Blast traps at least 30 in Colombian coal mine

AFP, Bogota

At least 30 miners were trapped by an explosion in a coal mine in north-eastern Colombia, the mayor of the town of Sardinata said yesterday.

Mayor Yamile Rangel said that there was only a slim chance that the miners survived the accident.

"The information that we have up to now is that at the moment of the explosion 30 people were working in the mine -- they are trapped and we do not believe that they survived," Rangel said.

She said that eight miners had already been pulled out, but she did not know yet if they were dead or alive.

The explosion was appar-

ently caused by an accumulation of methane gas, Rangel said.

Russia ratifies US nuke disarmament treaty

Russia's upper house of parliament ratified the new US nuclear disarmament treaty yesterday, the final step in approving the first nuclear pact between the two former Cold War rivals in 20 years.

Senators at the Federation Council voted unanimously to approve the new START treaty, which US President Barack Obama and his Russian counterpart Dmitry Medvedev signed in Prague on April 8, 2010.

The new Strategic Arms Reductions Treaty (START) reduces old warhead ceilings by 30 percent and limits each side to 700 deployed long-range missiles and heavy bombers.

Russia's State Duma lower house of parliament backed the measure in the third and final reading on Tuesday and the US Senate ratified the pact after a months-long debate on December 22.

NATO Secretary General Anders Fogh Rasmussen hailed the vote as "good news for international security and stability."

His message was backed by Mikhail Margelov, the Federation Council's interna-

tional affairs committee chief who was one of the pact's principal backers in Russia.

"The START agreement verifies the trust between the two sides," he said after the vote.

The original 1991 START agreement expired at the end of 2009 amid differences in readings of what constituted 21st century threats.

Those differences also remained throughout the tortuous negotiating and approval process, with both the Senate and Russia's parliament adopting a series of non-binding amendments that put their own spin on the new pact.

One of the most fundamental disagreements concerns a US decision to pursue a European missile defence shield that Russia had spent years resisting.

Moscow has since modified its stance, saying that it was ready to see the shield go up, but only if it was giving an equal say in how it operates -- and in determining which nations posed a real threat to the West.

The new START will enter into force the moment the two presidents swap their respective "instruments of ratification," which is expected to happen within days.

Sabir Hossain Chowdhury, chief coordinator and election agent of Shujat Mia, told The Daily Star those 11 election officials

have open or close relations with AL.

Returning Officer Md Emran said five of the 11 officials were not given election duty. The rest six are now under the EC, which would take action if they do not work properly, he added. AL lawmaker from Habiganj-3 Abu Jahio

at a press briefing said BNP candidate Sheikh Sujat normally does not stay in the country. "He comes home during elections and tries to win using huge black money," he alleged.

He said the ruling party is not influencing the election and the EC is not getting any interference from them. BNP leaders in a separate press confer-

Pak's Sindh province faces acute hunger

Pakistan's Sindh province, hit hard by last year's floods, is suffering levels of malnutrition almost as critical as Chad and Niger, with hundreds of thousands of children at risk, UNICEF said yesterday.

A survey conducted by the provincial government and the UN Children's Fund revealed malnutrition rates of 23.1 percent in northern Sindh and 21.2 percent in the south.

Those rates are above the 15 percent emergency threshold set by the World Health Organisation and are on a par with some of the poorest parts of sub-Saharan Africa.

A full report would be released on Friday by the Sindh government, she said.

The role of issue manager, regulatory body, audit firm and asset valuer and company will also be looked into. It will investigate how small inves-

tors were affected by purchasing shares of the issuer company in the case of initial public offering (IPO). The committee will review overall

liquidity situation and see if the SEC had sufficient efficiency and experience.

