

Indian Classical Music Loses a Titan

Pandit Bhimsen Joshi passes away

One of India's most famous musicians Pandit Bhimsen Joshi, has died at a hospital in the western city of Pune, aged 89.

A legendary singer of Hindustani classical music, Joshi had been ailing for some time and was being treated at the hospital for nearly a month. Joshi received India's highest civilian

honour, the Bharat Ratna, in 2008. The maverick singer was one of the few classical musicians to record film music. He also participated in a popular national

Born in 1922 in Gadag in southern Karnataka state, Joshi left home at the age of 11 to pursue his musical dreams. He hopped from one long distance

Joshi eventually returned home to train

Joshi was a prolific performer, travelling extensively at home and abroad and aggressively promoting his overseas concerts through poster campaigns.

China to Host Next ITI World Congress

The 33rd World Congress of the International Theatre Institute (ITI) will be held in Xiamen, China from September 19 to 25, 2011. This announcement was made at the meeting of Presidents and Secretaries of all the eleven permanent committees of ITI held on January 15 in Fujairah, UAE, according to a press release.

Sheikh Rashid bin Hamad Al-Sharqi, chairman of the Fujairah Culture and Media Authority, formally inaugurated the meeting. Ramendu Majumdar, president of ITI Worldwide, presided over the session. Among others, Tobias Biancone, secretary general of ITI; Ali Mahdi and Christina Babou-Pagoureli, vice presidents of ITI and Mohammed Saif Al-Afkham, president

of ITI Fujairah, UAE centre were present at the opening ceremony. Two other delegates from Bangladesh --

Mofidul Haque, president of ITI Communication Committee and Professor Shafi Ahmed, vice president of ITI Theatre Education and Training Committee -- participated at the joint committee meeting. A new international office of ITI was jointly inaugurated by Mohamad Sayeed


