal after he eliminated Spanish 31st seed Feliciano Lopez, 7-6, 7-6, 6-3.

The Australian teenager, who is playing with a wildcard, lines up for the biggest match of his emerging career against Nadal.

Nadal said he was also looking forward to facing Tomic in an expected night match on Rod Laver Arena

on Saturday.

Frenchman Jo-Wilfried Tsonga needed 2hr 30min to put away the 51st-ranked Andreas Seppi, 6-3, 7-6, 7-6 and is seeking to repeat his 2008 final appearance where he lost to Novak Djokovic.

Other winners included Russian 10th seed Mikhail Youzhny and 15th seed Marin Cilic of Croatia, while Canadian Milos Raonic hit the fastest serve of the tournament so far -- 230 kilometres (143 miles) per hour -- during his upset of French 22nd seed Michael Llodra.

Argentina's 27th seed David Nalbandian retired suffering from exhaustion while trailing Lithuania's Richard Berankis 6-1, 6-0, 2-0.

Nalbandian was coming off a gruelling five-set win over Australian Lleyton Hewitt in almost five hours in Tuesday's opening round.

Hussey's to wait longer

Veteran Australian batsman Mike Hussey's chances of playing at the World Cup will remain shrouded in uncertainty for at least two more weeks.

A month from Australia's first match of their title defence, Hussey is battling to be fit for the showpiece event after suffering a severe hamstring injury in Sunday's six-wicket win over England at the MCG.

Hussey was this week named in Australia's 15-man squad for the tournament, which they are attempting to win for the fourth time in succession, although selectors conceded a final decision on his fitness would have to be delayed.

The Australians are banking on Hussey being available for the quarterfinals of the tournament, being held in India, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka. The last-eight ties are a month into the event.

But Australia's physiotherapist Alex

Kountouris admitted they were unsure how long it would take the left-hander to recover from surgery to reattach his damaged hamstring tendon.

The 35-year-old has returned to Western Australia.

"He will now undergo intensive rehabilitation over the coming weeks and how he progresses through this rehabilitation period will ultimately determine his return to cricket," Kountouris said.

"As this is an unusual injury in cricket we will be closely monitoring his progress and making appropriate progressions."

"As yet we have not determined a fixed time for his return to cricket training and playing. This will become clearer in the next two or three weeks."

Australian captain Ricky Ponting is also battling to be fit for the World Cup, as he recovers from a broken finger suffered during the recent Ashes Test series.

Left-arm paceman Mitchell Johnson is suffering from a throat infection and will