Pirates have seized German cargo ship off Seychelles: EU AFP, Brussels

Pirates hijacked a German cargo ship north of the Seychelles in an attack over the weekend, the EU's naval mission confirmed yesterday, as the nearest Navfor vessel was too far away to help. "After four days of uncertainty regarding the exact

status of the crew, MV Beluga Nomination is now believed" to have been captured by pirates, the EU Navfor mission said in a statement on the hijacking. An unknown number of pirates travelling on a

skiff and bearing small arms attacked the Germanowned and Antiguan and Barbudan flagged, on Saturday in the Indian Ocean, the statement added.

Indonesia arrests 'smuggler' over immigrant deaths

Indonesian police yesterday said they had arrested an alleged people smuggler linked to a shipwreck in Australia's remote Christmas Island which killed up to 50 asylum-seekers.

The man, who was only identified by his initials A.H, is believed to be an Australian of Middle-Eastern origin in his 40s, National Police transnational security chief Agung Sabar Santoso told AFP.

"He's a big fish, a cunning smuggler," he said. "From the information shared by the Australian police, we gathered that he had sent boatloads of illegal Afghan and Iranian immigrants to Australia such as Christmas Island and Ashmore."

Twitter blocked in Egypt amid unrest

Twitter confirmed late Tuesday that its website was blocked in Egypt, in an apparent move to thwart protesters using the social network in a campaign to oust President Hosni Mubarak.

The US-based microblogging service that allows people to use mobile phones and computers to broadcast short text messages was out of service in Egypt, according to the herdict.org tracking website.

Twitter said in a terse "tweet" that it was blocked in Egypt starting about 1600 GMT and that the interruption had derailed Twitter.com as well as applications linked to the service there.

"We believe that the open exchange of information and views benefits societies and helps governments connect with their people," Twitter representatives said in follow-up message.

Some 50 activists of local Olama League led by Adam Ali attacked Jubo League activists at the office with bamboo sticks and iron rods around 10:30pm, said Sub-Inspector Mohammad Siraj of Kadamtali Police Station. Jubo and Sramik League activists led by Babul counter-attacked with sticks and iron rods.

They fought a running battle in front of the office, causing disruption to traffic on Buriganga Bridge-1 and nearby roads for about an hour, police said. On information, Kadamtali police rushed to the spot,

dispersed the activists and locked the Juba League office. The road communication returned to normal around 11:30am.

Preferring anonymity a police official said the office was being used by local Jubo League and Sramik League, and Olama League men were trying to take control of it.

Police said local AL leaders assured activists of the AL units that they would settle the issue amicably.

Some 37 employees have been working in the unit for the last seven years under the project following assurance of their job regularisation.

Many patients who went to the outdoor section of the burn unit had to return without getting any treatment after 11:00am.

In the indoor section, many patients did not get dressings for their wounds due to the work abstention. Anika, 3, was brought to the unit around 10:30am from

Kaliganj of Gazipur district as her right hand got burnt by hot water. When her parents were waiting for the serial in the unit's emergency department, the staff began the work abstention.

Anika had to wait till 2:00pm to see a doctor. A burn unit official requesting anonymity told The Daily Star that the 50-bed hospital project started with six third class employees, 13 doctors and 10 nurses in December 2003.

At present the unit has 52 doctors of whom 39 have been working on deputation.

Twenty-seven fourth class employees are now working with the unit. They worked for the first two years on a temporary basis with a daily payment of Tk 120. After two years, their daily payment of Tk 120 was stopped

by the ministry of health. Since then the employees have been working without any payment, they said. At present, around 300 patients have been admitted in the indoor section of the 50-bed unit while on an average 150

patients take treatment from its outdoor every day. The doctors, nurses and employees of the Burn unit alleged that instead of meeting their demand, the authorities are buying time.

"We are now passing days in abject misery", they said. Dr Samanta Lal Sen, project director of the Burn unit, told

this correspondent that many fourth class employees have been working in the unit without any money for long with the hope of regularisation of their jobs.

"We hope that the authorities' assurance of their job regularisation and bringing them under the revenue budget will materialise soon," he said.
